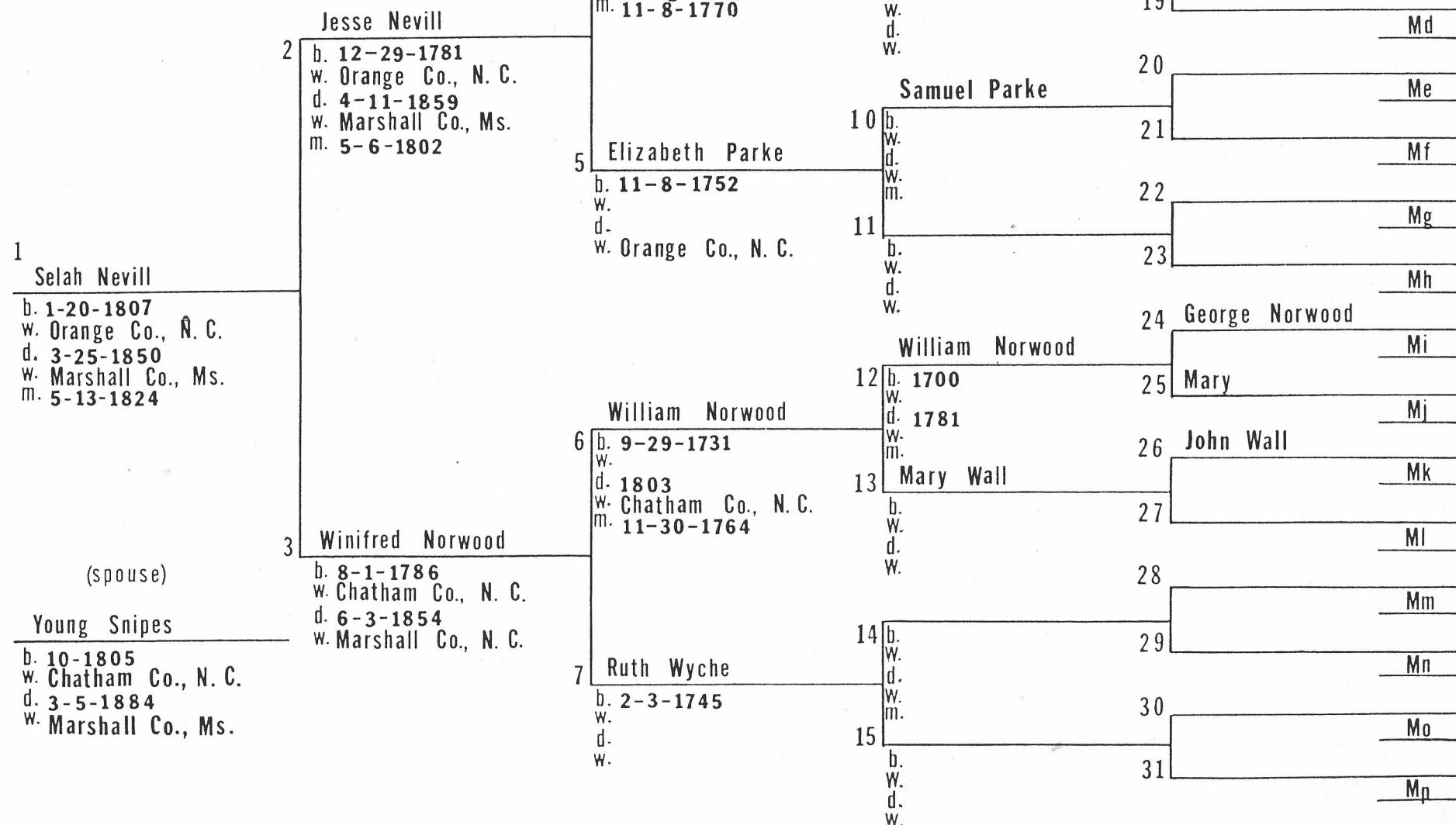

