ERNEST W. REYNOLDS, 60, a resident of Route 7A, died Friday, Feb. 4, [1994] at Southwestern Vermont Medical Center. He was born in Bennington on April 29, 1933, and raised by the late William Corey and the former Phoebe (Matteson) Corey, who survives. He received his education in Shaftsbury school. Mr. Reynolds was a veteran of the Korean Conflict, serving in the U.S. Army from May 6, 1953, to May 5, 1955. He married the former Roberta Hall in Shaftsbury on June 20, 1958. He was a member of American Legion Post 13 in Bennington. A country western music fan, Mr. Reynolds was a member of the Al and Cathy Bain Fan Club. He was also a member of the National Rifle Association. Mr. Reynolds especially enjoyed spending time with his two grandsons, Eddie and Cody Perkins. Survivors beside his wife include his mother, Phoebe Corey of Bennington; a daughter and son-in-law Melisaa and Edward Perkins of Shaftsbury; two grandsons; a sister, Helen Danforth of Troy NY; a brother, William Corey of Bennington; several nieces, nephews and cousins. LTC JOHN J. REYNOLDS, USA, of Summit NJ, died 16 Aug 1993. Col. Reynolds, who was a member of Knickerbocker #13 Chapter of the National Sojourners was born 4 Jan 1910.

MERLE "TINY" REYNOLDS dies; active Middlefield resident. Middlefield CT. Merle Reynolds Jr, whose large size earned him the nickname "Tiny," died Thursday. His heart, too, was big and touched many people in town. Reynolds, 73, husband of Carmelina "Millie" (Aresco) Reynolds, of 1150 South Main St., formerly of Middlefield, died at Middlesex Hospital after a long illness. He was born 13 June 1920 in New Bedford MA, son of the late Merle C. and Elsie (Reca) Reynolds Sr. and had been an area resident the past 48 years. He was a member of St. Colman Church, a member of the 4th Degree Knights of Columbus and a past Grand Knight, a past president of the Lions Club, a member of the Middlefield Volunteer Fire Department for the past 47 years, and past chairman of the Democratic Town Committee... He

served as a state Legislator in the 1950s, as assessor for over 25 years, and was formerly chairman of the Middlefield Board of Assessors. Prior to his retirement in 1986, he was employed by the Prudential Insurance Co., and was awarded the Distinguished Community Service Award from Prudential... Besides his wife, Reynolds is survived by a son, Merle Reynolds III of Cromwell; a daughter, Marie Leech of Rockfall; a sister, Virginia DeAngelis of Wethersfield; and three grandsons. Funeral services [were] from Saturday, 10:45 a.m. from the D'Angelo Funeral Home, 22 South Main St., followed by a Mass of Christian Burial at 11:30 a.m. at St. Colman Church. YESTERDAY

JOHN REYNOLDS, CARVER, OF ENGLAND AND PHILADELPHIA

From "Magazine Antiques," May 1984

In a 13-page article entitled "Philadelphia Carving Shops," by Luke Beckerdite, Part I was devoted to James Reynolds, the remaining two parts in later issues to be devoted to other Philadelphia furniture carvers. The article contains many photos and much text describing the work of James Reynolds. Sections of the article on James Reynolds follow:

On 21 Aug 1766, James Reynolds and his wife, Elizabeth, arrived in Philadelphia on the brig 'Mary and Elizabeth', commanded by Captain J. Sparks (PA Gazette, 21 Aug 1766). In the "Pennsylvania Gazette" of 4 Sep 1766, Reynolds advertised:

JAMES REYNOLDS, CARVER and GILDER. Just arrived from

London (by Captain Sparks) at his House in Dock-Street opposite Lodge Alley... UNDERTAKES to execute all the various Branches of Carving and Gilding in the newest, greatest, genteelst Taste, such as Capitals, Mouldings and other Housed Work, chair and Cabinet Ditto, Glass and Picture Frames, Slab and Table Ditto, Girandoles, Chandifer, &c. and Ship Work in general. Within a year Reynolds had moved his shop to Front Street between Walnut and Chestnut and had expanded his business by offering a variety of imported goods including looking glasses, "Paper hangings," varnishes, glue, gold leaf, and "Painting Brushes and Pencils of all Sorts." (PA Chronicle, Sep 14, 1767.)... Although paper hanging is not normally associated with the carver's and gilder's trace, an entry in Samuel Powel's ledger on 22 Jan 1770 records payment to Reynolds for "papering Fitzsimmons house."

