**Rappahannock River Series – Part V
James Rennolds of Gloucester/Essex Co., VA**

As was reported in the earlier R River series article on James Rennolds I, he was 1st married to Sarah & was living in Gloucester, VA. Sarah appears to have died ca 1700. For in 1703, James was married to Susanna, when they gave his sons James II & Thomas, 500 acres of l& each; from this time on, James & Susanna lived in Essex Co., VA.

James & Susanna Rennolds had the following children: Violetta, Benjamin, Hannah, Susanna & Joseph. In his will, James Rennolds I, made his first sons by each marriage the executors of his estate, i.e. James II & Benjamin. One would assume from this that Benjamin was of legal age; apparently, he was not for on 20 Jan 1724, he, by his own petition, chose Nicholas Davis as his guardian. On 22 Aug 1728, Benjamin Rennolds 'prayers' that a Probate of Lost Will & Testament of James Rennolds, his father, dec'd, maybe granted to him & on 20 Nov 1728, Benjamin Rennolds & William Picket were bonded for Benjamin to be Executor of James Rennolds, dec'd. Thus, Benjamin was of legal age by 1728.

James Rennolds I gave his second wife, Susanna, in his second will of 8 Feb 1723/24, her dower 1/3 & property to each of their children with 1/4 of his main l& to Benjamin & his l& in Gloucester Co. to Joseph. [Note: Tillman did not have any of James Rennolds' second family in his books.]

Benjamin Rennolds looked after his mother's affairs. Susanna Rennolds married a Thomas Holland & lived in the area for a while. On more than one occasion, Susanna Holland petitioned the Court to allow her annual payments to maintain her 3 younger children: Hannah, Susanna & Joseph. On 19 Sept 1737, Benjamin Rennolds, Sarah, his wife, & Susanna Holland, his mother, of Caroline Co., sold to James Rennolds [Jr.] [carpenter] pf Parrish of St. Anne, Essex Co. 230 acres [this was probably James Rennolds III]. I saw nothing to indicate what became of Thomas & Susanna Holland after 1737.

Second Generation of James Rennolds I Second Family

1. Benjamin Rennolds son of James I & Susanna. Caroline Co. VA was formed in 1727 from Essex, King & Queen, and King William Co.'s of VA. In 1729, Benjamin Rennolds was Deputy Sheriff of Caroline Co., the position he held for a number of years, probably until his death. In addition to being deputy or 'under-sheriff' of Caroline Co., Benjamin

owned a tavern & Ordinary at the Court House area; and he was to be the tobacco inspector at Roy's warehouse in October 1742.

Benjamin was married to a Sarah, probably as early as 1728; they lived in St. Margaret's District of Caroline Co. They had several sons: William, James, John, Benjamin & Thomas. I assume that there were also daughters but saw no evidence that identified them. Possible married names might be: Hawes, Herndorn, Hord, May, Munday, Sneed and Tompkins.

Benjamin died in Dec 1742 and left a will: his wife, Sarah, was the executrix of his estate. Sarah Rennolds acknowledged her deed of land in 1745, indented to William Rennolds & several other of her children. [Note: Since Caroline Co. was a burnt out county no details of the above documents are known. It is assumed that following her indentures to her children, Sarah married a James Young and lived until after 1777.

2. Violetta Rennolds, daughter of James I & Susanna Rennolds, married John Ritterford [Rutherford] II in 1727. John & Violetta Rutherford also lived in Cumberland, Augusta & Botencourt Co.'s of VA. Susanna preceded John in death; he dying in Logan's Fort Stanford, KY in 1789. Their children were: William, John Joseph, Sarah, Benjamin, Larkin & Catherine.

3. Hannah Rennolds had married James Nelson by 1731 & lived, for a while, in King George Co., VA. James Nelson's mother, Frances, was married to an Edward Newgent and she died ca 1759.

