OUT OF THE PAST

From the 1923 RFA Annual

William Edward Reynolds, Rear Admiral, U.S. Coast Guard, whose portrait is reproduced on the frontispiece of this Annual, was born in Montgomery County, Maryland, 11 Jan 1860, the 3rd son of Greenbury and Naomi (**Fawcett**) Reynolds, of the Maryland branch of the Reynolds Family. His father died in 1861, and his mother in 1875.

He lived in Maryland until 1875, when the family removed to Washington DC. He attended the public schools in MD and the DC. In the spring of 1878 he was successful in a competitive examination for a cadetship in the U.S. Revenue-cutter Service (now the U.S. Coastguard) and joined the practice cutter *S.P. Chase*, a bark-rigged sailing vessel, at New Bedford MA, in the summer of that year. Two years later he graduated number one in his class and was commissioned a 3rd Lieutenant. He served on a number of vessels on various stations; his last regular sea duty was in command of the *Seneca* at New York. This vessel had just been constructed as a derelict destroyer, the first vessel ever built by an country for such work. He passed through the several grades, attaining his present rank of Rear Admiral, USCG, Jan. 13, 1923.

In the spring of 1881, he joined the *Corwin* at San Francisco just prior to the sailing of that vessel on the *Jeanette* Relief Expedition. The *Corwin* also searched the Arctic Ocean that season for the missing whale ships *Mt. Wollaston* and *Vigilant*. He was one of the party of three sent out from the *Corwin* to proceed along the coast of Siberia in search of missing vessels. This trip was made by sled dogs on the north coast of Siberia and on the Arctic ice adjacent thereto; the party was absent a month. Information was obtained regarding the fate of the whale ships, and some rumors concerning the *Jeanette*. In August of the same season he was one of the boat's crew from the *Corwin* that made a landing on Wrangell Land, this being the first known landing on that Island; he planted the flag taking possession in the name of the USA. This was August 12, 1881. He cruised in Alaskan and Arctic waters the following seasons also.

He served several tour of duty at the Coast Guard Academy, the last being for approximately five years as its Superintendent and as the commanding officer of the practice ship. A number of cruises were made to European waters.

During the years, 1890-93, while on duty at Washington, he attended Georgetown University Law School night classes, receiving the degrees LLB and LL.M. He was a special student at Cornell University, taking the course in naval architecture and ship-building, during the college year 1893-94. In the summer of 1894 he attended the Naval War College at Newport, Rhode Island. He served as Superintendent of Construction and Coast Guard during the period 1909-1912. In 1912, he was assigned to duty in command of the Southern Division, San Francisco. During three summer seasons of 1912, 1913, 1914, he had charge of the patrol force in the North Pacific Ocean and Bering Sea, with headquarters at Unalaska.

When war was declared with Spain in 1898, he was in command of a cutter with HQ at Key West and was directed to report to Admiral Sampson, US Navy, for duty. He served actively throughout the war. Upon the entry of the U.S. into the World War, the Coast Guard (the Revenue-Cutter Service and the Life-Saving Service having been combined in 1915 to form the US Coast Guard) automatically became a part of the Navy and he was made Chief of Staff, 12th Naval District, San Francisco. Early in the fall of 1919 he was ordered to Coast Guard HQ, Washing-

ton DC, and in October of that year was commissioned as Commandant of the coast Guard by the President, which office he now holds.

In 1885, he was married to Minnie G. COLLINS of Washington DC, who died in 1910. In 1912, he married 2nd Nell Groome BATES, whose maternal grandmother, before her marriage to Francis Bates, in 1837, at Steubenville OH, was Catharine Anne REYNOLDS.

TODAY

William Lewis King, Captain, U.S. Coast Guard, Retired

William Lewis King, who is the President of RFA, graduated from high school in 1947 at Owensboro, Davies, OH. In 1948, he joined the Navy and attended the U.S. Military Academy Preparatory School for a year, after which he entered the Coast Guard Academy and graduated in 1953.

