R.J. REYNOLDS III. Richard Joshua Reynolds III, a
grandson, namesake and heir to the founder of R.J.
Reynolds' Tobacco Co., died of emphysema and congestive
heart failure June 28 at his home in Pinehurst NC...
Funeral service was held July 5 in Winston-Salem NC and
Mr. Reynolds was buried the following day in Daytona Beach
FL... No family member has served on the tobacco company's
board of directors since the 1930s. Mr. Reynolds founded
the Full Sky Publishing Co. to publish works of young
writers and produced the film "Siddhartha" based on a
novel by Herman Hesse. He also founded the Sufi Institute
and the Sufi Foundation camp in New Mexico. The foundation
based its beliefs on the Muslim movement of Sufism that
emerged in the late 10th and early 11th centuries. [His
half-brother] Patrick Reynolds said most of his brother's
estate would go to charity. Mr. Reynolds' wife, Marie
Reynolds, died this year. In addition to Patrick Reynolds,
survivors include two other brothers, William and Michael
Reynolds. Their father, also named R.J. Reynolds,
died...in 1964 at the age of 58. [Washington Post]

ROBERT L. REYNOLDS, 60, died at his home in Brooksville,
13 Mar 1994. He was born 31 Jan 1934 in Brooksville, son
of Ralph J. and Felice (Drisko) Reynolds. Robert served in
the Air Force during the Korean War, then went on to
become a master electrician and worked at the Maine
Maritime Academy for 24 years. Robert is survived by one
son, Dale and Angel Reynolds of Ellsworth; two daughters,

FOSTER REYNOLDS SHELDON, 85, former town clerk of South Kingstown RI for 36 years, died 8 Jul 1994, RFA was notified by his wife, Mildred (Schmidt) Sheldon. Foster Sheldon, of 8 French Rd, who in 36 years as S. Kingstown clerk dispensed marriage licenses, fox bounties and public blessings for those who ran municipal government, died yesterday at the South County Nursing Center, North Kingstown. Mr. Sheldon's trademarks were his ready smile, affable nature and the fountain pen he employed to take minutes of Town Council meeting in meticulous longhand.

Mr. Sheldon, who retired in 1978 was a lifelong resident of S. Kingstown who could trace his lineage to his namesake Gr-Gr-Grandfather, born in the town in 1772. Keenly interested in local history and pageantry, Mr. Sheldon enjoyed marching in parades decked out in colonial regalia. Over the years he came to personify the community, spinning yarns and reminiscing as he went about recording the town's joys and sorrows in his log of births and deaths.

An accomplished tennis player until well into his retirement, he was among a small band of retirees who played golf year-round, cocooned against winter inside wool hats, jackets, sweaters and long johns. Interviewed one December on a frozen fairway, Mr. Sheldon said, "Some people think that life is all over when you get older, but that just isn't so. There are so many things to enjoy."

One of Mr. Sheldon's duties in the early years, when S. Kingstown was more pastoral, was to give hunters a \$3 bounty for every fox they shot. To make sure a hunter didn't show him the same fox twice, Mr. Sheldon would snip out the animal's tongue as an identification mark. "I

never got outfoxed," he would say with a hearty chuckle in retelling the story over the years.

Mr. Sheldon, who was clerk long before the Supreme Court regulated public prayer, would often rise at the start of Town Council meetings, pluck a scrap of paper from his breast pocket and read a homespun blessing he had scratched out moments before with his tortoise-shell fountain pen.

He was so popular that in his early years as clerk, when the position was elective, he ran unopposed 14 times with the endorsement of both parties, even though he was a declared Republican.

Because of his longevity on the job, Mr. Sheldon was often referred to as the dean of Rhode Island's municipal clerks. When his retirement approached, he told an interviewer, "I hope people remember me as someone who tried to treat everybody the same. I tried to treat John Doe the same as the smartest person in the world."

After he retired -- 500 turned out for a sendoff party -- the Town Hall annex was named after him. A tribute in the program book said that he was "as much a part of South Kingstown as the beaches that cool its shores and the woodlands that shade its meadows, and has been as dependable as the granite of the Town Hall itself."

He started as deputy clerk in 1932, a year after his graduation from Brown University, and after a brief stint as an English teacher at Central High School in Providence. He was elected clerk a decade later.

