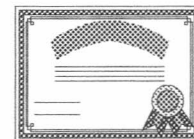

Family Line Update

Unfortunately, nothing is known for sure of the early history of our ancestor Electious **Reynolds**. Many theories have been proposed; that he was related to Henry **Reynolds** of Salem MA, or Dr. John **Reynolds** of Isle of Shoals NH, or William **Reynolds** of Cape Porpoise ME, or Robert **Reynolds** of Boston. He was perhaps French or French-Canadian or Huguenot. He may have been Gaelic, from Wales or Ireland or Scotland, or from England. I think we all have our favorite. But, sadly, the truth is that to this time, no one has been able to provide any shred of evidence for any one of these guesses.

So, if we can't know his history, we can at least look at what we do know of his life. There are many documents that tell us something of the man that Electious was, and of the relationships he had with his family and neighbors.

The first record of Electious is perhaps that in Manchester MA where "Elodius Reynolds" appears on a list of early residents in 1674 in that town. If this is indeed Electious, he would have been just 21 years old, based on other records we have. He fought in King Philip's War, being mustered in December 1675 "on what was called Dedham Plain to march against the Narragansett Fort."

The next records of Electious are in Salem MA. In 1678 he took the Oath of Allegiance there, being recorded as Alexis **Renolds**. That same year he was a court witness to a boundary dispute at Salem Village, Alexius **Reinolds**, age 25 years. On 18 April 1682 Eleckieas (also Alexius) **Ronalls**, aged about 25 years, gave a sworn statement in a case in Salem Quarterly Court. He made a deposition in 1683 (Alexius **Reynolds**; Alixious **Reenolds**). On 19 Sep 1683 Elec **Renalds** was abated 12 shillings. In 1683 Allectius **Rennalds** appeared on a tax list, county rate 1s.8d. On 12 Dec 1684 Eleck **Ranals**, abated, mony 1.8...pay 0.04 6. The name Elisha **Reynolds** appears on a resident list for Manchester in 1684, and it seems likely that this is the same person as Elodius in 1674 and probably our Electious.

There are no records of any deeds for Electious in Salem during this time period. He was, however, paying taxes. It is interesting that the clerk(s) had such a difficult time with his given name. These are all obvious attempts at a phonetic spelling. Some theories propose that his name was actually Alexander. However, since Alexander was a relatively common English name, it is unlikely that clerks would have tried to make it into something more difficult. It seems more likely that faced with something that sounded like "Alexius," clerks may have felt that Alexander was the

easier way out, or the more acceptable Anglicized version.

On 16 July 1686 Electious married Mary **Pease** in Salem, recorded there. His marriage record gives his name as Alexander **Renalds**. The birth of their oldest child, James, was recorded in Manchester 15 Jan 1687 (probably old style), to Eleksha **Renals** and Mary. No other children are recorded in Manchester, and none were recorded in Salem.

In 1691 the name Electius **Ranals** appeared on a list of "Persons gon out of Towne since October, 1689." It has often been proposed that Electious moved his young family away from the Salem area because of the witch trials. Both of Mary's parents were arrested and imprisoned for practicing witchcraft, but they were later released. There is no record of where Electious and Mary may have gone after they left the Salem area.

It is interesting to note that one of the early settlers of Middleboro was John **Haskell**, ancestor of the Middleboro Haskells. John was born in Beverly MA, but left the Salem area before 1680. John's brother was known as "Witchcraft Mark." Family tradition is that Mark **Haskell** was drawn for jury duty to try the so-called witches. He wanted nothing to do with the proceedings, and the night before the trial he packed up and rode away. He supposedly travelled as far as possible without stopping, finally camping on the shores of Lake Assawampsett in Middleboro. He went to his brother who was already living there, and finally settled in Rochester. There is no indication that Electious had any close relations with the Haskell family in Salem, but some acquaintance may have been one reason that Electious chose to move his family to the southeastern Massachusetts area.

