Owego, NY, 28 March 1911. Last officer of Company I dead. Lieut. Peter E. Reynolds, 79, passes away in Owego home following paralytic stroke. Peter E. Reynolds died Monday afternoon [27 Mar] at 2:45 o'clock at his home on North Avenue, aged 79 years. He is survived by his wife, three daughters, E. Estella Reynolds, Mrs. John Lillie, and Minnie M. Reynolds, and by one son, Eugene M. Reynolds, all of Owego, also by three brothers, William Reynolds of Gloversville, Edward Reynolds of Middleburg, and John Reynolds of West Fulton. Mr. Reynolds...was a veteran of the Civil War, having served in the 50th Regiment, Company I, New York State Volunteers, and was commissioned lieutenant. He was the last surviving commissioned officer of his company. He was a member of the Truesdell Post, G.A.R., of this village. The funeral will be held from his residence on North avenue Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the Rev. R.A. Vose, D.D., of the Baptist Church officiating. Burial will be in the family plot in Evergreen Cemetery. Truesdell Post, G.A.R., will have charge of services at the grave. [Obit submitted by Andrew N. Smith, Greenville SC.]

THE TALE OF A BOY AND HIS RANCH

Excerpts From Kent Biffle's Texana

Lambshead -- Watt took us bucking across the 62 square mile ranch in his Ford Bronco. Parts of the ranch had a familiar look. Those parts used to pose frequently as scenery in Marlboro commercials.

At a steep drop overlooking the Clear Fork of the Brazos far below, I deduced that Watt, who is 90 years old, improvises roads as he goes along.

Steering around big boulders and over smaller ones, he drove us down through some timbered bottomland and snuck into a flyway of dazzling Monarch butterflies. A flurry of sunny snow.

"Watt, this is mighty pretty," I told him.

He grinned. His pride in the ranch is a likeable obsession.

He's a VIP. Two books about the man and his ranch will appear next month.

Watt is Watkins Reynolds Matthews, Shackelford County's most eligible bachelor for most of a century. He's spent his life on the family ranch, working cattle and sleeping on a cot in the bunkhouse. Well, he did go off to Princeton for four years to get an economics degree (class of 1921). He pretends he stole that degree. Don't believe it.

Watt missed being a classmate of F. Scott Fitzgerald by a couple of years, but he vividly recalls luminaries such as Willa Cather, Albert Einstein and Woodrow Wilson.

At Watt's office in the cook shack I saw current copies of the New Yorker and the Economist. His jeans and a beat-up hat disguise a sophisticated and intellectual old cowboy.

The Interwoven Bunch. Historians have made Watt's Clear Fork country about half famous. His family's ranch inspires writers. At least three members of Watt's own family have written books about the ranch. One was counted in A.C. Greene's Fifty Best Books on Texas.

In case you're behind on Clear Fork Lit, I'll elaborate.

I've seen people laugh at the puzzling title Lambshead Before Interwoven. Sounds absurd. But it's serious as a wide load on a narrow road.

The title assumes that as dedicated readers of Texas books we're all familiar with Interwoven, one of the major publishing events of 1936, the Texas centennial year.

Interwoven tells the story of two Texas ranching clans named Reynolds and Matthews. To say the families were close is understatement.

On Christmas Day 1876, Watt's mother, Sallie Reynolds, married Watt's father, John Matthews. By 1883, four more Reynolds brothers had married into the Matthews family.

Together, the combined families pushed back the Comanche frontier and defended their holdings on the Clear Fork.

Interwoven was written by Watt's mother, Sallie Reynolds Matthews. Her style and grasp of history won her raves from high-powered critics and, eventually, a spot in A.C. [Green's] hit parade [of Texas books].

Interwoven told her story up to the birth of her youngest son, Watt, on Feb. 1, 1899.

Sallie helped her husband John and the others put together and, moreover, hold together pastures that became known as Lamshead.

Be it said, Lamshead Ranch doesn't deal in sheep. The only sheep on the place are the ovine lawn mowers that keep down the weeds around the headquarters.