Mr. Sheldon was the son of the late Samuel Foster Sheldon and the late Hattie M. (Essex) Sheldon. He was a 70-year member of Wakefield Baptist Church, and was founder and secretary for 25 years of the South County Brown Club. He was a member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants; the RI Society; Sons of the American Revolution; the Society of Founders and Patriots; the RI Town and City Clerks' Assoc.; the Reynolds Family Assoc.; and the Sheldon Family Assoc. Besides his wife he leaves a son, David Reynolds Sheldon of Kingston, and three grandchildren. A memorial service was held at Wakefield Baptist Church, Main Street, Wakefield. Burial was private. [The Providence [RI] Journal, written by Gerald S. Goldstein, Journal-Bulletin Staff Writer.]

Mrs. Sheldon wrote that her husband and Stewart Reynolds Essex (of the James of N. Kingstown line) were first cousins. She stated that he was a well loved, local figure having both a building and a street named after him. Flags on the Main street and all the local buildings were lowered at half mast for a week. She also noted that they have 3 grandchildren to continue the Reynolds line.

WHO IS THE FATHER OF MARY JANE REYNOLDS?

When I first joined RFA, I reported that my husband's Reynolds ancestor, Mary Jane Reynolds, was born in MS about 1860. I have since learned the following:

In the 1870 Crawfordville (Lowndes) MS census, p354, HH619, is REYNOLDS, Louisa, age 55, b SC (abt 1815) with Mary, age 10, b GA (abt 1860). If that census is correct, Louisa was 45 at the time Mary was born and the family was still in GA in 1860.

The family tradition is that Mary Jane's father died in

the Civil War. The only Reynolds I could locate from a MS company was GEORGE F. REYNOLDS, who was wounded (gunshot) on 7-20-1864 near Peachtree Creek GA and was left in enemy hands. One other report stated that he had typhoid fever. He died 11-9-1864 at Camp Douglas IL and was buried in Grave 135, Block 2, Chicago City Cemetery.

I ordered George F.'s pension records, but they had no record of a widow applying for a pension. Therefore, I do not know if this is or is not the father of Mary Jane.

I also located a marriage record (2d mar) for Louisa Reynolds in 1862 to one ANDREW A. GRANT, b SC. I do not think this is the same Louisa, but I am not sure.

The other family story is that Louisa died while she was in the process of moving from MS to AR to join her daughter who at that time was married to JOHN ABRAHAM FERGUSON.

MARY REYNOLDS, A 'SPLIT PERSONALITY'?

She continued in this state for about five weeks, when one morning she again awoke in her natural state, without any intimation from memory or consciousness that any thing unusual had happened to her. The five weeks that she had passed in her abnormal state were to her as though they had never been. All the knowledge and experience which has been so strangely lost were as strangely restored; and she took up life again at the precise point where she had left it when she fell into that slumber from which she had awoke to the new life. She was surprised at the change of the season and the different things around her, which seemed to her to have been wrought in a single night. Her friends rejoiced as if they had received her back from the dead, fondly trusting that her restoration would be permanent, and that the extraordinary occurrences of that mysterious five weeks would never be repeated. But their anticipations were not to be realized.

After the lapse of a few weeks she again fell into a profound slumber, from which she awoke in her second state, taking up her new life again precisely where she had left it when she before passed from that state. The whole previous life of which memory or consciousness remained was comprised in the limits of the five weeks which she had passed in this state. Here knowledge was confined within the narrow limits of what she had then acquired.

These alternations from one state to the other continued for 15 or 16 years, but finally ceased when she had attained the age of 35 or 36, leaving her permanently in her second state, in which she remained without change for the last quarter of a century of her life.

In 1836, after these changes had wholly ceased, she wrote, at the request of her nephew, Rev. John V. Reynolds, D.D.,

of whose family she was then an inmate, a statement of some of the facts of her remarkable experience. As she was then in her second state, "in which she had no recollection of the feelings or incidents of her other state, she relied upon the testimony of her friends for the circumstances related concerning...[one column line did not copy].

"From the spring of 1811, when he first change occurred, until within 8 or 10 years, frequently changing from my first to my second, and from my second to my first state, I was more than 3/4 of my time in my second state. There was not any regularity as to the length of time that the one or the other continued. Sometimes I remained several months, sometimes only a few weeks, or even days, in my second state; but in no instance did I continue more than 20 days in my first state. The transitions from one to the other always took place during sleep. In passing from my second to my first state nothing special was noticeable in the character of my sleep. But in passing from my first to my second state my sleep was so profound that no one could awake me, and it not unfrequently [sic] continued 18 or 20 hours.

