REPORT OF THE 1993 RFA ANNUAL REUNION

25-26 June 1993

Arlington VA/Washington DC

This year's reunion, held in Arlington VA, was a great success. The agenda arranged by Sybil "Lee" Taylor held something of interest for everyone. And, of course, meeting new cousins and greeting "old" ones, makes every reunion very special. The festivities this year were bittersweet, as members shared the sadness of the tragic death of Margaret Lee, mother of Margaret Reynolds, wife of our president, Dr. Glenn Reynolds. The previous issue detailed the "fun" days prior to the actual reunion on June 25 & 26, and contained a list of those in attendance. This report will provide a summary of the reunion events and business.

The reunion opened on Friday morning, bright and early, for meeting and mingling over coffee. Members and guests continued to arrive throughout the morning. The RFA archives were immediately available for research and it seems every one got right down to the business of searching for those Reynolds ancestors. The RFA copy machine was set up for members to use, and it got a thorough work-out during those two days. This year there were six line coordinators available to members of the various lines, and tables were set up for family line materials and discussion. The line coordinators on hand were: Vera Bunkoff for John of Watertown MA, Pat and Bob Daniels for John of Lyme CT, Justus Reynolds for Thomas of York Co. VA, Marilyn Newton for Henry of Lancaster Co. PA, Lee Taylor for Christopher and Thomas, both of Isle of Wight Co. VA, and Sue Clement for Eleonora of Middleboro MA and William of Duxbury MA.

A separate room was available for several mini-seminars that were held at various times during the two meeting days. During the morning on Friday a seminar on the topic of Archival Photography was presented by Russell Lindholm. Russ's presentation covered identification of types of photographs, restoration, and preservation, as well as how-to advice. In the afternoon, Louise Lindholm gave a presentation on the Winthrop Fleet of 1630. Louise provided information on the voyage from planning to settlement, in England and in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Later in the afternoon, Betty Jane Reynolds gave a talk on Scotland, where she has travelled extensively.

Friday evening was open, and members gathered in groups to dine at the various local restaurants. The finds of the day and week were reviewed, and family lore was exchanged over dinner.

Saturday morning found the group just as eager and excited as ever. A few chose to head back into Washington for one last chance at the favorite research spot, i.e. the Library of Congress or the DAR Library. Most, however, were back hitting the books and papers in the RFA archives, and putting the copier through its paces. Later in the morning, Sue Clement presented a seminar on Acceptable Documentation Standards. This was a discussion group that tried to clearly define documentation and proof versus hearsay and anecdotal information. Participants shared information on various sources of documentation, both common and unusual, and the needs of the RFA in terms of documentation of sources was explained.

The annual membership business meeting was held Saturday afternoon. The Executive Secretary called the meeting to order in the absence of the President and Executive Vice-President. Reports were presented by the officers in attendance.

Nancy Smith, Vice President for Line Coordination, reported that she had sent letters to all the line coordinators, and had updates on the year's activities from 10 of the 11. Members were advised that Lt. Col. John F. Reynolds had asked to be relieved of his role with the Christopher of Virginia line during the year. This line was picked up by Lee Taylor.

Mary Hurd, Treasurer, distributed a summary of the RFA's financial status. The balance on hand on 18 June 1993 was \$5380.19, although this did not reflect the cost of the 1993 reunion. [See below.]

A brief membership report was given by Sue Clement for Steve Roth. As of 1 June 1993, the RFA had 491 members. The non-renewals for 1993 had not yet been deleted from this total, as current policy allows renewal for the current year up to June 1st of that year.

Sue Clement, Executive Secretary, reported on her activities during the year. Primarily, the focus was the publishing and printing of the RFA Centennial Collection. Membership files have been organized, inquiries have been received and answered, and organization and management of the RFA archives and computerization project is on-going.

Lee Taylor, Vice President for Publications, reported that 177 of the 300 copies printed of the Centennial Collection have been sold to date. The newsletter will

continue in its current format. Inquiries had been made about whether or not another page could be added, but an increase in size would significantly increase the mailing rate.