In the ensuing years, Reynolds sold dowel picture frames and girandoles and made occasional repairs to damaged looking glasses...enjoy[ing] patronage of prominent Philadelphians....

In 1791 Reynolds moved his shop to 143 North Third Street following the sale of the house where he had "long resided." His shop remained in this location until his death in 1794. On 27 Oct 1794, the "American Daily Advertiser reported:

Departed this life in the 58th year of his age, Mr. James Reynolds, carver and gilder of this city; and on Tuesday ...his remains, attended by a number of respectable...were interred in Christ Church burial ground...His children will have reason long to lament the loss of a...and indulgent father--his relations and acquaintance, a...friend--and society an active honest man. Reynolds' sons James and Henry took over their father's business immediately after his death. In 1795 they moved to 56 Market Street, where they continued to offer carving and gilding in the "newest and genteelst taste." ("Federal Gazette," Nov 27, 1794; "Pennsylvania Packet," May 12, 1795, both cited in Prime, "Arts and Crafts," vol. 2, p.234.)

CAN YOU IDENTIFY THIS PERSON?

"REVENUE OFFICER" MAKES ENTRANCE INTO ATLANTA
DeKalb Historical Society, Atlanta GA

Copies of two newspaper clippings were submitted, the first from the Atlanta Constitution, Atlanta GA, September 190_. Although the paper is torn, the date appears to be 1908. In this clipping there is a photo with the caption "Mr. Jack Reynolds Whose 'Entrance of the Revenue Officer Into Atlanta' Won Him Many Congratulations." There is no additional text. Handwritten in the margin is "He didn't live long after this. I think it was 1908."

The second clip was a copy of a newspaper obit, name of paper and date unknown. "News of the death of J.H. Reynolds of Asheville NC has been received in Atlanta. 'Jack' Reynolds, as he was commonly known among his friends, was a popular young business man of Atlanta having been engaged in the advertising business. A man of pleasing manner and

genial disposition, he made many friends who loved and respected him. He was of a very artistic temperament, a fact which accounted for his choice of vocations and rendered his daily work a pleasure. About a year ago he left Atlanta for Asheville in search of health. While his friends knew he was not enjoying a full measure of health, it was not known that his condition was serious and the sudden news of his death is the cause of much sorrow. It will be a source of consolation to his friends to know that when he died he was among friends who tenderly cared for him. Mr. Reynolds is survived by his wife, Mrs. Louise Reynolds of Atlanta, a brother and four sisters. Her was buried at Portland, Me."

RPA will appreciate any help to tie Jack Reynolds to his family.

RPA MEMBERSHIP BRINGS SUCCESSES

RPA members Bula Palcic and I believe we have found our Reynolds roots, with the help of Sue Clement and Margaret E. Jones, to whom we are very grateful. Our gr-gr-father Abraham was b Washington Twp (Dutchess) NY near the CT border and d 30 Sep 1849 (q.s.) in Collins Twp (Erie) NY at the other end of the State.

Our search had been "stonewalled" in Dutchess despite every effort. Queries to various genealogical publications went unanswered and researchers in the area found little to aid us. There were lots of Reynoldses there at the time of his birth, but no clues to his parentage could be found. He had m c1800 Hannah Wilbur (d/o Enoch and Phebe (Church) Wilbur) and migrated westward, spending some years in Otsego Co. according to family tradition. There our gr-grfather Norman was b in 1812 (1855 census) and his br Nehemiah in 1810 (Briggs Hist. of Concord). Abt 1821 they moved to Collins where they spent the rest of their lives.