The James & Hannah [Rennolds] Nelson family was in Spotsylvania Co., VA by 1764 when James Nelson, Jr. died. His legatees were his parents, & his brothers and sisters: John, Joseph, Benjamin, William and Mary Ann Nelson. Some of the family was later in Louisa Co., VA. James & Hannah [Rennolds] Nelson owned at least 451 acres of land in Spotsylvania and died between 1780 and 1796.

4. Joseph Rennolds, probably spent time in Gloucester, Essex & Caroline Co.'s of VA. He received 200 acres of land in Gloucester Co., from his father, James Rennolds I. There were other Joseph Reynolds' in the area &, thus, I was unable to determine which is this particular Joseph. A possibility would be the one with wife Martha; possible children might be: Joseph, Benjamin & Thomas.

Third Generation of James Rennolds I Second Family

1. William Rennolds, son of Benjamin & Sarah, appears to have been a soldier in the French and Indian War for it was restated 9 Mar 1780 in Caroline Co., when a warrant of 50 acres was issued to John Hord, assignee of William Rennolds, a soldier until 1758.

On 12 Apr 1745, Sarah Rennolds, widow of Benjamin, acknowledged her deed of land indented to William Rennolds and several other of her children. This would imply that William was probably the eldest son of Benjamin & Sarah. William always appeared to take lead roles in court proceedings, etc. in family matters which would support this position. On 10 Sept 1767, Thomas Dillard Harris & Rashel, his wife, deeded something to William Rennolds – could they have been his in-laws?

William Rennolds' brother, John Rennolds, died ca 1775 – 1777, leaving 4 young children. William's mother, Sarah, may have died ca 1777/78. At any rate, William's brother James died 1778 and his will was proved 11 Nov 1778. It is possible that James Rennolds may have had some estate management responsibilities for his brother John's and his mother Sarah's estates in addition to his own gifts as stated in his will. On 14 Jan 1779, Robert & Bernard, orphans of John Rennolds, chose their uncle William Rennolds as their guardian. Also, William was appointed the guardian of Lucy & Jacob Rennolds, orphans of John. The division of the estate, and the land & slaves was returned on 12 Feb 1780 according to James Rennolds' will. There was also a chancery suit filed in the April Court by Benjamin Rennolds, Thomas Rennolds, and by Robert Rennolds, Jacob Rennolds, Bernard Rennolds & Lucy Rennolds, children of John Rennolds, dec'd by William Rennolds, their guardian, against Elizabeth Rennolds, widow of James Rennolds, dec'd. The suit was later 'dismissed agreed'. On 14 Apr 1780, a deed indented from Benjamin Rennolds, Thomas Rennolds, and William Rennolds to George Buckner was approved and ordered to be certified. I assume that this was for land received by them from their brother James' estate. When taxes began in 1783, William Rennolds was not in Caroline Co. I believe that William, and possibly his brother, Thomas, departed Caroline Co. ca 1780/81. There is sufficient evidence to indicate that William & Thomas

Rennolds were in Edgefield District, SC. I believe that William Rennolds in Tillman's family line [see William Reynolds, T2-7078, & my article in RR, Vol. 18 6 of 6, of Nov – Dec 2000 issue, pg 59].

See Tillman's William Reynolds, T2-7078. He shows William Reynolds as married to Margaret Harris with children: Fielding, Francis, Catherine [m. FNU Burton], Sally [m. FNU Dixon], James Abraham, Margaret [m. Joseph Jennings], Benjamin, William Lewis, John & Larkin. We know that Benjamin & Larkin are sons of William's brother, Benjamin Rennolds. Tillman shows extended families from Fielding, T2-7079 [Tillman's line], Francis T2-7116, William Lewis T2-7118 [Strom Thurmond's line] and James Abraham T2-7217.