New business started with the offer of members to host and plan future reunions as follows: 1994, Chicago IL, hosted by Louise Lindholm; 1995, Salt Lake City UT, hosted by Bob and Pat Daniels; 1996, Bangor ME, hosted by Margie Reynolds. Members unanimously accepted these offers.

Sue Clement and Lee Taylor presented an explanation of the current status of the RFA archives, and what is necessary to keep the project of computerizing going.

Curtis Reynolds has recently donated to RFA a MAC to DOS conversion program, so members using Apple Macintosh computers can now submit disks with material, and the RFA will be able to convert them to IBM format for use.

The need for members to become involved to assist in the project was discussed, and areas for assistance were identified as: typing of obituaries, vital records, and other source material; proofreading; entering family lines into "Personal Ancestral File" computer program. The following members volunteered to assist in these areas: Barbara Moore, Marilyn Newton, Vera Bunkoff, Norris Reynolds, Monica Reynolds, Joann Reynolds, Maxine Allen, Joyce Page, Nancy Smith, Margaret Leddy, Fran Clark, Bob and Pat Daniels, Margie Reynolds, John Bird.

Sue and Lee will be sending material to these members in the areas for which they volunteered. Much appreciation goes to these volunteers.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned.

A reception and banquet on Saturday evening provided the perfect ending for the reunion. A delicious buffet dinner was served. Following dinner, a drawing for door prizes was held. Marilyn Newton won an RFA color crest, Louise Lindholm won an RFA mug. The grand prize, donated by Margie Reynolds, was a basket filled with a wide variety of goodies from the State of Maine, and this was won by Monica Reynolds.

The guest speaker for the evening was Joan Barriage, cousin of RFA members Margaret Leddy and Rosemary Haller. Joan has lived in South Africa for many years, and spoke of the beauty, economy and culture of the country, as well as giving us some brief insight into the country's political difficulties. Her talk was entertaining and enlightening, and enjoyed by all.

The RFA financial records were reviewed by two non-officer members, and found to be in order.

The end of the banquet marked the end of another reunion. Goodbyes, as always, were difficult. But one comment was heard repeatedly, "See you next year in Chicago..."

Funeral services were conducted on 3 Nov. at Regan and Denny Funeral Home in South Glens Falls, followed by a Mass of Christian Burial at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Fort Edward. Rev. Bernard J. Aherne, pastor, was the celebrant. Burial will be private and the convenience of the family at Prospect Hill Cemetery, Argyle. Rev. Stephen Sziegethy will officiate. ANDREW CLEMENT, Swansea MA. Case [High School] 'fighters' save Swansea homes, lives. FIRE!! Don't be surprised if one of your fellow Case students saves you if there is a fire in your house. The Swansea Volunteer Fire Department has a junior corps and they are just as involved as the senior firemen. Senior Andrew Clement [son of RFA member Susan R. Clement] better known to his friends as Sid, has been involved in as many as 150 fires in Swansea. Clement has been a member of the fire department for almost two years.

"I had so much adrenalin running through me when I received my first call," said Clement. If you don't feel confident about having students on the fire department, don't worry. Each junior member receives six months of training. During this period, each volunteer learns how to use air packs, the different hoses, the jaws of life, and forceful entry. Clement said that he has used each piece of equipment at some time in his fire fighting experiences. Not only is the job fun and exciting, Clement said that it "gives you more respect for the community." In addition, Clement said he gets paid \$6.50 an hour for brush and grass fires from the state forestry fund. Clement said that the biggest fear for most firemen is to find one of their friends hurt or dead. "Around prom time I get especially nervous of receiving calls," he said. ...Clement recently became a member of the volunteer force when he turned 18. ...said that being a volunteer fireman does not affect their grades...actually teaches responsibility. In addition to responsibility, joining the fire department requires great dedication. All firefighters are required to carry beepers, but there are exceptions to this rule. "You don't have to carry beepers to school," said Clement, but admits to carrying it everywhere else. Clement first learned of the volunteer fire department through his father [Paul Clement]. [Case High School, Swansea MA "The Cardinal," Vol. 2, No. 4, 14 May 1993.] [Andrew is son of Paul and RFA Exec Sec'y Susan Clement.]