The name Nehemiah always seemed to me a clue, but there was nothing to connect Abraham to any particular family, although Tax Lists from Cram Elhower, Charlotte (Dutchess) had a Nehemiah 1739-73 and Nehemiah Jr, 1762-1779, which I highlighted and marked ? in July 1992.

One snowy day in Feb I was going through some back numbers of RR and came upon a query from Margaret Jones (Sep-Oct 1993) which mentioned an Anna Reynolds of Washington Hollow (Dutchess) NY. It seemed there must have been a relationship bet Anna b 1753 and Abraham b 1775 and when I looked at my Wilbur Gen., I discovered that two of Abraham's bro-in-law had m daus of Anna (Reynolds) Howland. That had to be a real clue!

I wrote to Mrs. Jones who promptly sent me FGSs and lots of info (It turned out that an earlier letter I had sent to her was mislaid unopened). The Anna of her query had an older half-bro Nehemiah Jr. Now, I was really excited and got in touch with Sue Clement to give her the news. Sue thought she had some notes in the Archives that might help and sent them to me.

There was Abraham in Otsego Co. 1810 & 1820 Censuses, then moved, "poss. to Essex." (Remember, 1821 was the year they went to Collins (Erie) NY.) He was the 7th of 15 ch (by 2 wives) of Nehemiah³, Jr (Nehemiah⁴, Joseph³, Jonathan², John¹ of Watertown and Greenwich). Although primary souces prob don't exist, I am confident this is the correct lineage.

The author and date of the archives notes are unknown. Some info from DCGS, which arrived coincidentally on the same day, substantiates

some data in RFA notes. Thus ends our search for Abraham's ancestry, which has taught me lots of history and put me in touch with some great people. Thanks Sue and Peggy for all your help.

NEW FINDINGS ON

WILLIAM REYNOLDS OF CROSS RIVER NY

In the Jul-Aug 1993 issue of RR was my conjecture that the wife of William Reynolds b 1734-36 (Gideon, James, John, John of Watertown), Mary (Polly) Knapp was a sister of Lydia Knapp who married William's brother Horton. I believed at that time that Sarah Mead, who mentions Lydia and Mary in her will as "my niece" was the sister of Caleb Knapp. It turns out that she was Caleb's aunt, the d/o of Samuel and Sarah (Denton) Mills. My conjecture that "Polly" (Knapp) Reynolds was the d/o of Caleb and Clemence (Mills) Knapp appears to have been correct. A reading of the original wills should confirm.

Recently, Fred H. Knapp of Richland MO brought the wills of Capt. Jabez Mead (dtd 27 Feb 1769, probated 3 Apr 1769) and his widow Sarah Mead (dtd 28 Jun 1786, prob 3 May 1787), to my attention. The will of Jabez Mead mentions his wife, Sarah; his father-in-law, Samuel Mills, dec.; his brothers, sisters, nephews and nieces. It is apparent, not only from his will, but also from Sarah's will, that they had no children of their own.

It is interesting that Spencer P. Mead claimed in his Mead Genealogy that Jabez Mead was unmarried while in his Abstract of Probate Records for the District of Stamford, County of Fairfield and State of Connecticut, 1729-1802 and 1803-1848, he gives an abstract of Sarah Mead's will, in which she states that she is the widow of Capt. Jabez Mead, late of Greenwich. (History of Westchester County NY notes that he is 'Capt.' Jabez Mead and doesn't mention his marital status.)

Sarah's will mentions over 30 relatives, including all of the living children of Caleb and Clemence (Mills) Knapp. She mentions specifically her "niece Amy, wife of Benjamin Hobby of Greenwich, niece, Lydia, wife of Horton Reynolds of Greenwich, and niece, Mary, wife of William Reynolds of Westchester County." She further states that these nieces were the heirs of her deceased nephew, Caleb Knapp of Goshen NY. She mentions 'kinswoman' Clemence, wife of Thomas Hitchcock. Clemence was the d/o William and "Polly" (Knapp) Reynolds.