Lamshead Ranch started with longhorns for trail-driving but now specializes in Hereford beef cattle. The ranch is also a home on the range for roaming buffalo, new generations of longhorns, whitetails, wild hogs and turkey -- not to mention rattlers and coyotes. And there's oil. "A pumpjack makes a fine cross with a Hereford," Watt says.

Lamshead got its name indirectly from Thomas Lamshead, an early settler. He was an English farmer who left his name on a creek before he "doughted out," as they say out here, and left for parts unknown. Watt guesses the Comanches may have killed the Englishman.

Anyhow, Lamshead Creek and Lamshead Valley existed before the Reynolds and Matthews families became "Interwoven."

Last weekend Watt drove me over Lamshead for five or six hours showing me the points of interest. He has preserved or restored all the old structures, several dating back to the 1850s.

He showed me the site of old Camp Cooper, where nothing remains. The post's soldiers guarded a Comanche Reservation, which didn't last either. Watt says it was a terrible location for a frontier post. A lieutenant colonel named Robert E. Lee commanded it.

Watt could go on forever, I guess, about Lamshead Ranch and Clear Fork history. He should write a book. He refuses.

But, just in time for Christmas, two books on Watt are coming out of different chutes.

The Texas State Historical Association (TSHA) is bringing out Watt Matthews of Lamshead, a 140-page photo essay by Laura C. Wilson of Dallas (TSHA, 2/306 Richardson Hall, University Station, Austin TX 78712). A beauty in black and white, the book, priced at \$39.95, will be out Nov. 1.

A few weeks later, the new Hardin-Simmons University Press of Abilene will unveil Lawrence Clayton's Watkins Reynolds Matthews. Dr. Clayton is Hardin-Simmons' dean of arts and sciences. He's an expert on ranching and the Clear Fork country. His 132-page volume, with drawings by Paul Cameron Smith, will be issued in a gorgeous limited edition.

Watt showed me the family plot on Lamshead Ranch where he plans to be buried -- but not soon. He has tough genes. One of his uncles, George T. Reynolds, walked around with an arrowhead embedded in his back for 15 years.

A regular visitor to Lamshead Ranch is Mrs. Lucile Brittingham of Fort Worth. She drops by to see Watt, her kid brother. She's 99.

TANGLED BRANCHES

JAMES NICHOLAS REYNOLDS

In a recent issue of RR there is a "stonewall" about Hamilton Reynolds who married Henrietta Hamilton:

The information is similar to the family of my 4th great-grandfather, and I wonder if there is a connection. I think that it is possible that these men could be brothers. Hamilton was born in NC in 1863 and Nicholas in 1865. Both came to west Tennessee, Lauderdale County being

just a bit further west than McNairy County.

My 4th great-grandfather James Nicholas Reynolds, of NC, was referred to as both James and Nicholas, sometimes in the same document, came to W TN (Lauderdale Co., then Tipton) by 1829, where he received a land grant. Census records show that he and his wife Rachel both were born in NC, he abt 1765, she abt 1776. There is a (Wake, then Albemarle) NC marriage bond for James Reynolds and Rachel Shamblee in 1795, but I can find no other trace of this couple for some years. Several ch were b to our James Nicholas and Rachel after 1810, but we have no trace of other ch, and that seems strange for a couple in 1795, so this bond may not be for our James Nicholas and Rachel. Enclosed is a copy of NC Archives Rev War record for one Jas Reynolds, pvt, 10th Regt, Montforts Co, NC Line, enlisted 26 May 78; register prepared at Philadelphia 28 Jul 1791.

Land records in (Lauderdale) TN indicate that James Nicholas Reynolds obtained land in (Tipton) TN (part of which later became (Lauderdale) in 1829. Later census records indicate that his wife's name was Rachel and show that both were born in NC. These census records indicate that James Nicholas Reynolds was born in 1765. Rachel's birth dates differ in census records, with one indicating that she was born in 1776, others generally indicated that her birth was between 1780-90. The only marriage record found that could apply to this couple is one in (Wake) NC, showing a marriage bond for James Reynolds and Rachel Shamblee in 1795. Later land deeds in (Lauderdale) TN refer to James Reynolds and Nicholas Reynolds in the same deed as the same person.

