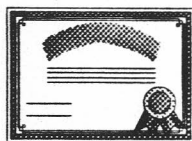

Highlights of the Annual Business Meeting

President Bill King opened the meeting with introduction of new members and first-time attendees. A mention was made of the family reunion of the Maine branch of the Robert of Boston line on 11 Aug, and of the Electious line that occurred on 7 & 8 Aug.

Bill talked about continuing efforts and ideas that promote the family concept. The Board has been active over the past year in making the Board and Association work better.

Treasurer Ed Schott: As of the last report, 10/1/95, there was a cash balance of \$6595. The current cash balance, as of 8/1/96, is \$8154.

The books were audited by three members during the reunion, Joyce Page, Ron Reynolds and Leroy Curtis, who reported that the records were substantially clear, with no exceptions. Some recommendations were made and these will be taken under consideration.

Registrar, Marilyn Newton: Total membership for 1995 was 552. Current membership for 1996 is 456; 57 new members, and 159 non-renewals. We currently have a total of 7 lifetime memberships.

Publications report, Lee Taylor: Members are reminded to send change of addresses as soon as possible, as our newsletter is not forwarded by the Post Office.

Effective 1 Jan 1997, the price to purchase prior year newsletters will be increased to \$12 for each year's volume.

Archivist, Sue Clement: Work on computerizing the archives files continues. Four Family Coordinators have been appointed to this new role, as introduced in *Reynolds Recollections*, and they are ready to assist members with queries and information.

Line Coordination report: Letter from Nancy Smith, who was unable to attend was read by the President.

Brief activity reports were given by the Line Coordinators in attendance, i.e. Bill King - Thomas of Virginia; Sue Clement - Electious; Marilyn Newton - Henry; Lee Taylor - Christopher; Joyce Page - Katherine (Reynolds) Starbuck.

Bill summarized by reporting that diligent research by a number of members has led to the breaking of some long-held RFA traditions, which may be difficult for some members to accept, such as the fact that RFA originally placed all Southern Reynolds into the Christopher of Virginia line, with no distinction or recognition for other probable/possible family lines.

The 72nd Annual Reunion will be held at the Harley Hotel, 151 E Washington St, Orlando FL, 10-11 October 1977, with Norris and Aleta Reynolds as host and hostess. More about this in each future issue of *Recollections*.

Printouts of RFA Archives Data Base

Complete printouts (data dumps) are not available to anyone. The data base (archives) is for RFA to more quickly and efficiently tie families together. Data in the computers comes from copyrighted material, as well as from members who may be planning to publish their family history. Any information that seems remotely related to a member will be passed on to the member, except, rarely, in cases of "protected" information, when a member will be put in touch with the owner of such protected information.

The first line on your mailing label tells you the year for which your dues are paid (pd96), your membership number (1875) and your family line (25), e.g., pd96 1875 25.

Family Group Update by Stephen C. Reynolds, Family Group Coordinator for

David Reynolds, Sr.

First, let me say that I am pleased to have been selected by the RFA to be a charter RFA Family Group Coordinator for the David Reynolds, Sr. family. This David Reynolds is my 4th great-grandfather. He was born abt. 1761, presumably in CT, and died 3-31-1832, in Dennysville, ME, was married to Rebecca Cox (born abt. 1767, and died 3-20-1844, in Dennysville, ME). Since his parents and place/exact date of birth are all unknown, he remains as one of those "pesky" Reynoldses who has yet to be tied into one of the existing, well researched Reynolds family lines.

My paternal grandparents, Ralph Edward (b. 5-23-1892, m. 7-27-1913, d. 11-18-1977) and Pearl Mabel (Oxton) Reynolds (b. 9-24-1892, d. 11-16-1980), who were born in Liberty and Center Montville, ME, respectively, did not know anything about David, Ralph's paternal 2nd great

grandfather, or even his paternal grandfather, Nathaniel Reynolds! Through persistent research, I found out more about these relatives in a short time back in 1984, via long distance telephoning and corresponding while living in Illinois, than my grandparents did during all of their 85+ years!!