There are no records of the births of Isaac and Charles. Perhaps they were born in Manchester or Salem. The first child to have a birth recorded in Middleboro was Mary who was born 20 Sep 1699. Her brother Benjamin's birthdate of 4 Aug 1693 was recorded immediately following hers. It does not indicate whether he was born in Middleboro or not. The births of Hannah on 13 Oct 1702, Ephraim on 14 Feb 1704/5 and Electious on 21 Feb 1706/7 were also recorded in Middleboro, in appropriate chronological order. These births in Middleboro state only that the child was "of Electious **Renolds**," with no mention of the mother's name, but Electious' name was spelled the same way in each of the five records. There is no record in Middleboro of any other children, e.g. the Jacob and Timothy that are sometimes placed in this family.

Electious lived in the part of Middleboro that later became Lakeville in 1853. Mary is never mentioned in any of the Middleboro records, and she did not sign any of the deeds with Electious, although she was apparently still living 1 Apr 1730. There is no record of the fate of either James or Benjamin. It has always been thought that they had died young, but there are no records to support this. In fact, new research has brought to light the fact that James was alive at age 33, when he appeared to acknowledge a deed in Middlesex County MA.

In 1703 Electionus of Middleboro bought a parcel of meadow from Greenfield **Hannaver** of Taunton. In March 1711/12 he bought 80 acres, the eighth and ninth lots in the first division of the Sixteen Shilling Purchase in Middleboro from Ephraim Little of Marshfield. In July 1712 he sold half of the land purchased from Ephraim Little to Thomas Palmer, "together with the house now standing where my son Isaac now liveth." In April 1713 Electionus sold Thomas **Palmer** the remainder of the land he had bought of Ephraim Little, "being the two lots on which I now dwell."

After selling his property to **Palmer**, Electionus removed from Middleboro to Littleton MA, where his eldest son James was apparently already living. On 18 May 1713, "Elixious **Renolds** of Middleborough in the County of Plymouth" bought two parcels of land in Nashoba [Littleton] for thirty pounds each, one parcel from Isaac **Powers** and one from Walter **Powers**, both of Concord MA. On 1 March 1716 "Elixius **Reynolds** of Littleton, husbandman" sold a fifty acre tract of Upland Swamp to Samuel **Dudley** for thirty pounds. This deed was signed by both Electionus and Mary. On 24 Sep 1719 Electionus, still of Littleton, sold for ten pounds to Jonathan **Prescott** a two acre parcel of meadow which "lyeth in a meadow... a little distant from my house where I now live," bounded by "my own meadow."

It appears at this time that Electionus moved back to Middleboro. His son James remained living on the land in Littleton until it was sold on 2 Nov 1719. In a deed dated December 1719, Electionus "of Littleton" bought from John **Jones Junr.** of Marshfield, all of Jones' right and title to a parcel of land in Middleboro in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase.

On 12 Oct 1725 the Congregational Church in the West Precinct of Middleboro was formed. The list of the first members contains the names of twelve men, including that of Electionus **Reynolds**.

There are no other deeds recorded in Plymouth County until 1 April 1730 when land was deeded by Electionus for love and affection to his son Ephraim "for that he hath by bond obliged himself to support me & my wife comfortably & honorably during our natural lives..." In this deed Electionus gives Ephraim two lots of land in Middleboro in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase which were laid out to John **Jones**, the 22nd and 54th lots, the land bought of Jones in 1719. The 22nd lot was at a place called Mad Mare's Neck.

Also on the same day Electionus gave his son Electionus for love and affection, one tract of land in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase and one half of his right to the undivided land in the Purchase.

On 13 Feb 1730/31 Electionus sold to Jacob Green, the third 1 ot in the third allotment in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase. On 25 Feb 1731 Electionus bought from Lemuel Bosworth of Hull, all of the 76th lot of land in the third allotment of the Sixteen Shilling Purchase. This lot was later sold by Electionus Jr. in 1779. It was located between the

western shore of Long Pond and the County road on the east.

In 1734 the lands owed to the soldiers having fought in King Philip's war were granted in Narragansett Township, Greenwich MA. The list for Middleboro includes "Ellexander **Reynolds (Rynge)**, (?) alive." This is a rather cryptic entry, but its intent is lost at this point.

On 21 Apr 1735 Electionus executed a deed on behalf of his son Charles. Charles had sold land that his father had given him in the 25th lot in the third allotment in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase to James **Reed**. In 1735 Reed was deceased, and, the original deed having been lost and never recorded, Electionus executed a deed giving the land to heirs of Reed. This land was originally laid out in the right of John **Jones**, who had sold all rights to Electionus in the deed in 1719.