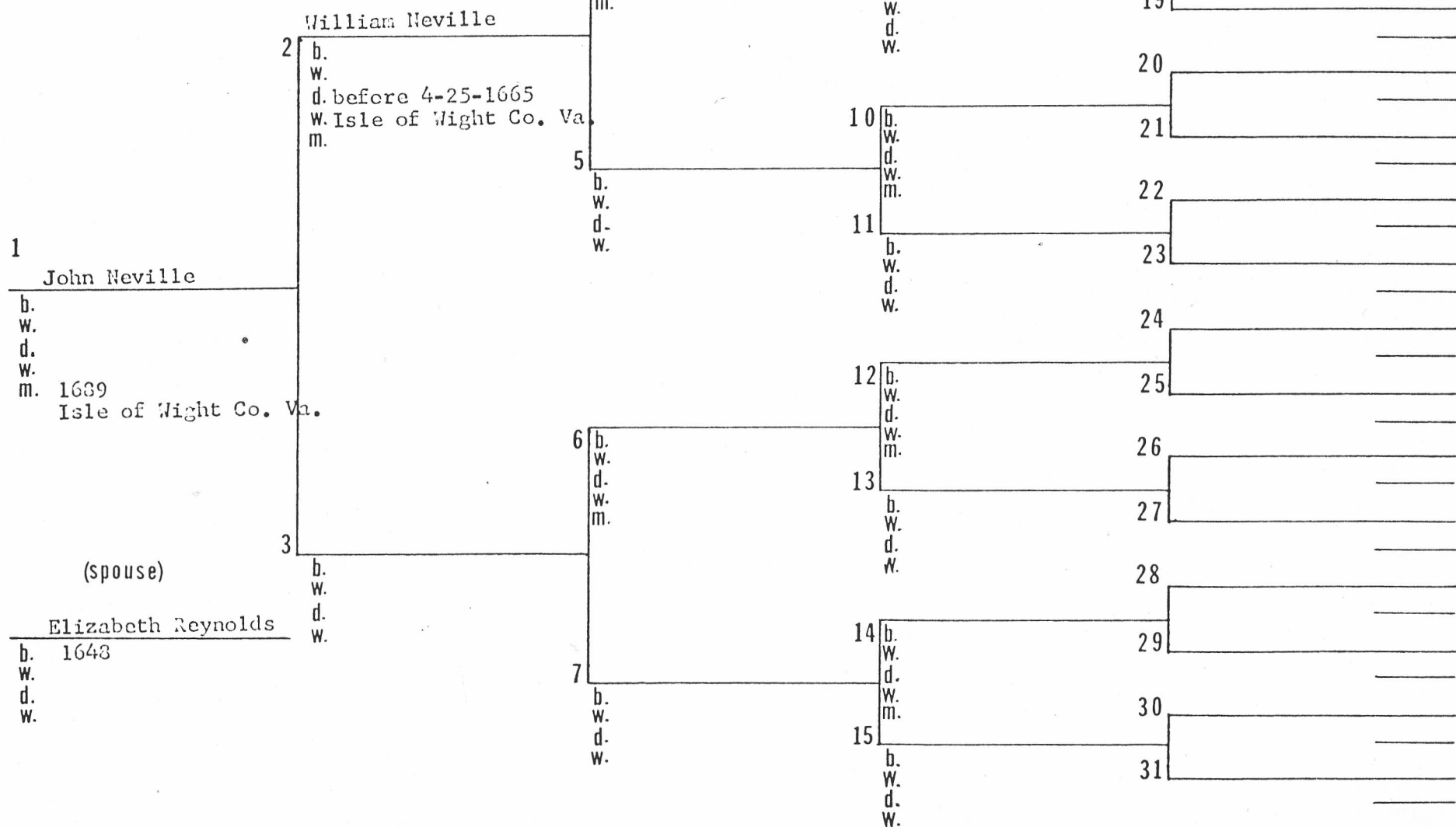