2. James Rennolds, son of Benjamin & Sarah, was in evidence and an adult by 1751. In 1755, James and his wife, Eliza, sold 300 acres of land in Spotsylvania Co., VA. It was given to his wife, Eliza [Elizabeth] by Michael Ginney. In Mar 1751, Thomas Rennolds, his younger brother, chose James as his guardian and bound himself to James to learn a trade & until the age of 21 years.

James' will was proved on 5 Oct 1778. he had acquired acreage and had a number of slaves. He divided his estate between his wife Elizabeth and his brothers: William, Benjamin, Thomas and his brother John's children [Robert, Bernard, Lucy & Jacob. Apparently, James had no children. His widow paid taxes until 1788.

3. John Rennolds, son of Benjamin & Sarah Rennolds was probably an adult, married & in business for himself by 1762. I believe that John and Elizabeth, his wife, were married ca 1759 & that their eldest child, Robert, was born abt. 1759/60. John was involved in many court cases, generally where he was the plaintiff, which would indicate that he was a businessman and that others owed him money. He was in evidence up through 1772.

I could find no facts to indicate when John died or anything about his estate settlement. I assume that he died between Sep 1776 and Nov 1777, when the Caroline Co. Order Book records are missing. All Wills & deed Books are also missing. John & Elizabeth Rennolds had the following children: Robert, Bernard, Lucy & Jacob. Elizabeth Rennolds paid taxes until 1804 when it is presumed she died.

4. Benjamin Rennolds, II, son of Benjamin & Sarah, was in evidence in Caroline Co by 1751. he served as a soldier in the French & Indian War until

discharged [ca 1760]; thus was restated 10 Feb 1780 in Caroline Co. when a warrant for 50 acres was issued to Benjamin Rennal/Runnels, a soldier in the 1st VA Regt of Col. George Washington.

In Dec 1777, a deed from Sarah Young, Benjamin's mother, to Benjamin was proved [this is about the last reference to Sarah Young; I assume she died thereafter]. I could not discern that there was more than 1 Benjamin Rennolds in Caroline Co. in the 1760's/1770's. However, there were at least 2 – for 1 died in 1779 & our Benjamin Rennolds lived on.

Benjamin was taxed in 1783 for 399 acres in Caroline Co. In 1785, he sold this acreage in 2 parcels & this is the last I saw of him in Caroline Co. Benjamin is deeded 250 acres in Spotsylvania Co., VA in 1787; 2 of the witnesses were Rob & Bernard Rennolds [his nephews]. Benjamin appears to have lived the remainder of his life in Spotsylvania Co.

Benjamin was married to Ann Reynolds, a dtr of Cornelius Reynolds; all of his children appear to be with Ann Reynolds. He later married an Elizabeth, as early as 1795.

His will was recorded 4 Nov 1811. he left his estate to his wife & children, & also to the orphans of his son, Larkin. A witness said that Larkin Reynolds' children were: John V., Benjamin, Caswell & Mahala. [The necessity for such a witness implies that Larkin's orphans were not in Spotsylvania Co.; since she did not name all of his children, those named must have been those that he had when he left Spotsylvania Co.]. Benjamin Reynolds' heirs were his wife Elizabeth [Eliza] & James Akers [ne: Lucy Reynolds], Patsy McKenny, Elizabeth Betsey Reynolds, Benjamin Reynolds, William Reynolds & Larkin Reynolds' orphans. Benjamin may have had another son, Thomas, since a Thomas Rennolds died in Spotsylvania Co. in 1796 and a Benjamin Rennolds was appointed his administrator. In Edgefield District, SC, Larkin Reynolds' children by his wife Elizabeth Arnold appear to be: John Vincent, Benjamin, Caswell, Mahala, Beven, Nancy, Larkin & Benjamin Reynolds III. By his 2nd wife, Barbara Arnold, they are Richard, William, Robert, Bennett, Benjamin Washington & several daughters [these are my best 'guesses' since 3 of the sons shown by Tillman for Benjamin are Larkin Reynolds' children.]