She also mentions her 'Kinsmen' Jabez Fitch (executor), s/o Ebenezer and Lydia (Mills) Fitch. Lydia was the d/o Samuel and Lydia (Reynolds) Mills. Also mentioned were Denton and Samuel Mills, sons of Samuel and Lydia (Reynolds) Mills and their sisters, Clemence (Mills) Smith, widow of John Smith, and Sarah (Mills) Close, wife of Jonathan Close, and their children.

These wills were studied and researched in detail by Nelson A. Close of Darien CT. His conclusions "resulted in the reconstruction of a large family group, including

members of the Mills, Knapp, Reynolds, Hobby, Fitch, Mead and Close families. After much research, one of the eventual conclusions of Nelson Close was that Hannah (Lockwood) Reynolds (1783-1870), wife of George Reynolds (1779-1862) was d/o Jonathan and Sarah (Mills) Lockwood. Sarah (Mills) Mead, widow of Capt. Jabez Mead, mentions her kinswoman, "Sarah, wife of Jonathan Lockwood and daughter of nephew Samuel Mills." Nelson Close gave the following as his sources:

Abstract of Probate Records (as above) by Spencer C. Mead.

The Ancestry of Samule Mills, (bound transcript at Greenwich Public Library), by Samule Mills IX.

Descendants of John and Sarah Reynolds 1630-1923 (1923), by Marion H. Reynolds.

Ye History of Ye Town of Greenwich, (1911), by Spencer P. Mead.

History and Genealogy of the Mead Family (1901), by Spencer F. Mead.

The History of Ridgefield CT (1927), by George L. Rockwell.

Norwalk, (1896), by Charles M. Selleck.

Tombstone Records of the Town of Greenwich, by Spencer P. Mead.

My present project is to prove that the wife of Nathaniel (James, John, John) b 1729, d 1805, was Lydia Ferris, the d/o John and Sarah (Mead) Ferris of Greenwich. According to the Mead Family Genealogy, by Spencer P. Mead (p. 404) John and Sarah (Mead) Ferris did have a daughter named Lydia. She was born 7 May 1728. I hope that they had wills.

I hope that this is not too confusing. Sometimes when we see something clearly ourselves, we overlook the obvious.

WILLIAM REYNOLDS OF

ENGLAND AND VENANGO COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

"I have heard my parents say that on that evening, about 9 o'clock, they were sitting at supper in a room remote from the street, when a loud knocking was begun at the front, and simultaneously therewith an old woman of the neighborhood rushed in at the back door, and exclaimed, 'Mr. Reynolds, the mob are about to burn your house! For God's sake take your children out.' A fruit pie was on the table, of which the old woman took possession, and without ceremony, began to eat with apparent relish, using her fingers in a primitive style. The front door was opened by my father, and the mob had free access for plunder. The house was not burned. The Castle inn was opposite and the leaders of the mob were invited by some friends of the family to drink there. It was told them that they were under a mistake; that William was a brother of James Reynolds of High Street, whom all knew to be a staunch churchman, and loyal to his king and government. Much

combustible material, as gunpowder, brimstone, salt petre, etc., was in the warehouse connected with the store, and the burning of it would have put in jeopardy the entire block of buildings. (See Appendix, Note 2.)

"This event determined my father to emigrate to the United States. Accordingly he closed up his business; and in the spring of 1794 my mother, with Anne and William, went to her brother Joshua's; I and Mary to Leominster. Eliza, Lydia, Sarah and Eleanor remained in Birmingham and neighborhood with uncles and aunts Guest, Reynolds and Edwards. The arrangement was for my father to come over to the United States, establish himself in business, and return for the family. But when the time for parting came, my mother would go with him. They sailed in the ship 'Active,' and landed in New York in October, after a voyage of six weeks, bringing with them William, the youngest child.