The deeds signed by Electionus are signed with his mark, a stylized upper case "R". This mark consistently appears in the recorded deeds. In all of the deeds Electionus is called either a yeoman or husbandman.

Electionus died 19 June 1738 in his 85th year, his death being recorded in Middleboro records. He was probably buried on the property near Long Pond where Electionus Jr. lived at the time. There is no probate recorded in Plymouth County for Electionus; any records that might have existed were probably lost. There is no record of Mary's death.

One final note is of a deed dated 26 Feb 1752. Isaac and Charles **Reynolds** both of Middleboro, quit their full right and claim of the third share in the fourth lot in the Assonet Cedar Swamp to Ephraim and Electionus **Reynolds**... "which right originally belonged to John **Jones** and which our honoured father Electius **Reynolds** gave to his four sons, Isaac **Reynolds**, Charles **Reynolds**, Ephraim **Reynolds** and Electionus **Reynolds**..."

New Discovery For the Electionus Line

The battle cry for genealogists should always be "Never give up!" The shred of information that could provide the key to unlocking part, if not all, of the family's secrets could be on that very next piece paper you look at. Such was the case with James² **Reynolds**, the eldest son of Electionus¹.

All previous writings on Electionus and his family have held that he removed from Salem MA to Middleboro MA

about 1690-92, and remained there for the rest of his life. It has also been commonly held that James, the first born son of Electious and Mary, must have died young as no further record of him had been found. New discoveries in the Middlesex County, Mass. Registry of Deeds have proven both of these theories false.

We knew that Electious sold half of his property in Middleboro in July 1712 to Thomas **Palmer**. The following April, 1713, he sold Palmer the remaining half, "being the two lots on which I now dwell." The next deed recorded in Plymouth County for Electious is in December 1719, when he, "of Littleton in the County of Middlesex," bought all right to a parcel of land in Middleboro from John **Jones**.

It is these intervening years from 1713 to 1719 that are now of interest to us. Despite being called of Littleton, it has been held that there were no records of Electious in that town. Actually several deeds were recorded in Middlesex County involving Electious, and there are at least two found to date for his son James up to 1719.

On 18 May 1713 Electious bought two parcels of land in Nashoba [Littleton]. On 1 March 1716 he sold a fifty acre tract of Upland Swamp. This deed was signed by both Electious and by Mary with her mark. On 24 Sep 1719 he sold a two acre parcel of meadow which "lyeth in a meadow called Plain Meadow a little distant from my house where I now live." It was bounded on the south and east by "my own land" and on the north by "my own meadow." Electious signed this deed alone with his mark, and it was witnessed by James **Rennols** and Benoni **Hemenway**. (21:542)

This is undoubtedly Electious' son James, at age 31, who had been presumed dead by previous family researchers! There are three other deeds for James which show that as a young man he settled in Littleton, and, presumably, this was the reason for Electious' removal there.

On 23 Feb 1705/6, Eleazer **Lawrence** of Groton, Isaac **Powers** of Littleton and Jonathan **Persons** of Concord, "for and on behalf of the inhabitants of Nashoba or Littleton" sold for thirty pounds to James **Reynolds** of Littleton two parcels of land in Littleton. The first parcel contained 70 acres and 104 rods of meadow and upland, and the second contained 21 acres and 111 rods (20:182). On 5 Jan 1718, James **Rennols** of Littleton sold for thirty pounds to Thomas **Chamberlin Jr.** of Chelmsford, 21 acres of upland meadow in Littleton (19:431). On 2 Nov 1719, less than two months after his father sold land in Littleton and presumably moved back to Middleboro, James sold land there "where I now dwell or keepphouse," with all meadows, buildings, fences and Orchards. James personally appeared in Middlesex County to acknowledge this deed on 28 Feb 1719/20.

There is no mention of James or Electious in the Vital Records of Littleton. After a thorough search, these deeds represent the only Middlesex County records found to date. But, certainly, the records of James from age 19 to 32 are

very promising. Did he marry and have a family? We may have a whole new branch of Electious descendants waiting to be discovered!

No further records have been found that would hint at what happened to James after presumably leaving Littleton in 1720. There is no evidence that he returned to Middleboro with his father, and based on other records, we can assume that he did not.