After relocating home to Massachusetts in 1993, I went to the local branch office of the National Archives in Waltham, MA, and obtained copies of David's Revolutionary War records from the microfiche library. It was in these records that I learned that David and Rebecca were married on 10-15-1787, in Columbia, ME, by the Rev. Elisha Snow. Earlier, David had enlisted in the Revolutionary War at Lyme, CT in April of 1777 and served until 1780 as a "private in the company commanded by Captain Ely, of the regiment commanded by Colonel Starr in the Connecticut line." He received a monthly pension of \$8, beginning in 1827.

The names and dates of birth for David and Rebecca's nine children were listed on a separate, handwritten document as is indicated below. I have also included their spouses' names, and the dates of marriage and/or death if I had found them elsewhere.

Rebeah Reynolds b. 6-19-1789, d. before 1844.*

David Reynolds, (Jr.) b. 8-15-1792, m. Almira G. Whitney in 1819, d. 4-9-1864.

Isabella Reynolds b. 1-27-1795, m. Simon Page, d. 1863.

Haskell Reynolds b. 12-4-1797, m. Elizabeth Gardner, d. 2-9-1858.

Isaac Reynolds b. 7-18-1800, m. Anna Whitney on 7-10-1819.

Hannah Reynolds b. 7-26-1802, d. before 1844.*

Eliphalet Reynolds b. 6-4-1804, m. Dorcas (?).

Thirza Reynolds b. 1-17-1807, m. (?) Morang.

Eliza Reynolds 11-22-1810, m. Nathaniel Huckings in 1826.

*Note: In 1844, following Rebecca's death, Rebeah and Hannah were not listed among the children/heirs of Rebecca's right to continue collecting David's pension. One must assume that they predeceased their mother.

In David's pension file, there was also an affidavit of an *Eliphalet Reynolds* of Washington County, State of Maine, dated 6-28-1826, in which he "declared that he had known David Reynolds since his (David's) infancy." While this is not absolute proof, I strongly believe that Eliphalet (b. abt. 1759, supposedly in the Stamford, CT area; and d. 2-28-1849 in Addison, ME), was most likely David's older brother. Eliphalet was married to Jemina Tabbut (b. abt. 1758) and to a Phyllis (?). The possible brotherly connection is possibly further evidenced by the fact that David named one of his sons Eliphalet. Therefore, if a record of a CT or lower New England Reynolds family

shows an Eliphalet born about 1759, and a David born about 1761, the key to the lineage of this Reynolds line may finally become established!

It's also possible that a Joshua Reynolds, and a Samuel Reynolds who both enlisted about the same time and into the same regiment as David and Eliphalet, were brothers of David and Eliphalet.

Another sworn statement of David's in these records dated 6-26-1826, indicates that Rebecca, then at the age of 58, "had lost the use of one leg and arm and was unable to any work whatever." In it he also stated that Eliza, then at the age of 16, was able to support herself; and that he had never owned any real estate. One can presume from this document that Rebecca had suffered a stroke.

In 1984, my 5th cousin, Rebecca Hobart of Dennysville, ME, gave me the following information on David Reynolds that was written by Sidney A. Wilder of Pembroke, ME, on June 20, 1892. It was later transcribed from an article which appeared on February 17, 1932 in the *Eastport [ME] Sentinel*:

DAVID REYNOLDS, AN OLD Revolutionary veteran, was for a time a resident of "Pennamaquan Neck", but we cannot learn for how long a period, or do we know where he located his farm. If he had a lot, it was probably on the Pennamaquan bay side and near Hateville Leighton's, as he was employed by the latter. Reynolds moved to No. 10 (Edmunds) in 1792. Although a man well advanced in years, at the breaking out of our last war with Great Britain, the veteran again shouldered his "King's arm" and his son, Haskell [Reynolds], entered his country's service and sturdily bore his part of the hardships and exposure of the long fatiguing march through the forests to the shores of Lake Champlain; participating in the memorable battle of Plattsburg and others, and in the end rejoiced to see his beloved country once more triumphant over her most inveterate foe.