"The following spring, march 3, 1795, I and Mary left Leominster for Liverpool, where Anne (from Holywell) joined us by arrangement, with Mrs. Maddock, my cousin, who, with a sister-in-law, several servants, and some friends, with their children, were coming over. The husbands of Mrs. Maddock and her sister-in-law had preceded them and settled in Brooklyn. My cousin kindly took charge of us. We went on board ship at Liverpool March 22d, and after a very stormy voyage landed in New York, Jun 12, 1795, and thence sailed up the river to Lansingburg, at which place my father had begun business in the spring, having opened a family grocery store.

"My four sisters, who has been left with our relatives in Birmingham, were kindly taken charge of by Mrs. John Cauldwell, a warm friend of my father, and they safely arrived at Lansingburg in the fall of the same year, having had a pleasant voyage of four weeks. Steam vessels were not thought of in those days.

"Thus, after a year of separation of parents and children, we were, by the mercy of God, all brought together under the parental roof. We resided in Lansingburg until the spring of 1797. In 1796 my father purchased a lot and built a two-story frame house, into which we removed in the fall while it was yet in an unfinished state. By that transaction my father was put in debt and unable to finish the house and recruit his store of groceries.

"At this juncture, his friend Mr. Maddock, informed him that an advantageous offer of land, gratuitous, for settlement, in Northwestern Pennsylvania, was made by the Holland Land Company; and that he, with his son contemplated a visit with the intention of settling his son, or sons, in that region, if they should be pleased. My father readily embraced the opportunity of accompanying them, and leaving the family in Brooklyn, with myself. We started in August from New York on horseback. Passing through Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and Port Franklin, we arrived on the 30th of the month, in the evening, at the head of the spring, by which my brother Joshua now resides, and there made thenceforward our home. There my father died on the 30th day of January 1820, and my mother on the 11th day of May, 1826, both aged about sixty-eight years.

"Having thus given a short history of my grandparents and my parents, I will now give you some account of my own eventful history, with such incidental reminiscences as may occur to me, showing how the Lord has led and preserved me through a long and chequered life...."

(Since) This is a very interesting account of the early days of the Reynolds family in America and I have copied the additional

information from the text that seemed to relate to these early years:

(John Reynolds and his cousin, Maddock), sailed for U.S. March 1795.) "We were in Liverpool two weeks before the ship was ready to sail. She was a fine vessel, the 'Elizabeth' of Wiscasset... We took what was called the Northern Passage, 'round the north of Ireland.... On the 12th of June we landed in New York...had a tedious journey up the Hudson River to Albany, then to Lansingburg, 9 miles from Albany, where father had established himself in a small grocery store.

"About the latter end of July 1797, we broke up housekeeping in Lansingburg, and my father and myself prepared for a long journey to northwestern Pennsylvania. What my father had saved from his property in Birmingham had been used and lost in New York and Lansingburg....

"Our journey commenced. We were six in company - four on horseback and two (Mr. and Mrs. Maddock, cousins) in a chaise...(went via Philadelphia and Pittsburgh). By advice we bought in Pittsburgh oats, bread and dried venison sufficient for ourselves and the horses until we should reach Franklin. When we arrived at Franklin, Mr. McDowell piloted us along the Le Boeuff road 1-1/2 mile, whence a narrow road had recently been cut through the woods to the eastern branch of Oil Creek where the Holland Land Company were then erecting a saw mill. Jonathan Titus had begun a settlement there the previous spring.

"On the way to Titus' they (Mr. Maddock and my father) were both pleased with the land on Cherrytree Run and returned the next day to have it surveyed. (Tells of erecting a small 3-sided cabin, 10 feet square, with the fire on the outside.) When the weather got cooler, they built a third wall and rough chimney. At the eave, our cabin was only as high as our heads. There was not a nail in the whole building. The cracks between the logs we chunked with moss gathered from logs. Snow fell in the latter part of November and by December 10 it was two feet deep...

"On March 3 our cabin and all it contained was consumed by fire. (Rebuilt it in one day with help of neighbors, but had no bedding, etc.)

