Finally, for your awareness, as part of RFA's effort to update and reconcile our membership list, we will be reaching out to all members over the next few weeks with instructions for renewing their membership contact information and accounts for 2021. All members will receive an email from RFA with a reminder to pay their dues and options for updating their contact information. In recognition of the fact that 2020 has been difficult for many families, RFA is temporarily reducing membership fees for 2021 from \$20 per year to \$10 per year. RFA membership fees will return to \$20 per year in 2022.

MOVING AWAY FROM THE STONEWALL DESIGNATION – PLEASE ADD YOUR MOST DISTANT PROVEN REYNOLDS ANCESTOR TO THE [RFA ANCESTORS LIST](#)

When the Reynolds Family Association was formed by Mary Reynolds Fosdick over 120 years ago, the original membership that would meet in New London, CT, all belonged to one particular Reynolds lineage. Their family descended from John Reynolds of Weymouth—presently known as “[RFA Line 11](#)”. [The best summary of the RFA lineage system has been published in the introduction to the RFA Centennial Collection AKA the Red Book. An electronic copy of this 800+ page bible of Reynolds genealogy is available in the members-only section of the RFA website.]

Shortly thereafter, descendants from other Reynolds families could join RFA if they descended from a small handful of Reynolds progenitor couples, including Robert of Boston, John of Watertown, and a few others that were documented immigrants to the U.S. At that time—in the early 20th century—applicants would be denied full membership if they could not demonstrate their connection to one of these credentialed RFA lines. As decades progressed, the number of allowed lines grew, but very slowly. Applicants to RFA that could not connect their Reynolds pedigree to one of the few RFA lines that were thought to be the originals, were assigned a “stonewall” line, indicating that they could not connect back to an original immigrant Reynolds ancestor. These applicants were only allowed to hold provisional RFA membership.

The 100+ year-old RFA lineage framework has provided an invaluable resource for Reynolds genealogists. But the benefits have largely accrued to the lineages that could be

“listed”. These were mostly the classic lines that have large membership: the Robert of Boston line, the James of N. Kingstown line, the John of Watertown line, to name a few of the largest.

But, while many Reynolds lineages have unclear origins prior to the mid-1800s, every single member of RFA has ***some*** most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA)—even if it is their grandparent. But these members and their ancestors have been excluded from being listed along with the traditional RFA lines up until recently.

Going forward, both the RFA itself as well as our individual research efforts will be strongly aided by bringing all members out of the “stonewall” category. We intend to identify every RFA member’s most distant Reynolds ancestor [on a list that is visible to all members](#) on the RFA website.

This move will result in many additional MDRA lines being added. Over time, as research progresses and as evidence becomes available, we will be able to combine some of the lines as connections between them are proven. For example, extensive YDNA testing has proven that the Elisha Reynolds that lived in Wilkes Co., NC, ([Line 38](#)) descends from James of N. Kingstown ([Line 14](#)) via James’s grandson, Francis Junior. Other connections will continue to be identified and lines consolidated over time.

Toward this goal, RFA is now requesting that all members in the Stonewall group (Line 25) add their most distant Reynolds ancestor to [the RFA list](#). In the past three or four years, RFA has added about 15 new Reynolds lines. This RFA ancestor webpage list has also been updated to reflect YDNA signature information of each lineage as that becomes available. These YDNA designators allow researchers to see which lines are close, which are not close at all, and will allow new participants to validate a connection to a particular line.

We ask for ***your*** assistance in expanding the RFA lineage list to include your most distant Reynolds ancestors in the online RFA Lineage. This will take some work over the next several months but will certainly pay

dividends. Please note we want you to share your ***proven*** lineage. Please do not assume that a public tree you found online is correct or that Tillman was correct and that you descend from Christopher Reynolds unless you have verified the line. As such, please only include info on your verified lineage.

To aid the listing of your most distant Reynolds ancestor, we ask that you (listed here in order of importance but all are recommended!):

- 1) Navigate to [this google form](#) to submit basic info to RFA about your most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA). This will result in your MDRA being added to [the RFA List](#).
- 2) Email to [Tommy](#) a (~1 page) biographical write-up that can be linked on the RFA website and printed in the RFA Dispatch newsletter. An example can be found [here](#). Publishing a biography is critical for increasing the visibility of these your Reynolds line and for ensuring the info on your lineage is maintained over generations.
- 3) Either YDNA test yourself (if you are a Reynolds-named male) or encourage a male Reynolds-named brother/uncle/cousin to YDNA test. Guidance on details of this available on upon request from Administrators of the YDNA project, [Nancy](#) and [Tommy](#).

We look forward to using this enhanced lineage system to support all members in their Reynolds family history research.

A VIRTUAL RFA REUNION?

We are considering holding a 2020 RFA Reunion as a virtual event—or series of short events on December 19th. Although a virtual event cannot replace the opportunity to interact in-person with other Reynolds family history enthusiasts, there are numerous advantages to hosting a Reunion virtually this year.