The descendants of David Reynolds are quite numerous throughout Washington County, but we are sorry to learn that some of them have changed the name to *Runnels*. The latter, while it may be an equally honorable one, yet it belongs to the descendants of Samuel Runnels, a pioneer settler of Edmunds.

With respect to Mr. Wilder's description of to where the numerous descendants of David Reynolds, Sr. might have moved, many apparently still live around, in and between Dennysville, Edmunds and Machais, Maine.

RFA Revolutionary War and David Reynolds' pension records show that David enlisted at Lyme, CT, in Capt. Christopher Ely's Co., Col. Josiah Starr's Regt. (1st) of Conn. Line in April 1777. Enlisted August 27, 1777, for 'duration of war'. Engaged left flank Battle of Germantown; wintered Valley Forge in Huntington's Brigade, '77-'78;

Battle of Monmouth, '78; camped White Plains and Redding 1778-'79; '79 on E. side of Hudson (River) repelling Tryon's invasion; part of Regt. In storming Stoney Point, '79; wintered Morristown huts, '78-'80; along the Hudson 1780; wintered "Connecticut Village." (Joshua and Eliphalet Reynolds in same Regt.)

There's another story in the 1923 RFA collection about how David was taken prisoner at Tarrytown, NY, the fall of 1782 and put on board a British frigate but made his escape (jumped ship) at Passamaquoddy Bay in Maine (near Lubec, Washington County, ME). Soon thereafter he met his future wife, Rebecca Cox of Columbia ME.

In 1994, I discovered and met a combination ½ 4th cousin and ¾ 3rd cousin, Frederic Allen Reynolds, a retired, former President of the University of Maine at Machais. Fred lives in Machais with his wife, Norma. He is probably both my 3rd and 4th cousin because David Sr.'s sons, David Jr. and Isaac, married sisters, Almira and Anna Whitney, respectively. Fred's grandfather, Thomas, was the son of Betsy Seeley and Ephraim Reynolds, who was also a son of David Jr. Then, David Jr. and Almira's daughter, Caroline Elizabeth Reynolds, married her double first cousin, Nathaniel Whitney Reynolds, son of Isaac and Anna. These two double first cousins, are my 2nd great-grandparents and 1st cousins 4 times removed!! This also makes my father, Charles Oxtan Reynolds, my 4th and 5th cousin, once removed!

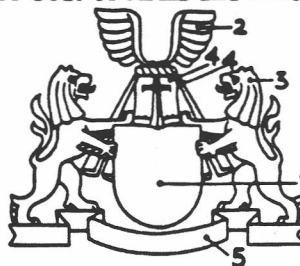
When Caroline died in 1869, Nathaniel married his first cousin Ephraim's ex-wife, Betsy Seeley, and together they raised her son by Ephraim (Thomas) as well as Nathaniel's three surviving children by Caroline, (Isaac, Sarah and Annie). Therefore, Thomas, Fred's grandfather, and Isaac, my great-grandfather, were not only first cousins, they were also step-brothers! Isaac's sisters, Sarah and Annie Reynolds married two brothers, James and Walter Hatt of Machais. Boy, don't such scenarios shake up one's family tree?!

I am the oldest in a Reynolds family of eight children and first cousin to 12 other Reynoldses, all of whom are descendants of David Reynolds, Sr. As self-appointed family genealogist, I would be very happy to hear from other descendants of David Reynolds, Sr. and/or Eliphalet Reynolds. Perhaps, with a concerted effort, we can find exactly where and when these two gents were born and who their parents were!

The World of Heraldry

Genealogists are well schooled in the genealogical resources available for research but sometimes the art and science of heraldry may be overlooked. Even if your immigrant ancestor did not possess a coat of arms when arriving in the New World, his ancestors may have had one.

In England, fortunes were made and lost within a few generations. Queen Elizabeth is only 6 generations away from a plumber ancestor. Most families had arms at some point in their heritage. If arms can be traced, it opens many avenues of research through your line and connected, allied lines.

As all genealogists are aware tracing female lines can be frustrating, but not so through heraldry. The marriage between two families who possess arms is carefully depicted, therefore one knows not only the spouse's name but her father's and other information as to status, i.e., title, manors, locations, etc.