5. **Thomas Rennolds**, son of Benjamin & Sarah, chose his brother, James, as his guardian & bound himself to James until age 21 as an apprentice [12 Mar 1751]; Thomas was at least 16 at this time.

There were at least 3 Thomas Rennolds/Reynolds in Caroline Co. in the time period between 1760 – 1770. Thus it is hard to separate them. One married to Ann Elizabeth, died in 1775; another married an Ann & eventually moved to Botencourt Co., VA & died in 1803. His wife went on to Marion Co., VA and died in 1810.

Our Thomas Rennolds was still in Caroline Co in 1778/1780, when his brother James' estate was being settled. Our Thomas was not on the Caroline Co. Tax Rolls in 1783. It's my present belief that Thomas left Caroline Co. in 1780/81 with his brother, William, and settled in Edgefield District, SC.

Tillman has Thomas Reynolds T2-7235 married to Nancy Harris in Edgefield District, SC with children Thomas, Nancy, Elisha, Matilda [m (1) John H. Brown & (2) ? Scott], Reuben Ellis, William Lewis, James Wiley, Lawson, Elijah and Sophia [m. Joseph Whittle]. Tillman also shows extended families for Thomas T2-7236, James Wiley T2-7271, Lawson T2-7293, Elisha T2-7294, Elijah T2-7304/1 & Reuben Ellis T2-7316.

Name: J. N. Reynolds, M. D. Homeopathic Physician and Surgeon, of Grand Haven, MI, was born in Porter Co., IND Aug 24, 1844. His father, Justus Reynolds, was a prominent farmer and stock-raiser. When about eight years of age, Mr. Reynolds removed, with his parents, to Ingersoll, Canada, where he received a thorough classical education, and determined to study medicine. At the age of twenty, he entered, as a student, the office of Dr. W. Springer, a prominent homeopathic physician of Ingersoll, with whom he remained one year. He then entered the Cleveland Homeopathic Medical College, where he made rapid progress. After six months, he returned to Ingersoll, and spent a second year with Mr. Springer. In Nov 1866, he removed to St. Louis, and entered the Missouri Homeopathic Medical College, from which he graduated in the spring of 1867. He practiced six months in Baltimore, MI, and then removed to St. Clair, where he remained one year, in partnership with Dr. G. Palmer. In Nov 1869, he removed to Grand Haven, where he still resides. Although young, Doctor Reynolds has acquired a very lucrative practice, and ranks among the best physicians in the State. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and is liberal in his religious views. He belongs to the Masonic Fraternity. He has always been a Democrat. In Sept, 1869, he was married to Miss Florence E. Keeler, eldest daughter of Captain S. C. Keeler, formerly of Detroit. Captain Keeler was formerly a prominent steamboat proprietor, and invented the

plan of building steam-tugs with elevated cabins; he now resides in South America. Doctor Reynolds has had four children, two of whom are living.

Pg. 213 Professor James L. **Reynolds**, D. D., died in Greenville SC. Dec 18th 1877 of Paralysis. The writer has known the deceased for many years... attaches a memorial of the deceased from the Charleston News & Courier.... "James Lawrence Reynolds, D. D. Dr. Reynolds was the son of George N. Reynolds, Esq., and was born in Charleston, the 17th of March 1812. He received his academic education at Charleston College. His theological course was taken at the Newton Seminary (in the suburbs of Boston), perhaps the oldest and most famous of the Baptist theological schools in this country. Returning to this city, he married Miss Charlotte **Smith**, the accomplished daughter of Benjamin Smith, Esq., and sister of Dr. J. Lawrence Smith, the eminent scientist, now of Louisville, KY. Immediately after his marriage, Dr. Reynolds settled in Columbia as pastor of the Baptist Church in that city."