These marriages are listed in (Lauderdale) TN records. Some of the Reynoldses listed could be the children of James Nicholas Reynolds and his wife Rachel.

MORE TANGLED BRANCHES

Mary Runnels/Reynolds Darby ca 1790 (Union) SC...would not surprise me if they were part of Quaker families. Re (Union) SC records: Jeremiah Cooper, brother of my Stacy Cooper, per will gave land in 1795 in (Laurens) SC to Mary Runnels. I believe this probably was my Mary Runnels Darby or her mother and my Coopers were part of these Quaker families. My Carter, Cooper, Peerson, Townsend families were all Quaker families involved with each other in the early 1700's in (Bucks) PA. My ancestor Richard Carter and related Enoch Peerson, Jr. moved before 1750 to (Frederick) VA with other of these Bucks and Chester PA Quaker families and by early 1770's my Carter, Cooper, Pearson, and Townsend families were still involved with each other in the (Laurens/Union) SC area and in the 1830's/1840's my Harris, Carter, and Cooper families had moved into (Cobb/Paulding) GA. I am trying to find out if my William Harris Sr who had moved into (Laurens) SC ca 1771, which was also about the same time my Richard Carter also moved into (Laurens) SC from (Frederick) VA, was the son of the William Harry/Harris in (Frederick) VA ca 1750 and how he traced back to this Quaker Harry/Harris family in (Chester) PA. Per a (Frederick) VA warrant, my William Harry/Harris and this William Reynolds were living near William Stewart and Jesse Pugh, who I have already learned traced or connected back to (Chester) PA Pugh and Stewart Quaker families. Recently someone sent me a page from a 1732 tax list of (Chester) PA indicating that a William Harris was living near a William and Henry Reynolds in (Chester) PA. Can anyone help me determine if the William Reynolds in (Frederick) VA ca 1750 was the same and/or related to the William Reynolds in (Chester) PA in 1732?

A CIVIL WAR DIARY

When we reflect on the bloody carnage of America's Civil War, the names of Lincoln, Davis, Grant, Lee flash before us, all legends in the pages of history. Too little has been written of the common men, ordinary citizens who took up arms and bore the brunt of the fighting.

This is the story of the unsung heroes as told in the diary of a Union soldier, CARLOS PEMBROOK REYNOLDS, who relates the horror and the humor of war, from the front lines to a hospital prison camp in the Confederate capital.

Reynolds was born in western Pennsylvania in 1841, the son of Irish immigrant parents, and grew up on the rugged Allegheny forest.

At age 20, Reynolds joined the State Guard. After a year of inactivity he could wait no longer. He resigned from the Guard, enlisted in the Union Army and soon was at the front.

In 1864 Reynolds, an infantryman in the 5th Corps, fought in the Wilderness campaign in Virginia, north of Richmond. In the third day of fighting, his company was surprised--and nearly annihilated--by Rebel soldiers. Reynolds was wounded and nearly executed by the Rebels. A Confederate officer intervened to save his life. He spent more than three months as a prisoner of war before being exchanged.

The following is Reynolds' story, as he wrote it. Certain day-to-day entries of insignificant details have been eliminated. Reynolds abandoned the daily entries in his diary in December of 1864 and wrote the rest "from memory."

May 4 -- Struck tents at midnight and marched to near Wilderness Tavern. It was a hard day's march, but grand sight to see long lines of artillery and infantry marching with bayonets gleaming in the sun.

May 5 -- Marched at 7 o'clock and at 11 o'clock made a bayonet charge on the enemy and drove them to Gordonsville, Va., but lost many of our brave boys.

May 7 -- Were attacked by Rebels at daybreak. We were supporting our battery and drove the Rebels back.

May 8 -- Marched at 7 last night over the battleground where the fire had run through the woods and burned the wounded. Such a sight, God grant, I may never see again. Marched all night (was asleep most of the time). We charged the Rebels this morning without breakfast. Was wounded in the right groin. Our men being driven back, I was taken prisoner.