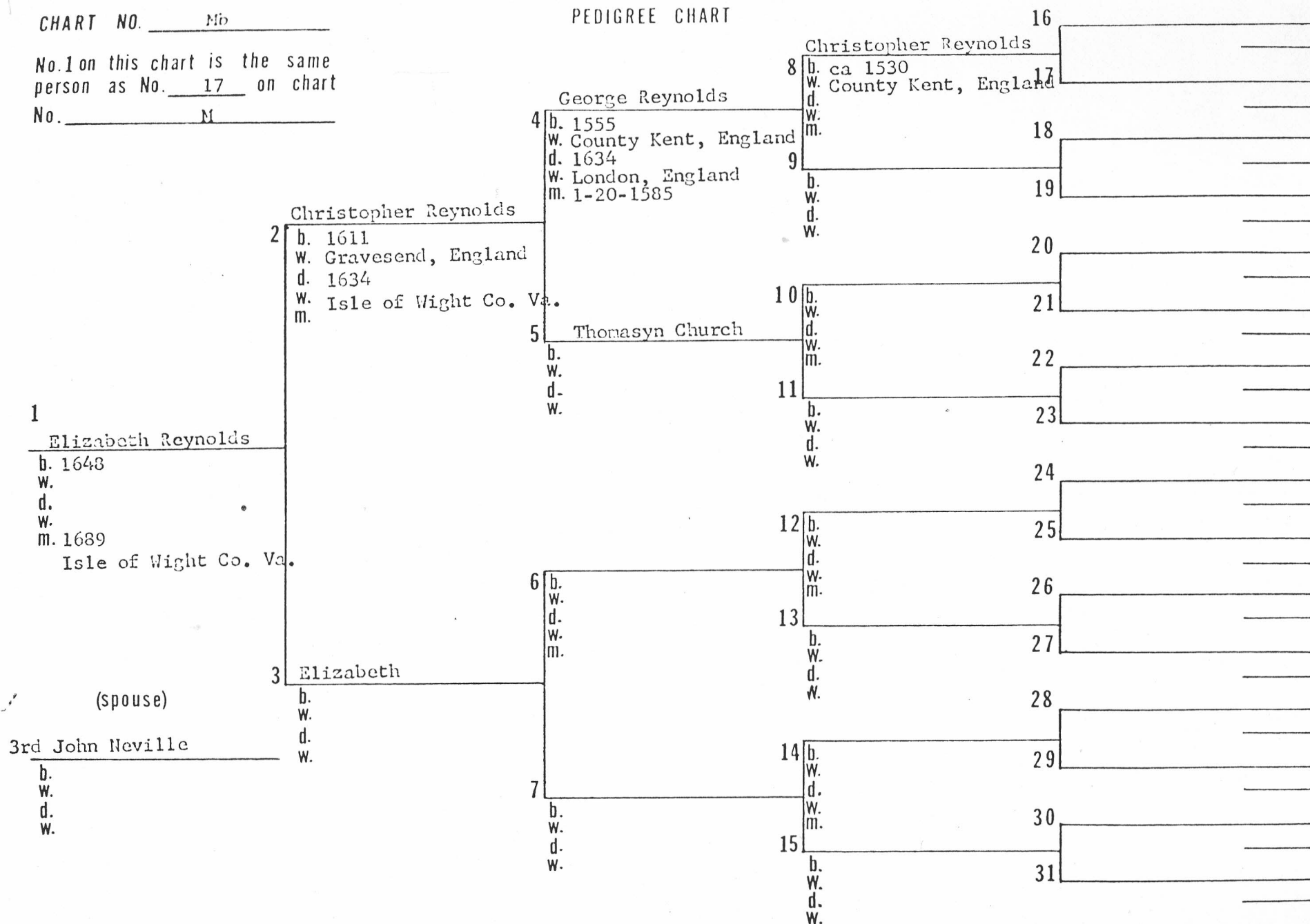