THE BUTLER-REYNOLDS-CHESSON HIGHBOY
BY FRED CHESSON, WATERBURY CT.

The Butler-Reynolds-Chesson Highboy was sold in January 1993 to the famous Wadsworth Athenaeum Museum in Hartford CT. It was an important feature in the March Colonial Furniture Exhibit.

It All Began When Nathan Cooke married Clarissa Electa Reynolds. Clarissa (113) was the daughter of Russell Reynolds (69) and Mary Castle. She was born in the Reynolds Bridge section of Plymouth CT on 4 Jul 1807. She was a descendant of John of Weymouth and Stonington.

On 31 May 1826 she wed Nathan Cooke of Waterbury. Nathan was born 4 Jan 1804, the son of Joseph Cook and Anna Bronson. Nathan was descended from Henry Cook an early settler of Salem MA. Nathan's great grandfather, Moses Cook Sr, was Waterbury's first murder victim, having been done in by a flatiron by an Indian by the name of Moses Paul, at a tavern brawl in Bethany Parish, New Haven, 7 Dec 1771. At Paul's execution in Sep 1772, the renown Indian Preacher Samson Occum delivered an impressive Hanging Sermon, having strong Temperance overtones, which was widely reported.

The only offspring of Nathan and Clarissa was Walter Hart cooke, born 30 Sep 1835. He married Jane D. "Jennie" McClintock on 27 Sep 1862 in New York City. Their children were Frederick Scoville Cooke (1872-1935), and Clara Whiting Cooke (1866-1949) who was born in Reynolds Bridge, where her father had a photographic studio. Nathan and Clarissa died within a day of each other in Oct 1892.

Clara Whiting Cooke married Frederick W. Chesson (1864-1905, born in London) in 1887. They had four sons; the eldest,, F.W. Chesson Jr. (6-1888 - 12-1944) being my father, who married Beatrice M. Olson (1891-1982) in Sep 1923. I was born 26 Dec 1929.

The Highboy was bequeathed to my grandmother, Clara Cooke Chesson (1866-1949) in late 1920 by her great aunt, Elizabeth Cooke Williams (Mrs. Charles F. Williams) late of Thomaston CT. The will is dated 11 Aug 1920. She died 6 Sep 1920, aged 73, leaving an estate valued at \$183,000. Article VIII states: "I give and bequeath unto Clara Cooke Chessonn of Waterbury, the sum of Five Thousand (\$5000) Dollars and the highboy which has been in the Reynolds Family for a number of years." The highboy appears in the Estate Inventory in the Thomaston Probate Court Records, Vol. 14, pp323-29, and was appraised at \$100. (The highboy

was appraised for insurance purposes in May 1986 for \$14,000, but several offers have lately been received for more than twice this figure.)

The highboy passed to her son Walter Chesson (1889-1972), then to my late mother Beatrice Olson Chesson (1891-1982) and then to myself.

My grandmother's grandmother, Clarissa Electa Reynolds (1807-1892) was a sister of Mrs. Williams' mother, Lorinda Edward Reynolds. She married Henry Foote, who was related to Admiral Foote of Civil War fame.

Their father was Russell (died 1870) who settled in what is now Reynolds Bridge, in southern Thomaston, then called Plymouth Hollow, part of Plymouth. He married Mary Castle on 16 Jan 1800. The Reynolds were also connected with theologian Jonathan Edwards. Russell and Mary also had daughters Pamela born 25 Aug 1801, and Emeline Sophronia b 11 Dec 1809. No registered male births are presently known.

The Highboy is late Queene Anne Style, 86" high, 40" wide, 20" deep, in two sections. External construction is of cherry, drawer sides and bottom of pine. The bottom section has one low, wide drawer, with three drawers grouped below. The center drawer has sell or scalloped carving. The legs are Cabriole Style with simple pad feet.

The Upper Section has a divided bonnet with scrolls and rosettes. In the center is a conical flame-type finial. Dentil-style molding outlines the three central upper drawers. The center drawer also has scalloped carving, with simple horizontal inlay of a light colored wood. There are a total of seven drawers in the upper section.