In 1735, Elisha **Gatchell** took out a warrant for 600 acres, which was laid on the southern part, and which he divided with Henry **Reynolds**, each one taking 300 acres and allowance, for which each one obtained a patent, dated July 8, 1737. These surveys make 1100 acres, and with the usual allowance very nearly 1200 acres, or, strictly, 1166 acres. Alexander **Ross** sold his part to John **Jamison**, who on 4 Mar 1742, added a warrant of his own for 142 acres. These lands remained in the Jamison family for many years, other lands being added to them and afterwards alienated. Of the whole 1200 acres, together with the various additions, but little now remains to the family of the early possessors. A small portion of the additions still belongs to the Jamisons, while James **Peebles**, a lineal descendant in the sixth degree of the original Henry Reynolds, still holds about 100 acres of the

original 300. All the rest has passed into other hands. Gatchell's 300 acres were early disposed of, divided, and conveyed. The late Joseph **Ballance** held about one-half of it, and since his time it has been repeatedly sold. George **Hershom** and others are now the owners of it. The other half belongs to Joseph C. Jamison, now or late Jacob **Proctor**, lately the **Ashton** girls, and others. Reynolds' 300 acres are now owned by James **Peebles**, William **King**, heirs of William N. **Griffith**, and others. Henry Reynolds, however, took up other land, some of which still remains to his family, though only a small part of the whole. He boasted that he owned seven farms at one time, and that he could stand on his own ground and view them all. His great-grandson, Josiah Reynolds, held two hundred and twenty-six acres of this, which he devised to his children, where most of it still remains. The heirs of his son, John Reynolds, hold 132 acres of this; the heirs of his daughter, Maria **Peebles**, have 29 acres; Sarah **Philips**, another daughter, had 35 acres, part of which she still retains; and Rachel J. **Pickering**, another daughter, has 29 acres. Beside what has been mentioned, and possibly some small pieces not noted, all has passed into other hands. Verily, one generation gathereth together and another generation scattereth abroad, so uncertain are earthly things and human fortunes.

Tidbits

This bit of information comes from the Mayflower Descendant, Winter 2001, pg. 65, which credits the RI Genealogical Society Newsletter, which credits the Boulder Genealogical Society Newsletter that credits the Platte County, MO, Historical/Genealogical Society.

In order to calculate a birth date from the age given on a gravestone, the magic number to remember is 8870. Given the date from a gravestone of May 6, 1889, age 71 years, 7 months, & 9 days, compute the date as follows:

Death date=18890506

Subtract age at death=-710709 = 18179797

Subtract the magic number=-8870 = 18170927

Thus, the Year=1817, month=9, day=27, or 27 September 1817!!

Susannah (Sukie) Malone, daughter of Daniel Malone, Sr. James Reynolds who was born at least by 1750 or earlier is first found witnessing mortgages for a firm of Glasgow (Scotland?) in Lunenburg County, VA c. 1772. One thought is that he came directly from Scotland with that firm. No other Reynolds are found in Lunenburg to be his relatives. Perhaps he does not connect with other Reynolds lines in VA at all. The marriage is proved with a deed of gift of land from Daniel Malone. The family moved to Halifax Co., VA by 1795 where Susannah was dec'd. before 1795. Her father died with a will in 1795 with James Reynolds as a witness. Daniel Malone had land in GA in his will and James Reynolds and some Malone relations are found there in Oglethorpe and Greene Co., GA by 1798. James Reynolds (Runnells) died with a will in Greene County, GA in 1822 and named his children. The logical connection of this James Reynolds would be to those in Isle of Wight because of the county creations, but that has not proved to be true. There seem to be few men named James Reynolds in Isle of Wight County, VA & those there do not fit his age bracket and location. It has taken since 1964 to prove James Reynolds out of GA and it was not accomplished until May, 2001. A Malone researcher and a Greer researcher who subscribe to the Greene County, GA, List at Rootsweb saw Mrs Cates' posting. They had records of a James Reynolds in their research and had no idea how he was connected to their families.