John ² Neville married Elizabeth Reynolds, dau. of Richard Reynolds, and granddaughter of Christopher Reynolds (See Reynolds) (D. B. 1, p. 25; C. M. 38). In 1665, John Neville of Nansemond, planter, and Elizabeth his wife, sold to John Marshall of Isle of Wight for 1000 lbs. tbco. 400 acres granted Mar. 6 to Henry Bradley and Bradley sold to Neville Feb. 2, 1663. Recorded in Nansemond, John Lear, Clerk. Recorded in Isle of Wight, John Jennings, Clerk. (17C-541)

It seems that because John Neville also owned land in Isle of Wight his career can be followed in the Isle of Wight records.

On April 28, 1667, John Marshall sold Cornelius Scully for 2000 lbs tbco. 400 acrrs lying on Beaver Dam Swamp bought of John Neville. It seems this land had doubled in price in two years. (Id-548) On Feb. 8, 1671, Arthur Skinner sold the 125 acres bought of John Neville and wife Elizabeth. (Id-563) On Feb 21, 1683-4, John Neville, with William Godwin, appraised the estate of John Gardner (C. W. 1-34). On Dec. 9, 1680, he and Richard Reynolds were sureties on the bond of Anne Mecom, relict of Neal Mecom (Id-107). Also on May 20, 1690, with William Godwin and Wm. West, he appraised the estate of Alex. Chestnut. (Id-45).

In 1689 he and wife, Elizabeth, made a deed of gift to Benjamin Beale and his wife, Martha, evidently their daughter. The deed provided that if Benjamin and his wife died without issue the land was to go to Benjamin ³ Neville, son of the donor and the deed was witnessed by John ³ Neville, Jr.

John ² Neville of Nansemond sold land on the Western Branch in Isle of Wight to John Johnson in 1698. The date of his death is not known as the Nansemond records are destroyed. He was evidently deceased before 1704 for his son Benjamin was holding 425 acres in Nansemond in that year and John Neville does not appear in the Quit Rents. Benjamin was the only Neville to hold land in that county.

William Neville was the first of his family in Virginia. His land was located on the borders of Isle of Wight and Nansemond. In March 1642-43 the General Assembly enacted that the boundaries of Isle of Wight "shall extend from the main river into the woods southerly into and including the plantations of William Neville and Robert Pitt. "On June 10, 1643, Capt. John Upton patented 3286 acres in Isle of Wight "lying upon branches of Pagan Point Cr. and New Towne Haven, adjacent Mr. Sparks, Anthony Jones, Mr. Nevil, Robert Pitt, Ambrose Bennett (C. P. 143).

William ¹ Neville was dead before the 25th of April, 1665, for on that date Roger Neville sold to Arthur Skinner, his "father-in-law", all claims to the estate of "William Neville, my father". (17C-541). John Neville witnessed this deed. On May 16, 1665, John Neville of Nansemond and wife, Elizabeth, sold to Arthur Skinner 125 acres in Isle of Wight formerly patented by John Neville (Id)

William Neville had two sons, Roger and John Neville. Roger was evidently the eldest son and heir. Arthur Skinner, his "father-in-law" had married the widow of William Neville. The phrase "step-father" was not in common use at that time. (W.B. 1 - p. 48)

There seems to be some confusion and belief that William Neville who settled in Isle of Wight County, Va. (abt. 1642) was the son of John Neville who came to America in the Ark & Dove, also settling in the Isle of Wright Co., Va.

The records do not bear out this theory but the fact that the two did settle in the Isle of Wight County within eight years of each other would indicate that they did know each other could have easily been kin.

The dates of their death, John in 1664, William in 1665, indicates that they were close to the same age and most likely they were brothers rather than father and son. From the records of the Ark and the Dove, John is known to have had a brother named, Richard who married Ann _____ ?.

Page 1:

John Neville who came over on "The Ark and The Dove" was the founder of the Neville Family in America; a man of good family in his native country of England and being of an active and energetic disposition, determined to seek a fortune in the new world.