Some "Common" English Surnames

Most genealogists, including many in the United Kingdom, seem to have the impression that surnames ending in -son are characteristically English, and common in most parts of the country. It is also assumed that people with such a name are unlikely to be related. Such attitudes may have some influence on the ways in which a person approaches his or her research, so it is particularly important that genealogists make themselves aware of the fact.

Filial Names

As long ago as 193, I compiled tables of statistics, based on contemporary English telephone directories, which demonstrated that Filial Names, as I described them, were not evenly distributed throughout England even in the 20th century. The tables showed that they were much more prolific in the north of the country than in the south, and although more recent work demonstrates how different the picture can be, even between regions quite close together, the basic conclusion that such names are regional in character has not been challenged. Mackinley, for example, in a recent book, wrote that there was "something in the nature of a boundary running across the North Midlands," dividing the two areas. In parts of the south names with a final -s, e.g. Roberts, Harris and Richards were more usual.

Some Names Have Unique Origins

Filial names are not just regional though. It may be true that those based on common Christian names, e.g., John, William and Richard have several quite distinct family

origins, but it is also the case that a few can be traced to particular parishes and have a unique origin; many more have only a small number of origins. Tillotsons, for example, seem all to descend from a lady called Tillot of Northwood, living in the parish of Kildwick in the 1370s. Tillot was the popular pet-form of Matilda in that part of Yorkshire where she lived; Dysons descend mostly from a formidable lady named Dionesia living in the hamlet of Linthwaite late in the 13th century. Se was often called 'Di' for short.

Scottish Origins

In these cases, the name was more likely to be unique because the progenitor was a woman, but many of the Christian names we may assume to have been very popular in the 1300s, as surnames were becoming hereditary, were in fact far from common. George, for example, was hardly known in England at that time, and Georgeson is usually a name of Lowland Scottish origin. Filial Names developed there much later than they did in England, by which time George was becoming more widely used. Other characteristic Scottish names in this category include Patterson, Cuthbertson, and Davidson, all of which reflect the localised frequency of Christian names hardly used in England in the 1300s and 1400s.

Personal Names as Surnames

Even surnames formed from a very popular personal name such as Robert may not be generally common. Robertson, for example, is certainly more likely to have a Scottish origin than an English one, whereas Robson is usually from the Borders and Robinson is found in the other northern counties. Some of the pet-forms of Rober, e.g. Dob and Hob gave rise to even more distinctively local surnames such as Dobson and Hopkinson.

Don't Be Misled

In fact the diminutives and pet-forms of the common Christian names need to be studied carefully by anybody with a Filial Name. Far too often the dictionaries offer a glib explanation of a surname without even taking fundamental evidence into consideration. Dawson, for example, common in several northern counties, is always said to me 'son of David', and yet it can easily be shown that David was seldom used in the 1300s in those parts of the country. There are question marks also against the traditional origins ascribed to Edmondson, Gemson, Nelson and Pawson to name a few.

Nor must it be assumed that because a name ends in -son that the first element is a Christian name. Clarkson and Cookson are Filial Names based on occupations; Clawson and Frodson derive from place-names; Mason was occupational and Tyson (i.e. firebrand) was a nickname originally. More confusingly Tattersall and Gomersall, both

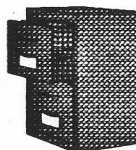
place names, have variants spelt Tatterson and Gummerson, whilst there is frequently confusion between such names as Johnson and Johnston.

(204) On August 27, 1850, Day Wood of Fulton Township, Lancaster County, guardian of Margaret and Hannah **Reynolds**, minor children of Isaac **Reynolds**, late of Fulton Township, acknowledge having received from Vincent **Reynolds**, late guardian \$273. Page 425 Book S-7.

(205) On May 19, 1863, Jacob **Johnson** of Drumore Township, Lancaster County sold to Vincent **Reynolds** a tract of land in Drumore Township, Lancaster County. Page 558 Book C-9.

