Greetings, Reynolds cousins!

I hope you've all been able to further your Reynolds research over the past several months.

If you haven't looked for your Reynolds ancestors in the online records at familysearch.org recently, I highly recommend that you check out the local records they are uploading to their online catalogue. They now have tax records and deed books for thousands of localities that were not previously available online. These newly accessible records can help you identify your Reynolds ancestors, understand their lives, and untangle their lines. Tax records are like mini-censuses taken every year and can help you understand what your ancestors owned and when they moved. Deed records can help identify exactly where their land was located in a given county and can help sort out exactly which of the six William Reynoldses it was that married Rebecca so-and-so, because land transfers from in-laws were very common.

In this issue, we're rerunning an article from 2020 that is a call to action for all Members in the stonewall (line 25) group. We ask that every one of you in the stonewall group take the recommended steps indicated in our first article to have your most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA) added to the [RFA Lineage chart](#).

MOVING AWAY FROM THE STONEWALL DESIGNATION – PLEASE ADD YOUR MOST DISTANT PROVEN REYNOLDS ANCESTOR TO THE [RFA ANCESTORS LIST](#)

When the Reynolds Family Association was formed by Mary Reynolds Fosdick over 120 years ago, the original membership that would meet in New London, CT, all belonged to one particular Reynolds lineage. Their family descended from John Reynolds of Weymouth—presently known as "[RFA Line 11](#)". [The best summary of the RFA lineage system has been published in the introduction to the RFA Centennial Collection AKA the Red Book. An electronic copy of this 800+ page

bible of Reynolds genealogy is available in the members-only section of the RFA website.]

Shortly thereafter, descendants from other Reynolds families could join RFA if they descended from a small handful of Reynolds progenitor couples, including Robert of Boston, John of Watertown, and a few others that were documented immigrants to the U.S. At that time—in the early 20th century—applicants would be denied full membership if they could not demonstrate their connection to one of these credentialed RFA lines. As decades progressed, the number of allowed lines grew, but very slowly. Applicants to RFA that could not connect their Reynolds pedigree to one of the few RFA lines that were thought to be the originals, were assigned a "stonewall" line, indicating that they could not connect back to an original immigrant Reynolds ancestor. These applicants were only allowed to hold provisional RFA membership.

The 100+ year-old RFA lineage framework has provided an invaluable resource for Reynolds genealogists. But the benefits have largely accrued to the lineages that could be "listed". These were mostly the classic lines that have large membership: the Robert of Boston line, the James of N. Kingstown line, the John of Watertown line, to name a few of the largest.

But, while many Reynolds lineages have unclear origins prior to the mid-1800s, every single member of RFA has ***some*** most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA)—even if it is their grandparent. But these members and their ancestors have been excluded from being listed along with the traditional RFA lines up until recently.

Going forward, both the RFA itself as well as our individual research efforts will be strongly aided by

bringing all members out of the “stonewall” category. We intend to identify every RFA member’s most distant Reynolds ancestor [on a list that is visible to all members](#) on the RFA website.

This move will result in many additional MDRA lines being added. Over time, as research progresses and as evidence becomes available, we will be able to combine some of the lines as connections between them are proven. For example, extensive YDNA testing has proven that the Elisha Reynolds that lived in Wilkes Co., NC, ([Line 38](#)) descends from James of N. Kingstown ([Line 14](#)) via James’s grandson, Francis Junior. Other connections will continue to be identified and lines consolidated over time.

Toward this goal, RFA is now requesting that all members in the Stonewall group ([Line 25](#)) add their most distant Reynolds ancestor to [the RFA list](#). In the past three or four years, RFA has added about 25 new Reynolds lines. This RFA ancestor webpage list has also been updated to reflect YDNA signature information of each lineage as that becomes available. These YDNA designators allow researchers to see which lines are close, which are not close at all, and will allow new participants to validate a connection to a particular line.

We ask for ***your*** assistance in expanding the RFA lineage list to include your most distant Reynolds ancestors in the online RFA Lineage. This will take some work over the next several months but will certainly pay dividends. Please note we want you to share your ***proven*** lineage. Please do not assume that a public tree you found online is correct or that Tillman was correct and that you descend from Christopher Reynolds unless you have verified the line. As such, please only include info on your verified lineage.

To aid the listing of your most distant Reynolds ancestor, we ask that you (listed here in order of importance but all are recommended!):

- 1) Navigate to [this google form](#) to submit basic info to RFA about your most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA). This will result in your MDRA being added to [the RFA List](#).
- 2) Email to [Tommy](#) a (~1 page) biographical write-up that can be linked on the RFA website and printed in the RFA Dispatch newsletter. An example can be found [here](#). Publishing a biography is critical for increasing the visibility of these your Reynolds line and for ensuring the info on your lineage is maintained over generations.
- 3) Either YDNA test yourself (if you are a Reynolds-named male) or encourage a male Reynolds-named brother/uncle/cousin to YDNA test. Guidance on details of this available on upon request from Administrators of the YDNA project, [Nancy](#) and [Tommy](#).

We look forward to using this enhanced lineage system to support all members in their Reynolds family history research.

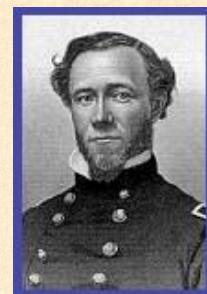

REYNOLDS IN THE CIVIL WAR

As many of you know, I'm a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans and a member of the Military Order of the Stars and Bars, and in doing research I have found many Reynolds' that fought on both sides of the war. Joseph Jones Reynolds
Major General, United States Army



Born at Flemingsburg, Kentucky, January 4, 1822. When he was fifteen his parents moved across the Ohio River to Lafayette, Indiana. The next year entered Wabash College at Crawfordsville; a year later he was appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. He graduated in the class of 1843, which included U. S. Grant, with whom he remained on friendly terms.