Benefits include avoiding travel challenges and public health risks during a pandemic; reaching members that would not be able to travel; and doing this all at a lower cost to members and at a lower cost to the RFA. In a

survey last year, Members noted they were unable to attend the 2019 Reunion because it was too far away, they weren't available for several days of travel at that time, they couldn't afford the travel and/or their advanced age didn't allow them to travel. A virtual reunion would remove many of these barriers.

A virtual RFA reunion would likely consist of:

- a few presentations by interested Members on topics of their Reynolds lineage research
- an update on some RFA initiatives
- an update on the Reynolds Surname YDNA Project
- some opportunities for social exchanges and individual lineage discussions
- a business meeting for RFA Board Members

We welcome your input... [please complete this online form](#) to let us know whether you may be interested in participating.

In the coming weeks, I will be looking at online platforms like Webex, Zoom and others to see what is most likely to meet our needs. When a decision is made about whether/how a virtual reunion may be held, instructions will be sent to the RFA email listserv and posted on the RFA Facebook group.

If we hold a virtual reunion, volunteer presenters and moderators will be necessary. Do you have a Reynolds family history project you're working on? Please volunteer to share it. Also, hosting an event with potentially scores of online participants will work best if moderators are available to assist members with technology issues, etc. Areas we can use volunteers will include:

- presenting/discussing your Reynolds lineage
- providing tech support to members that have issues with the online platform
- answering and referring questions to speakers in chat dialogue during live sessions

ROBERT AND MARY REYNOLDS GENEALOGY INTEREST GROUP

I have been an RFA (Reynolds line 012) since December 2017 and have greatly enjoyed meeting via email other members who are actively researching Robert Reynolds (b: about 1586, England; emigrated to Boston, MA about 1630–34; died there in about 1659). While I have most often researched my family lineage independently, I have also periodically thought about the benefits of forming an email group (call it perhaps, the Robert and Mary Reynolds Genealogy Interest Group, or “RMRGIG,” or something else) mainly for the purpose of sharing, on an as needed basis, research information, ideas and most importantly assistance when an apparent genealogical “brick wall” appears. Hence, the purpose of this article.

The proposed interest group is open to any RFA members (in the U.S. and England) who have a genealogical connection to and are interested in sharing and extending genealogical research about Robert and Mary's origins (including their five children Ruth, Tabitha, Nathaniel, Sarah and Mary) in England, during the 16th C. and earlier, and any new information about their lives during the colonial and post-Revolutionary War period within the New England region during the 17th C. and later. Also, tracing the dispersal of the Robert Reynolds line to other U.S. geographic areas, while an ambitious undertaking, may evolve naturally as more family research on this line is undertaken and shared. Of course, the use of sound and accepted genealogical research standards of proof should be expected for any shared research findings that are considered high quality, documentary evidence. However, this expectation does not preclude sharing clues, hints, ideas, hypotheses, and other forms of speculation that might ultimately lead to the discovery of new information and research results about Robert and Mary's origins in England and the years following their immigration to New England. The first step, however, is to identify any RFA members, or prospective members, at all research skill levels, who are interested in participating.

The benefits of the interest group are mainly to provide easy email access to others who are researching Robert Reynolds' lineage to share pertinent information, research results and strategies, sources of information, and new avenues for exploring Robert and Mary's history. If participating in the interest group sounds appealing, please email Ned Reynolds, Jerry Reynolds and/or me (see email addresses below) and provide a brief paragraph of your lineage or connection to Robert and Mary including a statement of the current status of your research, along with your contact information (post address, phone, and email address). We will then compile and email the information and emails to others who respond. Once established, the interest group will function informally by members communicating with one another individually or, if desired, as a group at the initiative of an individual member. Let's see how the interest group evolves over time! If a more formal organization is needed, perhaps someone will volunteer to be an administrator of the interest group to coordinate additional interactions and activities. An important benefit to re-emphasize, however, is that rather than being isolated individually when researching Robert and Mary, we can utilize the individual and collective experience, ideas, and research of the group when the need arises.

Finally, an effort has been mounted through RFA and the Reynolds Surname YDNA Project associated with Family Tree DNA, to try and identify the YDNA haplogroup (i.e., genetic signature) of Robert Reynolds by using advanced YDNA (specifically Big Y 700) genetic testing. Nathaniel (1) Reynolds, the only son of Robert Reynolds, had four sons, Nathaniel (2), Peter, Joseph and Benjamin, who married and, in turn, had sons. If there are current (or prospective) RFA members in the U.S. or England who have male family members with a direct, uninterrupted lineage to one of the four sons of Nathaniel (1) or, in turn, any of their sons down through the generations, please contact Ned and/or me for a referral to learn more about participating in the Robert Reynolds YDNA Project Group (group #31). By the term "uninterrupted lineage" is meant, for example, that there have been no male adoptions, no unrelated male persons assuming the Reynolds name, or other non-paternal events occurring

that would interrupt a male's direct-line, blood lineage through the generations descending from Nathaniel (1).