Drawer pulls are swinging curved brass rods, backed by simple stamped brass decorative plates. One lock mechanism is extant, but does not seem to be the original mechanism. Two drawers show evidence of minor repairs.

Atop the bonnet are two sets of carvings, one on each side. They read:

"S. Butler & c Wood'r" and "March ye 25th AD 1755"
 (Note: The first letter could be "J" or possibly "T".)

Robert F. Trent, former Curator of the Connecticut Historical Society wrote that the inscription and date indicate possible ownership by one Samuel Stone Butler (31 Jan 1726/7-1778) of Torrington and Harwinton CT, who married Goodwin of Windsor 19 Aug 1751. He mentioned a possible connection with cabinet maker William Manley, though the chest seemed more typical of Newton/Woodbury/Waterbury furniture makers.

WADDEL'S MARRIAGES IN SC AND GA

The original of "A Register of Marriages Celebrated and Solemnized by Moses Waddel, D.D., In SC and Ga" is in the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. These marriages date from 1795 through 1836. The register gives names of bride and groom, date and fee received. From 1819 to 1829 Dr. Waddel was the president of the University of Georgia. There were no Reynolds, by any spelling, in this register.

CHARLES F. REYNOLDS OF VA OR KY

My gr-gr-gr-grandfather Charles F. Reynolds, b 1795 VA or KY, m Nancy Goodman 6-1794. Their son, James Wiley b 3 Apr 1817 or 1819 in KY. James and family moved to AL in 1842; in fact I live on his old farm. I'm trying to find more about Charles F. and his children and his parents, etc. I'm pretty firm on James Wiley, and have details on his 8th child Robert Frank (4-8-1854), my gr-granddad.

CHARLES F. REYNOLDS, age 55, white male, b KY, listed 1850 census of KY, Simpson Co. house #543, with family: N. age 56 (marked as male) b KY; D., female, white, age 22, b KY; M.A. white female age 15 b KY; J.W. white male age 4 b KY. (Ref page 43, census film M-432, Roll 218, 31 Aug 1850 KY.)

James Wiley Reynolds, son of Charles Reynolds, married 8 Apr 1840, Surety bond Jesse Birdsong, in (Warren) KY, Elizabeth Birdsong and migrated to State of AL abt 1842, settling in the area of Madison Cross Roads and Hazel Green (Madison) AL. The family is listed in the AL census, 8 Nov 1850.

The 1850 AL census listed James Wiley Reynolds, age 31 b KY, farmer, owning land; Elizabeth age 31 b KY; John age 8 b KY; Charles M. age 7 b AL; Louiza age 5 b AL; William age 4 b AL; Ervin age 1 b AL; Delily age 6 mos b AL.

I have not been able to find an accurate census listing

for JAMES WILEY REYNOLDS and ELIZABETH in the KY census.

The tax list and/or 2d Census of KY, yr 1800, listed Charles Reynolds, 9 Jan 1800 (Campbel) KY; & a Charles Reynolds, 1800 (Jefferson) KY. Whether either one is our relative requires additional research. (Ref: 2d Census of KY 1800" H-976.9 Clift book at H'ville AL Library.)

Charles Reynolds will listed in Book 2, p127, yr 1821 (Jefferson) KY (most likely the same person listed above). (Ref: "Index to Wills to 1851. The testators." H-976 INDEX - Huntsville AL library.)

I researched the census of KY for the different years that listed a Charles Reynolds in hopes of getting a clue as to date our relative arrived there but due to the way records were posted it is impossible to figure birth dates vs. ages, etc. and arrive at an answer; however, I'll list each one for record and for future research purposes:

Charles Reynolds (Jefferson) KY p28 has 3 males under 10; 2 males 10-16; 1 male over age 45; 1 female age 10-16; 1 female age 16-26. Ref film M-252 #7, 1810 KY.

[... info re Birdsong, Roundtree, Woodson families.]

Elizabeth Birdsong m 8 Apr 1840 James Wiley Reynolds (b 1817 KY); security Jesse Birdsong (Warren) KY. James Wiley Reynolds was son of Charles Reynolds (b abt 1795-VA, census listed KY). Charles Reynolds m Nancy Goodman in KY in 1817. No court records can be found in (Simpson) KY due to a big fire many years ago, but information can be located in (Warren) KY courthouse.