The valor of his descendants in the male lines in every war waged in this country and the domestic virtues in the female lines are the best tributes that can be paid to the courage and good qualities of John Neville who, with his brother, Richard, landed on St. Clements Isle the 25th March 1634.

It is clear from the land records of Maryland that John Neville was a planter residing at The Clefts on the west side of the Patuxent River in St. Mary's County, now Colvert; possessed of some means for at four years before he made any demands upon the Lord Manor for lands due him under the law for transporting himself in 1634, and his wife, Bridget, in 1639, into the province of Maryland. By his affidavit dated 8 November 1659, he states that he transported his first wife, Bridget Thorsley (Thornbay), an English woman, some twenty years previous. Se Liber 4, Folio 186, Land Warrant Office, Annapolis, Md.

John Neville (Nevills - Nevils) born ca 1612 in England, died June 1664 in Colvert Co., Md., married 1st, in England, about 1638, Bridget Thorsley (Thornbay) who died about 1643-44.

By the first marriage two children were born, viz:

- A1 James Neville, born 1640 at The Clift in Colvert County, Md. died 1696-1700; married Elizabeth Both believed killed by Indians. He settled in Northampton County, Va., in 1660-61, where 22 March 1662, (? should be 1662), he obtained a Warrant for 1300 acres of land (Liber 4, Folio 339, Land Office, Richmond, Va.) It is believed that he married in Northampton County, settling later in Isle of Wight County on 6 March 1674.
- A2 Eleanor (Ellen) Neville, born about 1642 at The Clefts, died 1672, married John Lambert, son of John Lambert, Sr. John was a cooper by trade; lived in Charles County, Md., where he died between 1714 and 1717.

Page 63:

John Neville married 2nd, 1646, Ann who died 1649 and by whom he had:

- A3 John Neville, born about 1647 at The Clefts, died November 1674, Tolbert County where his will is recorded in Liber 2, Folio 358, dated 15 October 1674, proven November 14th, 1674. The will recites the fact that he, John Neville, was late of Colbert County. No mention is made of either wife or children. To Richard Tillman, gentleman of Tolbert County he leaves a mourning ring. The residue of his estate he leaves to Patrick Sullivan, an Executor. His will is witnessed by Ralph Blackwell and James Blackhurst.

John Neville transported his third wife, Johanna (Joan) Porter from England and in 1651 he demanded four hundred acres of land which had been assigned by George Ackrick and one hundred acres for transportation of Johanna Porter, his new wife, and on 1 August 1651 "A Warrant was issued to lay out for John Neville five hundred acres upon the Wicookomico (Now Wicomico) River in Charles County". (Liber A, B, H, Folio 241, Land Office of Maryland).

John Neville died in January 1664 and in July 1664 his will bearing date of 7 January 1664 was proven and in same was mentioned his wife, Johanna, and their son, William; his daughter, Ellen Lambert, wife of John Lambert of Charles County, and appointed his son, William, and his son-in-law, John

Lambert, his Executors (Will Record in Libr 1, No. E Folio 87. Letters of Testamentary Provincial Wills Office, Annapolis). On March 24, 1664/5, his personal estate was appraised at 51,153 pounds of tobacco.

By 1662, John Neville owned the title of Gentleman and was so styled.

By 13 August 1666, the widow Joanna had married Thomas Hussey. Gentleman, son of the Rev. John Hussey of Harby, Lincolnshire. Prior to this marriage, the widow Neville had purchased additional lands in Charles County, on Wicomico Ricer (Liver C, No. 1 and 150)

Issue of John and Joanna:

- A4 Rachel Neville, before 13 November 1677, married Michael Ashford, a carpenter and planter of Nanjemoy Hundred; titled Captain. By 1726 he was living in Stafford County, Va.; probably died in Prince William Co., Va., in 1734.
- A5 William Neville, born about 1650, lived with his Mother on the Wicomico River in Charles County. In 1666, then not over sixteen years of age, he went to Isle of Wight and Nansemond Counties, Va.