Currently, there are three of us who are direct descendants of Nathaniel (1) (two descending from Benjamin and one from Nathaniel (2)), who have tested with FTDNA (Big Y 700) and are collaborating with ongoing genealogical and YDNA research. We are eager for others to join us, especially any from England. Using genetic genealogy in combination with traditional genealogy research may result in identifying a relatively stable genetic signature for the Robert Reynolds line, that, in turn may enable others to establish their genetic lineage to Robert, as well as help shed more light on the origins of Robert in England (especially if more Reynoldses in England pursue testing).

Please note below our signatures, for your information, a few sources already researched in connection with Robert and Mary's pre and post background in New England. Other information is also available. We look forward to communicating with any who may be interested in the Robert and Mary Genealogy Interest Group, and especially those who may have male family members who would be good candidates for advanced YDNA testing as part of the Reynolds Surname YDNA Project.

THE LARRY JOE REYNOLDS SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Since mid-2018, the RFA has offered \$50 scholarships to subsidize and encourage male Reynolds members to participate in advanced YDNA (BigY) testing. This type of testing is beneficial to all Reynolds researchers because it helps reveal YDNA markers that are passed down each Reynolds lineage. This testing allows us to identify the YDNA "signature" patterns of RFA Line Ancestors and provides a means to validate descent of living Reynolds men from these RFA Line Ancestors (with a knowable margin of error).

In the September 2019 business meeting, the board and members voted to name this scholarship program the Larry Joe Reynolds Scholarship Fund in recognition of Joe's dedication and leadership of RFA over the past many years. Since 2018, sixteen Reynolds men have received Larry Joe Reynolds Scholarships for this purpose. IN REMEMBRANCE OF LEE TAYLOR

It is with regrets that we inform the RFA family of the passing of a long-time RFA member, board member and collaborator, Lee Taylor. In honor of Lee, we have added her most distant Reynolds ancestor (MDRA), James Byrd Reynolds bca 1829 in NC as RFA line ancestor 61.

Sybil Lena "Lee" (Reynolds) Taylor, 88, formerly of Alexandria, VA passed away peacefully on February 3, 2020 in Bridgewater, VA, after a long battle with Alzheimer's.

Lee was the cherished wife of Keaton Taylor who died in 2014. She was the beloved and admired mother of Marie Taylor Cross (Tom) of Centennial, CO and Julia Taylor Birkhead (Steve) of Elkton, VA; adored grandmother of Wendy Leigh McCall (Kurtis) of Millersville, MD, and Shannon Taylor Gray (Ryan) of Denver, CO; and great grandchildren, Blake McCall (age 6) and Mila McCall (age 3). Lee's much-adored Westie, Bobby, is in the loving care of Julia and Steve.

Other survivors include her dearly loved sisters, Jane Reynolds Hankey (late husband Mack) of Bonham, TX and Judy Reynolds Nordquist (Niles) of Star, ID and their children and grandchildren. Lee also cared deeply for Keaton's nephew John Stephen Taylor (Karen) and their children, of Leitchfield, KY. She is also survived by cousins, including Sue Reynolds Smith of Montgomery, AL.

Lee was preceded in death by her parents, Willie Joseph Reynolds, Winnie Smith Reynolds, and Effie Phillips Reynolds.

Lee was born in Altoona, Alabama on October 16, 1931. Lee was an only child, age 3, when her mother, Effie Mae, died. Her father then married Winnie who lovingly raised Lee along with her younger sisters. Lee lived in several states before settling in Alexandria, VA in 1964 where she and Keaton lived until 2014. At that time, they moved to Elkton, VA.

In addition to being a fantastic mother, Lee had a successful career that spanned decades. In 1951, she was a young Private First Class in the U.S. Air Force, serving as a Career Counselor. Later, she was a Management Analyst with the Defense Contract Audit Agency. She then worked at the Pentagon as a Supervisory Freedom of Information Officer. From 1985 to 1993, she was an Analyst with Eastman Kodak in their Government Contracts Division. After retiring in 1993, she continued her life-long love of learning. She did extensive genealogical research and was a published genealogist. In her spare time, she taught Spanish at a Senior Center in Alexandria. She was also a voracious reader, an accomplished seamstress, and she loved to crochet and cross-stitch.

Lee's family will remember her as a loving, vivacious, strong, very intelligent woman of excellent character who made many sacrifices to give her daughters the best possible upbringing. She had immense intellectual curiosity and determination, and throughout her life always found a way to overcome obstacles and challenges.

Lee's daughter, Marie, would like to add a special note of thanks to Julia and Steve who so selflessly and generously took such loving care of Lee and Keaton since 2013. Our entire extended family is filled with gratitude, awe, and love for you.

We would also like to thank Bridgewater Retirement Community who took excellent care of Lee during the last 17 months of her life.

The family will hold a private funeral service with military honors for Lee and Keaton at a later date.