May 9 -- Lay in Kershaw's North Carolina field hospital. My wound was very painful.

May 10 -- Lay in hospital. Heavy cannonading. In the evening the Rebel band played Dixie and Bonnie Blue Flag, and our band played Star Spangled Banner and the White

Blue.

May 19 -- Left field hospital at Spotsylvania Courthouse. They put four of us into a government wagon and started us without any breakfast. Drove us over corduroy roads. One man died on the way, about noon. He bled to death. A darkie gave us 3 or 4 biscuits when we stopped, and the Rebel teamster divided his supper with us.

May 21 -- Lay at station all day. Very hungry. Got to Richmond in the night (while I lay in the hot sun at the station, the depot was burned). This darkie refused me anything to eat until the Rebel officers were out of sight, and he gave me the cornbread and wouldn't let me pay him.

May 30 -- Very warm today. Hope we'll be paroled this week.

June 8 -- Same old thing. Very long days these. My rations are low. I feel some better.

June 13 -- Nothing new today. All that I can do is to hope that our stay will be as short as it is unpleasant.

July 4 -- Today is the glorious old 4th of July. I could not but wish I was at home. A tailor from Baltimore made us a flag. He got the red and white and blue somewhere. It was about 2 feet long and 1 wide. After the Rebel steward left us, we had a small celebration. Three cheers, not loud but from the heart, and then we had to smuggle the flag.

July 9 -- Today quite cool. Saw an arm taken off a German laying next to me on the left.

July 11 -- Day passed off like many others. The old German died last night after a great deal of suffering.

July 23 -- The day is reasonably cool. Some excitement about being exchanged. God grant that there may some truth in the report.

Aug 10 -- Some talk of exchange. Hope it may be true, but have been disappointed so often that I've about given up hope.

Aug 11 -- A day of excitement. The worst cases were paroled and are to be north tomorrow, but I'm not among the numbers.

Aug 21 -- Today is a day of excitement. We are examined and we are to be exchanged and sent north in the morning. Praise God from whom all blessings flow.

Aug 22 -- The happiest day of my life. I was sent into our lines and saw the old flag for the first time in nearly four months. As we saw our glorious banner waving over the flag of truce, we broke down and cried like children.

Aug 24 -- Arrived at Annapolis, and after being washed and dressed, we were sent to the naval hospital. The change from our former condition into our present condition I can only illustrate by saying, "Out of hell into heaven."

(From late August until October, Reynolds' diary reveals feelings of impatience and boredom with his status.)

Nov 8 -- Went to election and voted for Old Abe.

Nov 14 -- Had a grand procession in honor of the

election of Abraham Lincoln.

(The rest of this diary is written from memory.)

Was sent to camp distribution in Washington. From there was sent to my regiment at Hatches Run near City Point, Va. Did guard and picket duty through the winter.

On April 1 was fought the battle of Five Forks. We captured 7,000 prisoners and smashed the Rebel right. The Battle of Five Forks ended the fighting of our corps, except skirmishes.

In the p.m. they announced the surrender of Lee's army. I will not attempt to describe the joy of our Army. Men went wild, shook hands, hugged one another, climbed trees. Some of our most dignified officers beat the drum, played the fife and acted like schoolboys. Our corps had the honor of receiving the surrender of the Rebel army.

We were within 30 yards of McLean House, where the surrender took place. Saw Gen. Lee and Col. Marshall when they mounted their horses and started for Richmond after the surrender.

After the surrender we marched back toward Richmond. On April 14 it was rumored that Lincoln was assassinated. At first we thought it merely a rumor. When we realized it was true, all was sorrow and indignation. Strong men broke down and cried like children, to think our noble, kind and generous president had been slain.

We marched through Richmond on our way to Washington through Fredricksburg and some of the old battlefields. We marched to Arlington and went into camp. We were in the grand review at Washington, and on the review stand was President Johnson and his cabinet and Generals Grant, Sheridan, Sherman, Logan. It was a grand sight.

I am now 78 years of age in this year 1920, with good health and reasonably active for a man of my age. The world has used me well, perhaps better than I deserve.