Page 64:

There he married Martha by whom he had:

B1 John Neville

B2 Benjamin Neville

Quite possibly he was a mariner in addition to being an extensive property holder; he was married 28 October 1694 to Sarah Noble in Salem, Massachusetts, by the Rev. Thomas Hartshone.

As of August 17, 1666, Mr. William Neville of ~~Port~~ Tobacco conveyed "Huckle Berry Swamp" 300 acres to Thomas Mathews, Gent. In the body of the deed refers to Joane as the wife of William. (which leads the researcher to believe that William Neville was married three times)

SUMMARY:

- Item #1: John Neville married first Bridget in 1638. If he then was the father of William, (Isle of Wight land holder in 1642-3) he could not have been born before 1639 and would have been only five years of age in 1643.
- Item #2: John Nevill had a son William born about 1650 by wife Joanna. It is not likely that John would have named two sons William even though he had three wives. This son would have been born too late to have been a land holder in Isle of Wight Co., Va. in 1642 and dead by 1665.

Reynolds of Isle of Wight

Christopher Reynolds, ancestor of this family, came over in the "John and Francis" in 1622. This may have been before the Indian Massacre at Edwards Bennett's plantation in Isle of Wight, March 22, 1622, for at the Census taken in Warrascoyack (Isle of Wight) Feb. 16, 1623, he was shown as one of the survivors living on Bennett's plantation called Bennett's Welcome. There were fifty-three persons killed at his plantation, and the survivors, among whom was Christopher Reynolds, numbered only 33. (17C. p. 35-37.) He is shown in the muster at Edward Bennett's plantation taken 7 February 1625, and it is stated he came on the "John & Francis" in 1622.

Before the General Court held at Jamestown March 18, 1625, "Christopher Reynolds, sworne and examined sayeth that he did see and read Peter Collins indenture and that he was bound to serve Mr. Bennett four years." (M.C.G. C. p. 97)

This shows Christopher Reynolds was well educated, for few persons could read and write in those days.

It is shown in Edward Bennett's muster of 1625 that Peter Collins came over on the "Adams" in 1621.

On Sept. 15, 1636, Christopher Reynolds patented 450 acres near Pagan Creek. (17C. p. 87) In 1634 he bought 100 acres "in the bottom of Warrisquick Bay and sold it to Peter Hull May 1, 1639.

Christopher Reynolds made his will, May 1, 1654, as follows;

"... to son CHRISTOPHER land that Richard Jordan liveth on..... to son JOHN land near swamp when he is 20 to son RICHARD, land I live on when 21 to day. ABASHA, I have given her a portion already to dau. ELIZABETH ... cattle .. to George Rivers 1 heifer to child wife goeth with Wife Elizabeth to be Exrx. and to bring up JOHN nad RICHARD my sons until they are 16. Teste, Sylvester Bullen, Anthony Matthews.

Christopher Reynolds is shown in a published Reynolds pedigree as a son of George Reynolds and Tomasine Church, born 1611 at Gravesend, England. No references are given. If Christopher was born in 1611 and came to Virginia in 1622, he would have been only 11 years of age at the time of his arrival. He testified as a witness in the General Court in 1626. He seems to have been a grown man at that time.

Children:

- I. CHRISTOPHER, mentioned first in will seems to have been the eldest son. He patented 350 acres in Isle of Wight, Nov. 25, 1657 "beginning at miles end of land patented by Christopher Reynolds, decd., running to land lately in possession of Mr. Nutt." (C.P. 363)
- Giles Driver on Mar. 12, 1657, patented 200 acres in Isle of Wight "beginning on the Cypress Swamp corner to 750 acres belonging to Ambrose Bennett's heir " for transportation of 4 persons, among whom was ELIZABETH REYNOLDS (C.P. 365) 100 acres were added to this patent Jan. 13, 1661, beginning at the swamp which parts CHRISTOPHER REYNOLDS' and JOHN REYNOLDS' land. (C.P. 365) It seems that Christopher² Reynolds was probably alive in 1661. He may have moved to Nansemond as he does not seem to appear any more in the Isle of Wight records.
- II. John ² (Christopher ¹) made his will March 11, 1668..."to be buried as 'Dear Brother' see fit... Bro. George Rivers to have cow... Bro. Richard Reynolds... cattle and land... Sister Jane Reynolds, 1 cow to sister Elizabeth Rivers... cows and pigs... to Robert Driver a brown steer.... to Eliz. the right to administer the estate of his brother John Reynolds, according to the will of the latter. The sureties on his bond were Benjamin Beale and Ambrose Bennett. Richard Reynolds witnessed a deed of Lidia Silvester, Sept. 8, 1673, as Richard Reynolds, Sr. He and his wife Joyce witnessed a deed of John and Mary Luther (Lothor), Oct. 1, 1693. Richard Reynolds of Isle of Wight sold to Wm. Butler of Nansemond 220 acres, part of a patent of 720 acres Cabin Branch, June 9, 1697. (17C. 640) Richard² Reynolds, Sr., patented 380 acres in 1681. (17C. 696). He may have been a Justice of the County Court, for in the Quit Rents of 1704, he was holding 853 acres as Richard Reynolds, Esquire. (17C. 700) This title was usually used to designate members of the Council. On June 8, 1698, Richard Reynolds, Sr. Of L. P. sold to Richard Reynolds, Jr., for 13,000 lbs. of tbco. part of a patent of 380 acres 1 April 1681, now in occupation of Richard Reynolds Sr., and three other persons. (17C. 634) It will be noted that this was not a gift, whereas the following deeds to his two daughters were apparently gifts: Richard² Reynolds and Joyce, his wife, on Sept. 9, 1706, "for love of Jane Casey, my daughter, and Richard Casey, her husband", sold a tract adjacent to Tristram Norsworthy "part of land I live on. "Wits; Arthur Smith, Richard Reynolds, Jr., Thomas Joyce (D.B. 2-1704-15)

On Oct. 9, 1706, Richard Reynolds gave his daughter, Elizabeth Reynolds, land on Mill Creek between plantation where Widow Harris lives and where James Hamblin lives. Wife Joyce relinquished dower right. Wits., Arthur Smith, Richard Casey, Sarah Williams. (Id. - 1704-1715)

1. CHRISTOPHER REYNOLDS, the first known of the family was born circa 1530 in County Kent, England. He m. - and settled in London where he and his sons engaged in trade and commerce. A study of early English records indicate that he had a brother - Nathaniel Reynolds - also engaged with his company. A sister Dorothy, who d. 21 November 1552, m. 11 August 1567 William Tilghman, son of Richard and Julian (Newman) Tilghman, of County Kent. The record of the Tilghman Family is available in the DAR Library and the Library of Congress.

In addition to the many official sources of information that have been consulted in the computation of the REYNOLDS FAMILY, much assistance was graciously given by the late Mrs. A. C. Rippier who served so many years as the Secretary of the Reynolds Family Association.

The names of the children of Christopher and that of his wife are not known completely. His known or identifiable issue are not necessarily listed in order of birth. Issue: George, Christopher, Mary who d. y.: John, Thomas, Cornelius, Richard, b. circa 1575, Robert, William, and several daughters.

In a later publication, dated April 1, 1959, Mr. Tillman made the following comments on his Reynolds research:

CHRISTOPHER REYNOLDS
And His Descendants

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The name Reynolds, also Spelled in America as Runnels, Runals, etc., is of Norman origin, and comes from the family of Renard. The family is of great antiquity, claiming descent from Reynolds - son of Grethferth - The Dane - King of Northumberland. Grethferth and his two sons were driven from England circa 944 and took shelter in Normandy. His descendant Fitz-reynolds - meaning son of - returned to England with WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR.

More than 30 years has been spent by the author on compiling this genealogical record. Research was made in U. S. Census Returns, Family Bibles, other published works, etc. The thanks of the author is extended to the many individual members of the family that assisted in rounding up data for the book. Indexing is by paragraph rather than by page.

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