(206) On Sept. 2, 1853, Thomas **Reynolds**, son and only children of Reuben **Reynolds** late of Little Britian Township, Lancaster County, having attained the age of twenty one years, acknowledges to have received his estate from David Brown, administrator. Page 535 Book C-8

(207) On June 17, 1879, Josiah **Reynolds** and Mary S. **Reynolds** his wife sold to Tyson I. **Reynolds** of Fulton Township, Lancaster County a tract of 124 acres of land in Fulton Township, Lancaster County. Page 615 Book I-11.

(208) On March 15, 1884, Jesse **Tyson**, James W. **Tyson**, executors of last will of Isaac **Tyson Jr.**, of Baltimore, Maryland sold to Tyson I **Reynolds** a tract of land in Lancaster County, sixty six acres. The same tract that had been deeded to Isaac **Reynolds** by Alaiah **Reynolds** and wife. Page 360 Book E-12.

(209) On May 24, 1790, John **Clemson** of Salsbury Township sold to William **Reynolds** of same township, appointed guardian for Mary **Lefever** a minor daughter of Samuel **Lefever** a tract of land in said township. Page 376 Book HH.

(210) On Dec. 1, 1781, Thomas **Evans** and William **Webb**, executors of estate of Samuel **Lefever** sold to William **Reynolds** of Leacock Township, Lancaster County, son-in-law of the said deceased a small tract of land in

Leacock Township. Page 531 Book KK.

(211) On Nov. 9, 1797, Lydia **Lefever** of Strasburg Township, single woman and David **Watson** of Leacock Township and William **Reynolds** of Strasburg Township, farmer entered into agreement about a certain tract of land. Page 126 Book C-3.

(212) Agreement dated in 1802, "to whom present shall come that I Mary **Lefever** a daughter of Samuel **Lefever** late of Strasburg Township, Lancaster County send greetings whereas William **Reynolds** formerly of Leacock Township, but at the time of his death of Strasburg Township, dec., was is in lifetime on May 16, 1789 chosen by me (then a minor above the age of fourteen years) guardian of my part of the **Lefever** estate, and whereas William **Reynolds** then died and on January 27, 1802 I, Mary **Lefever** and Catharine and Samuel **Reynolds**, executors of estate of William **Reynolds** dec., entered an agreement to have John **Feree** and Robert **McIlvaine** settled up the estate. Page 68 Book M-3.

(213) On May 1, 1800, John **Ehrman** of Warwick Township and Mary his wife sold to William **Rennels** of Earl Township a tract of land, 17 acres in Warwick Township, Lancaster County. Page 271 Book R-3.

(214) On April 1, 1871, Henry B. **Hendel**, singleman and John **Shelf** and Catharine his wife all of Reading sold to William **Rineohl** of Adamstown a certain hat factory located in Adamstown. Page 198 Book E-10.

First I deliver my soul into the hands of Almighty God as just the hands of a faithful creator and my body to the dust to be buried in a christian manner as my executors shall think fit and as to my worldly goods which God has been pleased to give me I give and bequeath them in the following manner Imprimis

First I lend to my dear and beloved wife **Mary** Reynolds all my estate real and personal to her during her widowhood not be disturb'd.

Item I give and bequeath to my two sons **Charles** and **Obediah** the tract of land whereon I live for my son **Charles** to have his first choice equally in the s'd tract of land.

Item I give and bequeath all my goods chattels stock and negroes to be equally divided amongst my children hereafter named **Cicily Mary Charles Martha Sarah Obadiah Anna Lurania** [sic].

Item I give and bequeath the tract of land whereon my mother lives lying in Newkent [sic] county after her death to be sold to the highest bidder and the money to be divided amongst the children abovementioned [sic].

And I do by this my last will and testament appoint my dear wife **Mary Reynolds** and my son **Charles Reynolds** and Samuel **Taylor** my executors to pay my debts & receive [sic] my debts and to see that this my last will and testament be fully and fairly and impartially acted according to true intent and liberal meaning of the above words and to revoke disclaim and disannul all four wills whatever to all I set my hand and seal this xxi 21 day of March 1760.