RFA Members Write

Murder in Freetown

About 7 o'clock last evening the body of John Bullock, who resided in this city was found a short distance north of the house of Charles **Ashley**, on the road leading from Assonet to Perry's Neck, about ten miles from this city, shockingly mangled. It was evident from the appearance of the ground in the vicinity that a desperate struggle had taken place. Blood was found in his wagon, and in considerable quantities on both sides of the road. There were several buckshot wounds on the lower part of the face, and a serious stab in the abdomen, and one in the neck, and a dozen or more slighter ones on the breast, probably penetrating no farther than the bone. There was also a cut on the upper part of the head, extending back five or six inches from the forehead, laying open the flesh to the bone. His watch, valued at \$100, was missing, also his pocket-book; but a sum of money amounting to nearly \$10, was found in his pocket. The body was found by two peddlers, who alarmed the neighbors.

Sound like a front page story from yesterday's newspaper? Actually the above article appeared in the New Bedford MA *Republican Evening Standard* of Friday, June 20, 1862. Paul **Cyr**, head of the Genealogy Department at the New Bedford Public Library, came across the story while indexing the *Republican*, and between the two of us, we managed to put together all the articles written over a span of almost two years, which I am excerpting here, and piece together the story. So, why is the story of the murder of John **Bullock** of interest to us? Read on...

Marshall **Terry** arrested a young man named Obed **Reynolds**, about 2 o'clock Saturday morning [21 June], at his father's house in Freetown, about three miles from the scene of the murder, on suspicion of having committed the crime. He is known to have had a gun with a very short barrell, and has been identified as the person entering the

woods with the same gun a short time before the deceased. The ramrod found would fit a gun of that description. The gun is missing and the clothes he wore on Thursday cannot be found. The accounts he gives of himself are incoherent and contradictory. He says he sold the gun to a stranger for a dollar and a half. He belongs to the notorious **Reynolds** family so often represented at the Police Court, and says he will be eighteen years old in December. He has a wife living in another part of town. He was dressed when found, and appeared to be much excited.

He was arraigned before the Police Court on Saturday on the charge of murder, pleaded not guilty, and his case was continued until the 28th inst., and he was committed to jail until that time. [26 June 1862]

The next article appeared several months later on 30 March 1863, and it provides an interesting, though uncomplimentary, view of life at the **Reynolds** household. I must apologize in advance to any of you who are directly descended from Obed's family. (Obed himself had no children.) But, this was real life, no matter how uncomfortable it may make us. It is clear, however, that the writers may be a "little biased" against Obed and his family.

Within a few days facts have appeared which throw a new light upon the murder of John **Bullock**, of this city, by Obed **Reynolds**, of Freetown, on the 19th of June 1862.

Trouble has been brewing in the **Reynolds** family ever since the time of the murder, the old gentleman, father of Obed, wishing to make a clean breast of the whole matter of the murder, while his wife and children were coaxing him to unite with them in a plan for securing Obed's acquittal by a scheme of false swearing. As the time for trial approached, the male and female scoundrels made more pressing demands on the husband and father, at last culminating in a threat from his son Daniel to kill him, which has been several times repeated, and for a few days past he has lived with his brother, Noah **Reynolds**, not daring to go home. [Note: Noah was actually his cousin, not his brother.] This state of affairs coming to the knowledge of Marshal **Terry**, that officer, accompanied by Assistants **Dayton** and **Wilbur**, arrested Dan last night, and brought him to this city. This morning William **Reynolds**, the father, with his brother Noah, started for New Bedford to testify against Daniel, but after proceeding two or three miles William **Reynolds** got out of the wagon, and the other, after waiting awhile, looked round and discovered him in the act of cutting his throat with a razor. This was about 6 o'clock. He was immediately taken to the house of Noah **Reynolds, Jr.**, and Dr. **Jennings** of this city was sent for. He has since been brought to this city, and Dr. **Jennings** expresses a slight hope of his recovery from the wound, which is a severe one, grazing the carotid artery. The razor being very old and dull, the toughness and elasticity of the arterial membrane prevented it from being cut.