Many entries can be found of our Reynolds and Birdsong families of KY that show both families had been known to each other and were close for many years, even coming to AL as a group many years ago. Records found in (Warren) KY states a stray horse was evaluated by Charles Reynolds & Henry Birdsong, supporting the fact that the two men knew each other. The lived in northern portion of (Franklin) KY, near a big creek. The families are believed also to have lived (Warren) KY prior to it being changed to (Simpson) in 1817. The county of Warren was split into three other counties believed to be Allen, Logan, and Simpson (1817-1819).

RICHARD AND JESSE D. REYNOLDS OF VA, ANY CONNECTION?
BY MRS. WILLIAM A. REYNOLDS, HOT SPRINGS VILLAGE AR

I am wondering if any new connections have been made to our Richard Reynolds of (Richmond) VA? My documentation is complete back to his marriage to Sinah Morse? Fowles 24 Dec 1808 (Richmond) VA. Their son James Richard Reynolds was born 23 Aug 1809 Warsaw (Richmond) VA. James married 1st Catherine Davis, dau of John Davis and had a son Albert Melville Reynolds born VA. James married 2d Martha Efford 12 Aug 1848 (Richmond) VA. James spent his early years as a sailor in the Chesapeake Bay area.

Richmond Co. Legislative Petition 22 Jan 1845 lists other children for Richard and Sinah Morse Reynolds: James; "Betsy" Elizabeth m 17 Dec 1838 Washington Scates; Nancy m 20 Dec 1842 [1842] William Webb; William Henry; Thomas; Edward. Thomas bonds to Nancy Webb 24 Dec 1850, William S. Richards witness.

Richard Reynolds was b abt 1776 and d abt 1840. After Sinah died Richard m 2d 11 Jun 1835 Maria Webb (Richmond) VA. Bond by John Webb and Mary Webb as witness. Mrs. Mariah Reynolds m 30 Dec 1841 to William S. Richards.

I have reasonably accepted the fact that the above Richard is closely related to John Reynolds of Cople Parish (Westmoreland) VA and Elizabeth "Betty" Brickey born 2-19-1731/2 (Richmond) VA. Betty m 2d William Richards. Betty was the d/o John Brickey Jr and Sarah. After John Jr died 12-19-1732 his widow, Sarah m 10-31-1774 Thomas Russell. The above Elizabeth "Betty" used Rickey, Russell, Reynolds and Richards as surnames.

There is a Jesse D. Reynolds in (Westmoreland) and (Richmond) VA, witnessing and presenting bond for various members of our specific family; but I am confident that he is not the Jesse D. of (Bedford) of Revolutionary War fame who married Mary. What's his connection?

REYNOLDS AND ROGERS

WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE QUARTERLY

Capt. Thomas Reynolds was a well-to-do merchant, who lived in Yorktown, and married Susannah Rogers. In 1745 he was one of the justices of the peace. In 1752 his partner, Capt. Charles Seabrook, dying, gave half his "whole estate and a part of a sloop and its cargo" to be equally divided between Thomas Reynolds, "my partner in Virginia, and Judith Lowbridge and Maybella Wilkinson, in London." He gave also 200f to Elizabeth Dyson. In his inventory it appears that his estate in partnership with Capt. Thomas Reynolds, amounted to £915,13,2. Among the items owned in this way was one sea-sloop called the 'Judith', complete £300, one country ditto called the 'York', worth £100, one ditto called the 'Eltham', £50, five pipes of wine, £125, etc.

The will of Thomas Reynolds, of Yorkhampton Parish, was proved at Yorktown 20 Aug 1759. It names wife Susanna, daughter Anne, and son William. He requires his executors, Mr. John Norton and Mr. David Jameson of Yorktown, and Mr. Humphrey Hill, of King and Queen county, to have his son William educated "in writing and accounts, and the most useful branches of mathematics, as geometry, trigonometry, gauging, dialing, surveying, gunnery with a knowledge of the French tongue,"... and afterwards "to be bound to a good

trading merchant, such as trade to sea," etc. His widow, Susanna, daughter of William Rogers, died about nine years later, and her will, proved 18 Apr 1768, names daughter Anne Savage, son William Reynolds, and late husband, Capt. Thomas Reynolds. David Jameson, afterwards Lieutenant-Governor of Virginia, was made executor.