"Whatever knowledge I acquired in my second state became familiar to me in that state, and I made such proficiency that I became well acquainted with things, and was, in general, as intelligent in that as in my first state.

"My mental sufferings in the near prospect of the transition from either state to the other, but particularly from the first to the second (for I commonly had a presentiment of the change for a short time before it took place), were very great, for I feared I might never revert so as to know again in this world, as I then knew them, those who were dear to me. My feelings, in this respect, were not unlike those of one about to be separated from loved ones by death. During the earlier stages of my disease I had no idea, while in my second state, of employing my time in any thing useful. I cared for nothing but to ramble about, and never tired of walking through the fields and woods. I ate and slept very little. Sometimes for two or three consecutive days and nights I would neither eat nor sleep. I would often conceive prejudices, without cause, against my best friends. These feelings, however, began gradually to wear away, and eventually quite disappeared."

The two lives which Mary Reynolds lived for many years were thus entirely separate. Each was complete in itself, the fragments of which it was composed, though in reality separated by the portions of the other life intervening, succeeded each other in uninterrupted succession, as far as the evidence of her own memory or consciousness was concerned. The thoughts and feelings, the knowledge and experience, the joys and sorrows, the likes and dislikes of the one state did not in any way influence or modify those of the other. But not only were the two lives entirely separate, but her character and habits in the two states were wholly different. In her first state she was

quiet and sedate, sober and pensive, almost to melancholy, with an intellect sound though rather slow in its operations, and apparently singularly destitute of the imaginative faculty. In her second state she was gay and cheerful, extravagantly fond of society, of fun and practical jokes, with a lively fancy and...[one line at end of column did not copy] though...poetical productions appear to have possessed merit of a high order. The difference in her character in the two states was manifested in almost every act and habit. Her handwriting in the one state differed wholly from that of the other. In her natural state the strange double life which she led was the cause of great unhappiness. She looked upon it as a severe affliction from the hand of Providence, and dreaded a relapse into the opposite state, fearing that she might never recover from it, and so might never again in this life know the friends of her youth, nor her parents, the guardians of her childhood. She had a great desire to retain a knowledge and memory of them. But in her abnormal state, though the prospect of changing into her natural state was far from being pleasant to her, yet it was for quite different reasons. She looked upon it as passing from a bright and joyous into a dull and stupid phase of life. Yet to her it was often a source of merriment, and the occasion of frequent humorous deceptions practiced upon her friends.

Having given a general outline of the facts of this singular case, I will not detail such separate incidents as I have been able to collect.

At the time of her first change her brother John was a permanent inhabitant of Meadville. Hearing of her remarkable change he visited her at the old homestead. Of course she did not recognize him. But having been told of his relationship to her, she soon became warmly attached to him, and her affection grew as he repeated his visits during her continuance in her second state.

In her second state she had strong feelings of fondness or dislike to persons. During the early part of her change to an unnatural state her friends found it necessary to keep a watchful eye upon her, and often to put restraint upon her movements. This restraint was never that of physical force, but consisted in prohibitory commands. This excited her displeasure, so that for some time she affected to believe that those about her were not her relatives, as they affirmed that they were.

She became very anxious to visit her brother in Meadville, but her friends did not think it advisable to give her permission. Between one and two years after the first change, and while in her second state, she left home on horseback--an exercise of which she was very fond, and in which she was freely indulged--under pretense of visiting a neighbor. She made the visit--for she always carefully kept the letter of her word, though not always the spirit--but she made her visit very brief, and then rode on to Meadville, a distance of nearly 30 miles.

T2-7442 James Reynolds, of (7441) [John], b 8 Mar 1777 and d 1853, m Nancy Previtt or Prewit, and settled (Buchanan) MO. Issue: John Warrick b 26 Nov 1805 [T2-7443]; Martha; Cynthia; James J.; Levi; William W. b 1813; Hugh B. b 1814 [T2-7453]; and Yerby W. b 30 Jan 1816.

For some time I've been seeking information on T2-7441 John Reynolds. Family history has him a Rev War hero; however, no such record has been found -- at least by several of us around this area who have done a lot of searching. Also, Tillman may be correct about a missing generation since we've found information that John's father was also named John.

T2-6294 Richard Reynolds -- a family story ties us to this ancestor, but we question the accuracy of his birth and marriage dates.