The testimony of the father, who has the reputation of

being honest, though he has not succeeded in training up his children in the way they should go, is of the first importance. He says that on the evening of the 19th of June he was lying down, and heard someone come into the house. In a few minutes his daughter Phebe came and told him that Obed had come home naked, and she shouldn't wonder if he had killed a man. The next day Obed confessed that he had killed a man at "the Bump place," (where **Bullock's** body was found) shooting and stabbing him, and beating him over the head with his gun. During the day Obed and Dan went off, saying they were going after the watch and money of the murdered man.

Obed's trial began on 19 May 1863 at the Supreme Judicial Court in Taunton MA. The indictment was found at the December term of the Superior Court in 1862 at New Bedford. The first count charged the prisoner with killing John **Bullock** on the 19th June, 1862 at Freetown, by shooting him with a gun loaded with shot. The second count charged that the murder was committed with a knife by inflicting one mortal wound. The third count was similar to the second, except it alleges that **Bullock** died at New Bedford from three mortal wounds so inflicted. The first count was *not pros'd* by the Attorney General. Thirty-two witnesses were called for the prosecution, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Obed's father, William testified against him, in relation to the confession Obed had made the day after the murder. His mother, Phebe, however testified for the defense, and the report of her testimony follows.

Phebe Reynolds, Obed's mother, said that on the morning of the day of the murder Obed was sent to Jarvis **Ashley's**, and said he should go to New Bedford, to get his gun fixed. He left home about 9 o'clock, and returned about half past 11 without his gun. The witness described his clothing entirely different from the government witnesses who saw him between Freetown and New Bedford, and agreeing with the clothes he had on when arrested. He took dinner at home about 12, and remained about the house nearly all afternoon; went away about 7 o'clock and did not return until the next evening. My husband said that Daniel and I had been to the inquest at New Bedford to fix the murder on him. He said he could see it in my eye. We told him not to be so foolish. Heard him say that Daniel had threatened to kill him, and he couldn't stand it, and was going away from that house; he would often go to bed with his clothes on; he would go upstairs and would listen to hear the boys whisper, and was greatly excited; one day he told me he had got Daniel's razor in his pocket and was going to make way with himself; one night he labored under the impression that he was dying, and wanted us all to forgive him; said he might as well die then as at any time.

Phebe **Reynolds**, Obed's sister, and Daniel **Reynolds**, his brother, corroborated their mother's story. Thaddeus **Reynolds**, William's brother, also testified, stating that William had frequently accused him of being in secret

conversation with officers, and trying to make him out the murderer. William finally told him that Obed had admitted killing a man. In rebuttal, several witnesses were called that testified to William's sanity since the murder, one stating that he was as "calm and rational as ever." At the close of arguments, on 21 May 1863, the jury was retired, and deliberated for about 3 hours. They returned a verdict of "Guilty of Murder in the first degree," and Obed was taken to jail to await sentencing. The Court convened the following morning, and Obed **Reynolds** was sentenced to be hung.

Republican Standard, 24 December 1863: The reward of \$300, which was offered for testimony to secure the conviction of the murderer of John **Bullock**, has been awarded by District-Attorney **Marston**, to whom the matter was referred, to William **Reynolds**, William O. **Russell**, Luther M. **Dayton**, Lemuel C. **Wilbur**, Elias **Terry**, and fifteen other witnesses in the case, in sums ranging from \$50 to \$5.

Republican Standard, 14 January 1864: We learn that the sentence of death which was passed upon Obed **Reynolds** of Freetown, for the murder of John **Bullock** of New Bedford, has been commuted by the Governor and Council to imprisonment for life. The above was the last official act of the Executive Council of 1863.

Republican Standard, 21 January 1864: Obed **Reynolds**, the murderer, who has been lying in jail in this city under sentence of death, having had his sentence commuted to imprisonment in the state prison for life, was taken to Charlestown by the jailer, Charles D. **Burt**, Esq., on Monday.

Obed apparently died in prison in April 1876, although I haven't yet looked at his death record. He is buried in the family plot with his parents and several siblings, in the cemetery on Pine Island Road in N. Dartmouth, not far from where they lived in East Freetown.

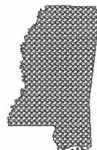

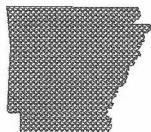

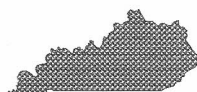
