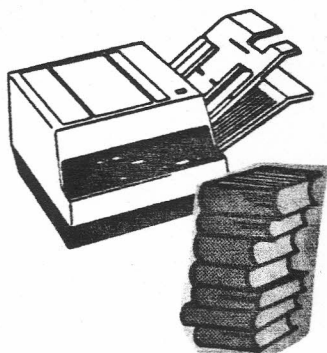

The name Reynolds is of Norman origin and comes from a family of Renard. "Burke's Landed Gentry" states family of Reynolds is of great antiquity claiming descent from Reynolds' son of Grethferth the Dane, King of Northumberland, who was driven from England with two sons, A. D. 944, and took refuge in Normandy. His descendant Reynolds, Fitz Reynolds (Fitz meaning son of) returned to England with William, Duke of Normandy, known as William the Conqueror in 1066 and was in the battle of Hastings.

The Reynolds line is to be found through all the different reigns and kingdoms of England. The name Reynolds means son of Reynold, the original being Rainhold, a Teutonic personal name of great antiquity. Rainaldur or Rainold, was a landholder in Exeter, Devonshire, generally admitted to come from the old German Reginold. The name Runnel is a Scotch term meaning small brook or riverlet, although this originated from the English Reynolds. Many families in Ireland bear this name. There are forty-nine different spellings or corruptions of the name and over thirty Coats of Arms.

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REV. FRANK T. B. REYNOLDS

Rev. Frank Ten Broeck Reynolds, son of the late John and Ellen P. (Beaver) Reynolds was born at Ulster Park, Ulster County, N. Y.; married (1st), in 1899, Miss Harmonia C. Jones, daughter of John R. and Jennie (Perrine) Jones of Ulster Park, N. Y., who died in February, 1914; in June, 1916, he married (2nd) his present wife, Mrs. Annie (Wall- ing) Welch, widow of the late Thaddeus P. Welch, and daughter of Thomas Burrows and Catherine Patterson (Applegate) Walling of Phalanx, Monmouth County, N. J. His theological training was received at the Reformed Episcopal Theological Seminary, Philadelphia, Pa., Class of 1899. Mr. Reynolds began his work as a Minister of the Gospel in the beautiful city of New Westminster, British Columbia, on Sunday, June 25, 1899, when he was inducted rector of St. Paul's Reformed Episcopal Church, which he continued to serve for more than two years, during which time he had the pleasure of seeing the membership and influence of the church enlarge, as well as the indebtedness upon the new church removed. It was while at New Westminster, Mr. Reynolds frequently gave illustrated lectures in several institutions and to the firemen of the city and fraternal societies. In November, 1901, he accepted the call to become the rector of Christ Church, Reformed Episcopal, Toronto, Ontario. This congregation had, through a train of unfortunate circumstances, lost its church property and was much discouraged, but rallied under the leadership of this new rector and put in operation plans whereby, in the course of a few years, this valuable property was reclaimed. While much time and strength had to be spent on the financial and material side of the work, the spiritual was not forgotten and the addition to the membership of the church was substantial. Because of ill health that followed an attack of scarlet fever, it was considered advisable that Mr. Reynolds seek a milder climate than that of Toronto, and in the autumn of 1905, he resigned as rector of Christ Church and a few weeks later he was called to become the minister of the Reformed Church of Spotswood, which he served for six years. Some marked features of his work there were the conducting of preaching services in the school houses of the surrounding neighborhood and the establishing of Sunday schools and the development of a boys' club in Spotswood. This latter organization followed a rather original program, combining religious, social and physical activities.

Accepting a call from the Reformed Church of Glenville, Schenectady County, N. Y., he began ministry in October, 1911, and during two years of service the church property was greatly improved. An outstanding event of his ministry at Glenville was the celebration of the centennial of the church, which brought together from far distant points, former members and friends of this historic church, that had sent seven men into the Christian ministry.

In October 1913, Rev. Mr. Reynolds took charge of the Church of Keyport, N. J., and through the cooperation of his congregation, the influence of the church had been widely extended; the property greatly improved and beautified. The church has become a pioneer in certain lines of religious and social activities.

His vision of the Kingdom of God has been such as to inspire in each field of his ministry greatly increased offerings for the denominational and benevolent funds of the Church. While not forgetting that the great work to which he has been called, is to preach, teach and minister to his people, has found time for other interests, notably the work of the Monmouth County Bible Society and the Monmouth County Historical Association, he being secretary of both of these organizations.

At the request of Rev. W. H. S. Demarest, D. D., president of the New Brunswick Theological Seminary, Mr. Reynolds contributed a special

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article to the volume "Ter-Centenary Studies," the subject being, "The Church in Monmouth County."

During the World War, he was very active, especially the Red Cross, having organized the Keyport Branch and served as its Chairman throughout the war. Was also called upon many times to deliver patriotic addresses in the interest of Red Cross; Liberty Loan and U. S. C. A. drives. Has also taken an active interest in Scouting. Mr. Reynolds has always been very much interested in Civic affairs, served as Trustee and Secretary of the Keyport Public Library Association for several years. Is the Chaplain of the Eagle Hose Company No. 4. His interest in Genealogical matters is shown by his long membership in the Reynolds Family Association of which he has been Chaplain for the past twelve years. Also belongs to several fraternal societies.

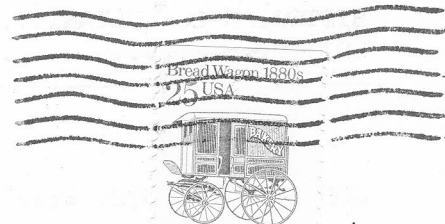