T2-7441 John Reynolds was from (Culpeper) VA as was Patsy (Martha) Gore. In 1794 John bought farm in (Halifax) VA on the Hyco River -- one side of the river was in (Halifax) VA, the other side in (Caswell) NC. He sold this farm in 1804. John married Patsy GORE. About this time the Gores moved to KY and a John Reynolds bought 600 acres in (Montgomery) KY.

T2-7442 James Reynolds, my g-g-grandfather who, with his brother William, came to (Clay) MO in 1818. After 1840 James came to (Buchanan) MO. James Reynolds did not marry Nancy Previtt/Prewit -- he married Frances Smithey of North Carolina. The family history comes from a descendant of William. James and William both died in MO, so it was

definitely the end of our family in VA when they left there. James first went to TN where he was in the War of 1812. I have his papers.

Below is a copy of the will of John Reynolds. I've typed it -- was easy to read except for the gray mare part:

WILL OF JOHN REYNOLDS OF CULPEPER COUNTY, VA

In the name of God Aemn I John Reynolds Sen. of the County of Culpeper this twelfth day of June 1784 being of Sound miind and memory do constitute and ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other Wills and Testaments. In the first place I recommend my Soul to God my Creator thru the mediation of my Saviour Jesus Christ and my Body after my Death to be decently Buried and wehreas I have endeavoured for an honest Livelyhood and by Gods Blessings have acquired a small Fortune in this World I will devise it in manner following here-

Imprimis whereas my son William Reynolds is already provided with Land I give and bequeath my son William Reynolds one Cow-

Item I give and bequeath unto my son John Reynolds his Heirs and assigns that part of my Land on which I now live which is about two thirds of the whole tract to be bounded by Joels Spring Branch and the other part of my Land beyond Joels Spring Branch I give and bequeath unto my son Edward Reynolds and his heirs or assigns-

Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Mildred Wilhite and her Heirs for ever and ever one Grey mareus [mare?]-

Item I desire my beloved wife Jennel Reynolds shall have during her Life one third of my personal Estate and after her Death that it may be divided equally among all my Children only my son William not to enjoy or have any of it.

Item I give and bequeath all the residue of Remainder of my Estate to be equally divided between all my Children my son William Reynold only not to enjoy or have any Part of it.

Item I constitute and appoint Col. Henry Hill and Capt. Henry Field Executors to this my last Will and Testament in Witness whereof I set my Hand and Seal the above mentioned. John (his mark) Reynolds. Signed Sealed and Acknowledged in the Presence of ----. T. Marye, Ben (his mark) Hawkins, Zachariah Wall.

SOLDIERS IN THE CIVIL WAR

FRANKLIN RUNNELS (REYNOLDS), Pvt, Co E, 53 Reg NC, born at Surry in 1841 to William and Hannah Love Runnels of Cook's Mill District. He was living with his widowed mother, Hannah, in the Cook's Mill area in 1860. He was conscripted 16 Oct 1862 when he was 21. He left the company shortly thereafter.

JAMES D. REYNOLDS, Pvt, Co B, 2d Batt NC, bor at Surry in 1843 to Thomas J. and Charlotte Reynolds, farmers of Rockford. He volunteered at Surry 13 Sep 1861 when he was 18; taken prisoner 8 Feb 1862, paroled Elizabeth City 21 Feb 1862; reportedly joined cavalry company 31 Oct 1862.

JOHN T. REYNOLDS, Pvt, Co H, 21 Reg NC, born 1841 at Surry to David and Eden Reynolds, farmers of Rockford. Volunteered 5 Jun 1861 at Surry when he was 20 in one of the first groups to organize and leave the county for training camp after the Civil War began. He was in the Second Battle of Manassas, VA, and suffered a wound in the left ankle 28 Aug 1862. No record after 15 Nov 1863. The Roll of Honor records him as being severely wounded at Second Manassas and as being in other battles. He married at Surry in 1865 Elzabeth Fowler b 1840. Children: Elin F. born 1867; Laura R., 1869; Betta, 1870; and Lucy E., 1871.

VERLIN REYNOLDS, Pvt, Co I, 21 Reg NC, born 1832 to Dudley Reynolds and his first wife unknown. He volunteered at Surry 5 Jun 1861 when he was 19 in the first group to organize for training camp after the Civil War began. No information after 10 Nov 1863. He married at Surry in 1865 Jane Smith. In 1880 they were living in the Westfield District where he farmed. Children: James born 1869 and Joseph born 1876.