"In June 1798 my father received a letter from my mother telling him that she would meet him at Whitesborough on the Mohawk. (He met her there and the following describes their route from Whitesborough to Cherrytree.) Went from New York by sloop to Albany; from Albany to Schenectady by wagon, then by batteaux up the Mohawk to Ft. Stonin; by wagon to Wood Creek, by boat through Oneida Lake and down the Oswego River to Lake Ontario; up said lake to Ft. George, then by wagon to Ft. Erie; by boat to Presque Isle and finally to Waterford by wagon and then to Franklin. Such was the journey of my mother and sisters Lydia and Anne and brothers, William, Joshua and Edward.

(John had been left behind alone when his father went to get the rest of the family.) "I received the joyful tidings of the arrival of the family in Franklin. Mr. Tuthill went with me to Franklin with his oxen and wagon and our horse. On the 18th of October they arrived and went into the log house which had been cleaned out, floored and 1/2 of the loft covered with a flooring of boards laid down unfastened. My mother put her bonnet up in the loft, thinking, as she afterward used to tell, she would never want it again."

This Indenture Witnesseth that William Reynolds Son of Thomas Reynolds of Newport in the County of Newport and State of Rhode Island &c shopkeeper hath put himself and by these presents doth Voluntarily and of his own free Will and accord and with the Consent of his father the said Thomas Reynolds put and bind himself Apprentice to William Greene of Newport aforesaid Cordwainer to learn his Art Trade or Mystery and after the Manner of an Apprentice to serve from the date hereof for and during the Term of Five Years neat ensuing to be complete and ended. During all which said Term the said Apprentice his Said Master faithfully shall serve, his Secrets keep, his lawful Commands gladly obey, he shall do no Damage to his Said Master nor see it done by others without letting or giving notice thereof to his Said Master, he shall not waste his Said Masters goods nor lend them unlawfully to any, he shall not commit Fornication or Contract Matrimony within the said Term. At Cards or Dice or any other unlawful game he shall not play whereby his said Master may have damage with his own Goods or the Goods of others. without Licence from his Said Master he shall neither buy nor sell. he shall not absent himself by day or night from his said Masters Service without his leave or haunt Alehouses Taverns or Playhouses but in all things behave himself as a good and faithful Apprentice ought to do towards his said Master and all the family during the said Term. And the Said William Greene doth hereby promise to teach and instruct or cause the said Apprentice to be taught and instructed in the Art Trade or calling of a Cordwainer by the best Way and Means he can finding and providing for said Apprentice good and Sufficient Victuals and Drink Washing and Lodging to find him all his working Clothes to give him two Quarters Schooling Winter Evenings in the said Term of Time and at the Expiration of said Term to dismiss the said Apprentice from his Service with his then wearing Apparel. In Testamony whereof the Parties to these Presents have hereunto interchangeably set their hands and Seals this Twenty Sixth day of November in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred and Ninety Nine and Twenty fourth of American Independence - William Reynolds

In the name of God amen, I Henry Reynolds Sr. of the County of Greene and the State of Tennessee, considering the mortality of this mortal life and being of sound and perfect mind and memory (blessed be Almighty God) for the ____ calling to mind that it is appointed to all men ____ die I do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul to God who gave it, and my body to this earth to be decently buried. And as tending ____ worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give and demise and dispose of this same in the following manner and form.

First give and bequeath unto my beloved with Charity Reynolds fifty acres of land including the dwelling house where I now live and the balance of my land to be divided amongst my beloved children David Reynolds, Ellander Reaves, William Reynolds, Joseph Reynolds, Richard Reynolds, divided equally according to quality and quantity. David Reynolds including the improvement where he now lives, Ellander including the improvement where she now lives, and William Reynolds at the upper end of the upper track all including water to each part; Joseph Reynolds to join James Kelly and Richard to join Ellander. The above named parcels of land to be divided by Henry Reynolds Jr. and George Reaves and Hezakiah Hughes according to the above direction. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Charity all my personal ____ during her natural life and all my money in hand and out of hand and all the remaining property at my wifes death to be sold by my executors at a reasonable credit and to be equally divided amongst my beloved children, Henry, Patsey, David, Sally, Ellander, William, Joseph, Richard when all the just debts are paid. The above land to be ____ of at my death. Lastly, I do appoint my trusty friends Henry Reynolds and Benjamin Reaves my executors of this may last will and testament not requiring ____ of theirs, thereby revoking all other or former wills by me made. In witness I have ____ set my hand and seal this eighth day of January ____ one thousand eight hundred and thirty five. Signed, sealed and acknowledged,