Anne, daughter of Capt. Thomas Reynolds, married Nathaniel Littleton Savage, of Accomack, and had issue, Southey Littleton, Thomas, William, who married Anne Christian (she married, secondly, Dr. Fleming Christian of New Kent), George, Littleton, Nathaniel, Susan, Anne. Of these Southey Littleton Savage married his cousin Harriet Reynolds, daughter of William Reynolds and Mary Perrin, of Gloucester, and had issue, Nathaniel Littleton, William R., Mary Anne Susan, who married George Hankins. The issue of George Hankins (son of Archer Hankins and Alice Browne) was Alice, Harriet, Southey, Dr. George, of Williamsburg (1903), Reynolds, William.

The will of William Reynolds, dated 28 Feb 1800, proved 1802, is recorded at Yorktown. It mentions, but does not name, his children. Requests Thomas Griffin and William A. Rogers to act as executors.

The will of Thomas Reynolds is also recorded there. Dated June 17, 1800, and proved 21 July 1800. Names brothers George Norton Reynolds and Lewis Reynolds, and sister Harriet Reynolds. Makes William A. Rogers and Thomas Griffin exors.

The will of Capt. William Rogers, father of Susanna Reynolds, is also recorded at Yorktown; names wife Theodosia, daughters Sarah and Hannah Rogers, son William, under age, and daughter Susanna Reynolds. HE gives to them much plate and silver marked F P M and W F R, his silver hilted sword, lot No. 75 in Yorktown, with their brick house bought of Francis Moss, etc. Proved Dec. 17, 1739. His inventory was valued at £1224, 5s. Among the items were one Dutch picture in a gilt frame, 7 Cartoons, 4 glass pictures, 4 maps and three small pictures, "a neat picture of Charles II." etc.

THE SLIGHTLY LESS ELUSIVE JOSEPH L. REYNOLDS

JOAN M. GARDNER, TUCSON AZ

After a whirlwind, three-week genealogy trip to Southern IL in June, and much encouraged by continued Reynolds Recollections energy, I'd like to submit amended information about the slightly less elusive Joseph L. Reynolds, my Gr-Gr Grandfather. (A third wife came to light during our research, making his saga seen more eventful!)

Joseph L. Reynolds b 1800 (Fayette) KY; moved by 1820 to (White) IL, where he worked as a carpenter in the salt works. Married 1st Leah Foley, or Leah Foley Chaffin in (White) IL 1824; two sons from this marriage were Thomas Young Reynolds b 1825; and Isaac H. Reynolds, b 1827; both in Equality (Gallatin) IL, where Joseph and Leah settled.

After Leah's death in 1832, Joseph L. married and Evaline Pounds, in Gallatin Co. Recent research has located his 3d wife, Martha Skelton, whom he married in 1840, also in (Gallatin) IL. Martha, b 1817-18 in SC, was an older sister of Sarah W. Skelton, who in 1850 married Joseph's older son, Thomas Y. Reynolds. Joseph L. and Martha Reynolds are listed in the 1860 census, although cannot be found in the 1850 census.

In 1860 one child, Mittie, age 8 appears; in 1870 Martha is listed with children Jane, then 23; son Joseph, then 16; and son William J., then 12. Martha is listed on 1880 census with son Joseph only. When did she die? Where is she buried?

Joseph L. is thought to have died in 1867 in (Gallatin) IL, where he had bounty lands from the 1832 Black Haw (Sac) War. Where is he buried? He and Martha also bought other land through the years, including acreage almost directly on the Saline-Gallatin Co border.

Was the L. in Joseph's name fo Larkin? Legrand? Or? Does anyone have photos of Joseph L. and/or his family?

Are there descendants of Joseph and Martha Skelton Reynolds out there? Are there descendants of 1st wife Leah and 2d wife Evaline? I will happily share data about Joseph L.'s descendants through Thomas Y.