After garrison duty and serving in the military occupation of Texas just prior to the war with Mexico, he was assigned as instructor at West Point, where he taught for 8 years. He then did frontier duty in the Indian Territory until he submitted his resignation as First Lieutenant, 3rd U.S. Artillery, in 1857.

In the next 4 years taught engineering at Washington University, St Louis, and engaged in the grocery business in Lafayette. On the outbreak of hostilities in 1861, he was appointed Colonel of the 10th Indiana Militia, then Brigadier General of Volunteers, and on June 14, 1861, to rank from May 17, Brigadier General, U. S. Volunteers. May 17, 1861 was earliest date of rank given any Brigadier General of US Volunteers; however, no less than 34 officers commissioned at various dates from May 17 to August 12, were accorded rank as of this date. He was 19th on list as finally arranged by War Department. Grant's name immediately preceded his. Curiously enough, with exception of William T. Sherman, who was ranked 7th, the others were either killed in action, cashiered (Fitz John Porter was 5th) or faded into obscurity).

He commanded at Cheat Mountain under William Starke Rosecrans in September, but resigned the following January because of death of his brother with whom he was in partnership. While out of the service he aided in organizing Indiana troops and again was appointed a Brigadier General, September 17, 1862, and Major General of Volunteers, November 29.

He commanded a Division of XIV Corps at Chickamauga, and on October 10, 1863, was made Chief of Staff of George H. Thomas' Army of the Cumberland, a position held until after battle of

Chattanooga. In January 1864, he put in charge of the New Orleans defenses, and in July took command of XIX Corps and organized the campaign against Mobile. In November 1864 and until April 1866, commanded Department of Arkansas.

He became Colonel of the 26th U.S. Infantry upon reorganization of the army in July 1866, and was breveted Brigadier General and Major General, United States Army, March 2, 1867. He was transferred to the 3rd U.S. Cavalry, 1870, and commanded the occupation forces in southwest, including the Department of Texas, until relieved of command in 1872 and ordered to rejoin his regiment. In 1871 he was elected to the U.S. Senate by the carpetbag legislature in Texas, but the seat was successfully contested by the brother of General A. J. Hamilton.

He next commanded at various points in Nebraska and Wyoming. He was commanding the advance of George Crook's expedition when it attacked and captured the Sioux village on the Powder River, March 17, 1876. He prematurely ordered a retreat, leaving his dead and a wounded Private in the hands of Indians who "promptly cut the Private limb from limb." Sometime later his conduct, along with that of certain other officers, was subject of general court martial. Subsequently he resigned, his Army career wrecked.

After his retirement he established a residence in Washington, D. C., where he died February 25, 1899. He was buried in Section 1, Grave 82-C, Arlington National Cemetery.

His wife, Mary E. Bainbridge Reynolds (1827-1913), is buried with him.

Captain Robert M. Reynolds, First Iowa Cavalry (August 22, 1826-June 7, 1885) is buried adjacent to him. The Captain's wife, Orpha W. Richardson Reynolds (August 28, 1826-January 19, 1903) is buried with him as is his son, Lieutenant Lovell K. Reynolds, United States Navy (January 31, 1857-February 18, 1893).

The General's son, Alfred Reynolds, Rear Admiral, United States Navy, and his family are buried in Section 4 of Arlington National Cemetery.



CORRECTION TO ARTICLE

AN EXPANSION OF RFA'S LARRY JOE REYNOLDS YDNA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

A goal of many American Reynolds researchers is to trace their lineage to the homeland of their Reynolds immigrant. British American Colony seventeenth and eighteenth century documents can be difficult to trace using traditional genealogy. As a result researchers have added DNA to their genealogy tool box. There are three types of DNA tests used for genetic genealogy, autosomal, mitochondrial, and Y-DNA. The Y-DNA test is best for a specific line to reach back in time because it is passed down directly without alteration from father to son, father to son, father to son (typically with the same surname).

To help with locating British, Scottish, and/or Irish connections, the Reynolds Family Association (RFA) has limited funds available for offering discounts on DNA tests. This funding is available to any male Reynolds living in the United Kingdom (England, Scotland, Northern Ireland, and Republic of Ireland). There are \$100.00 stipends for either a Y-DNA 37-marker test (which is about \$100) or \$100 off a BigY test. Eligible recipients for this scholarship are required to provide a valid lineage

chart. The intent is to expand Reynolds Y-DNA testing penetration in the UK, where most Reynolds surnamed lineages are believed to have originated. Hopefully, each of these newly tested UK Reynoldses will turn out to be a match to one of our 40+ existing Reynolds groups (that are predominantly American Reynoldses). The goal is to provide some evidence of pre-immigrant local origins for some of our Reynolds lineages.

In addition to the United Kingdom programs, RFA continues the \$50 scholarships to Reynolds Y-DNA Project members that take a high resolution BigY test. RFA has provided over 20 of these scholarships in the past three years and they remain very popular and useful.

The Y-DNA 37-marker tests for United Kingdom and Ireland candidates are advertised on the International Society of Genetic Genealogy (ISOGG) website and at all Genealogical Conferences (where ISOGG volunteers are in attendance). Use

Alpheus Hyatt Mayor, who graduated from Princeton University. A. B., '22, with highest honors in modern languages, has just been awarded a Cecil Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University, England. for three years of graduate study in Literature. Hyatt will assume residence at Oxford in the autumn of 1923. At Princeton he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. During 1922-23 he is Instructor in Fine Arts, Vassar College. Poughkeepsie.