in presence of Hezakiah Hughes, George Reaves, Henry Reynolds

And thereupon the said Henry Reynolds and Benjamin Reaves, the executors named in the said will appeared in ____ and intend into land in the sum of five hundred dollars payable and conditioned as the law directs and were qualified accordingly, and as is ordered that letters issue to the accordingly.

Notes: Faye Jean wrote, "This will provides additional proof that my ancestor, Henry Reynolds Jr of MO is the son of Henry Reynolds Sr of (Greene) TN. Henry Jr, his wife Sarah and son John were found on the (Greene) 1830 census.

Sarah died abt 1850 in MO and Henry married in 1857 Margret Kerr, a widow with four sons and an unknown number of daughters."

Lawrence Carr is a descendant of Joseph Reynolds, s/o Henry Sr of (Greene) TN. He wrote, "Then Jeanie found a record where Patsey Reynolds in 1825, in (Greene) TN Court, charged a man by the name of Lamb with bastardy. Said he was the father of her child. We don't have any further record of Patsey or of the child. But we do know that Henry did not bequeath her anything in his will [and we do not] know what disposition was made of Mr. Lamb."

Were they brothers or otherwise related?

REYNOLDS-BRADNER -- Helen P. Farrell, 130 Remington Ave., Apt H, Syracuse NY 13210: Seek parents/bd/bp of Joseph Reynolds; in 1810 census Williamson (Ontario) NY with 5 ch under 10, one son Joshua; believe wife's maiden name Bradner.

REYNOLDS-CHAFFIN-POUNDS-SKELTON -- Joan M. Gardner, 9810 N Red Meadow Pl, Tucson AZ 85741-9390, phone 602-744-4999: Any info abt Joseph L. Reynolds, maternal gr-gr-grandfather, b bef or in 1800 near Lexington (Fayette) KY. In (White) IL by 1820, worked as carpenter in salt works. Married (1) Leah (Foley) Chaffin 9 Aug 1824 (White) IL. Joseph L. and Leah Foley Reynolds had 2 sons: Thomas Young Reynolds b 29 May 1825 (Gallatin) IL, and Isaac H. Reynolds b 1827-28 (Gallatin) IL where Joseph L. and Leah settled. Thomas Y. Reynolds m Sarah Whitner (Skelton) 20 Jan 1850, raised large fam in Harrisburg (Saline) IL area. Isaac H. moved to Oregon. Joseph L. Reynolds married (2) Evaline Pounds 27 May 1832 aft Leah Foley Reynolds' death 27 Mar 1832; they m in Shawneetown (Gallatin) IL. No other info has been found abt Evaline, and anything would be most appreciated. Did she and Joseph L. have any children? Joseph L. Reynolds married (3) Martha Skelton, older sister of Sarah W. Skelton who married Joseph's son Thomas Y. Reynolds; Joseph L. and Martha m 9 Aug 1842 (Gallatin) IL, and had several children, among them Jane, Joseph, and William J. Reynolds. Joseph L. and Martha (Skelton) Reynolds bought and sold land several times in (Gallatin) IL, but no record or location of a grave has been found. Could he have been buried on farmlands almost directly on the Saline-Gallatin Cos. border purchased towards the end of his life? No estate or will packets among official files were found in either county during and "on-site" search in Summer 1993. Martha and various children are listed in U.S. census records with Joseph in 1860; she is listed as a widow in 1870 and 1880 censuses. Will be grateful for any additional data on Joseph L.