Temple, 7127 Chipperton Dr, Dallas TX 75225-1708: Need info on my 3d Gr grandfather Isaac Reynolds, b 25 Aug 1793 in SC; m Jane -- 23 Apr 1812 and is listed in the 1820 US Census in Pulaski (Giles) TN, and in the 1840 Census of the Republic of TX in San Augustine Co. Also listed in 1820 Census for Pulaski (Giles) TN is "Isaac Reynolds, Senior," presumably my 4th Gr-grfather, and a Hugh Reynolds (age 16-18). Isaac Reynolds ("Jr.") served in War of 1812 from 4 Oct 1813 to 15 Jan 1814 in Capt. Thomas K. Gordon's Co. of TN Militia; then later served for 3 mos in the TX Revolution in 1836 under Capt. William Scurlock, and for 1 month in the TX Indian War in 1841 in Gen. James Smith's Third Brigade. He died sometime after 18 Dec 1871 when he applied for his pension for the War of 1812. One Isaac Reynolds is listed in the 1800 Census of (Fairfield) SC, and a Hugh Reynolds is listed in the 1790 Census of Camden Dist. of (Fairfield) SC.

REYNOLDS-ALBRITTEN-MAULDIN-KINNETT -- Sheila Morgan, 740 Castlewood Dr, Bessemer AL 35020: LeRoy Reynolds (Lee Roy), s/o Robert and Lucretia (Mauldin) Reynolds, b 18 Jul 1880, d 7 Jul 1954 Birmingham AL, m Sep 1904 Baileyton (Cullman) AL Virginia Ann Albritten, d/o P.G. and Minerva M. (Kinnett) Albritten, b 7-2-1877 (Cullman) AL, d 16 Nov 1964 Birmingham AL. Leroy Reynolds had a twin brother named Coy and possibly another brother Robert. Leroy was prob born in Morgan or Cullman Co., or someplace in that part of AL.

Nehemiah descended from John of Watertown. Anna m Stephen Howland (we do not know date). Stephen Howland was gr-gr-grandson of Henry Howland (the bro of pilgrim John Howland). Anna Reynolds Howland d 5 Apr 1832 in Galway (Saratoga) NY. Her son, Stephen Howland(2), m Susan Macomber. Stephen Howland(2) and Susan had a dau - Amanda Malvina Howland who m Freeman B. Vorce (Force), Jr. Any info on Anna, her siblings and desc will be appreciated.

REYNOLDS-MOBLEY -- Mary Nowell, 951 Crumbley Rd, McDonough GA 30253: On my ggrandfather's death certificate, Wylie Smith Mobley (9-10-1857 to 8-23-1931), his parents are listed as Andrew Wilson Mobley from (Troup) GA. Andrew's wife is named Annie Liza Reynolds from SC. In the 1850 (Troup) GA census, in the household of Tilman Reynolds, age 47, planter, is Mobley, Eliza A.. age 18, and Andrew Mobley, age 12, farm hand. On another abstraction of this same census, he is listed as 18, a farm hand from SC. A few farms down is the household of William and Susannah Mobley and their children from SC. Any help on this Reynolds connection will be appreciated. There is an Andrew Mobley listed in the 1850 census of (Troup) GA, as a farm hand (age 12) on the farm of Tilman Reynolds and his wife Elizabeth and their family. On another abstraction of the same census he is listed as 18, a farm hand from SC.

REYNOLDS-PALMER -- Raymond C. Smith, 2365 Lakeridge Dr, White Bear Lake MN 55110-7412: Seek names and any info on parents of John Reynolds, b 1780 (Westchester) NY, d 29 Nov 1862 (Broome) NY, m Susannah Palmer, probably in (Westchester) NY c 1809; Susannah b c1791 (Westchester) NY,

d/o Stephen Palmer and Sarah (_?), d 24 Oct 1849 (Broome) NY. John Reynolds had at least three siblings, males, all died Colesville NY, named: Stephen b 29 Sep 1776, d 24 Nov 1854; Daniel b 1 Apr 1778, d 27 Jan 1851; and Silas b 9 Mar 1786, d 19 Sep 1855.