His sea duty on five different ships for five continuous years saw homeports of Honolulu, San Francisco, Honolulu, and New Bedford. This duty included Engineer Officer on the USCG Cutter *Escanaba*, with one tour at the Naval Engineering Branch of the 3rd District (New York) as the Small Boat Maintenance and Repair Officer.

From 1961 to 1963, he attended Graduate School at University of Michigan, received Master of Science in Engineering Degree (Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering).

He spent 1963-1966 at Shipbuilding for CG in Sturgeon Bay WI, building the CGC vessels *Active*, *Clamp*, and *Wedge*. This was followed by over four years in the Shipbuilding Div in HQ, Wash. DC, with half this time as the [cutter] "type desk" for building 378 type Coast Guard cutters.

His next tour, over two years, was as Chief Engineer for the National Buoy Project, a Coast Guard/NOAA project located at the NASA Test Facility in southern MS. This was followed by one year as Chief, Naval Engineering Branch in the 8th District (New Orleans).

From 1974 to 1978 he was Chief of a Division in Research & Development, HQ, Wash. DC, responsible for R&D needs of the operational Coast Guard. From this, he went to Commanding Officer of the Greater Antilles Section, USCG, responsible for all the CG activities in the Caribbean Region.

From 1981 to 1983, it was back to Wash. DC, as Deputy Office Chief of the Office of R&D, from where he retired in 1983 after 30 years with the USCG.

For the next three years, he was an Arthur Young consultant to the Military Sealift Command, U.S. Navy. After which he *really retired*, and built their retirement home in Westmoreland Co. VA.

Since his retirement he has been active in many activities, local civic and property owners associations: Hospice, TROA, Navy League, Westmoreland Players and (little theater), Historical Society, President of the local genealogy association, and for 12 years was the treasurer of their parish, Cople Parish, Episcopal Church.

His hobbies include genealogy, boating and fishing, the Reynolds Family Association, of which he is the president, as well as the Line Coordinator for his ancestor, James Reynolds of Sussex Co. VA.

Capt. King was married to Helen Ferenbaugh of Columbus OH in 1955. They have two daughters:

Tina, grad. Hanover College, IN, mar. to Sean Spears, and has two children Christa (16) and Will (12). They currently live in Cary NC, where Sean is engaged in pharmaceutical sales.

Tove, grad Randolph-Macon, Ashland VA, currently living in Charlotte NC where she is sales manager for the Charlotte Convention Center, arranging trade shows for Charlotte NC.

THOSE STRANGE REYNOLDS OF EAST KILLINGLY CT.

CHRONOLOGY OF THE REYNOLDS FAMILIES OF VIRGINIA

The fact that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., was listed in the 1625 military muster reveals that he survived the Indian attacks on the Colonial Virginia settlements and was an active member of the Colonial Virginia militia in Warrosquyoake. Though no documentation is provided, Robert A. Reynolds of the Reynolds Family Association lists that on 18 Mar 1625, Christopher Reynolds appeared in General Court at Jamestown and swore that he, as secretary to Robert BENNETT, had seen and read Peter COLLINS' indenture and that it said that Collins was bound to serve Mr. Bennett for four years from 1621. Though there is no reference to Christopher Reynolds as having been the secretary of Robert Bennett, Sybil "Lee" Taylor provides the following: 13 Mar 1625/6, *Minutes of the Council and General Court of Virginia*, 2nd Edition, published in 1979, Richmond, Edited by H.R. MCILWAINE; "Before the General Court at Jamestown, Virginia: Christopher Reighnalls, sworne and examined sayeth that he did see and read Peter Collins indenture and that he was bound to serve Mr. Bennett four years." Notice the spelling of Christopher's name in this deposition: "Christopher Reighnalls, sworne and examined sayeth that he did see and read Peter Collins indenture and that he was bound to serve Mr. Bennett four years." Notice that it is an unusual spelling for the Reynolds surname which no doubt many previous researchers had not discovered. The above deposition

indicates that at least some, possibly all of the servants of Edward Bennett's tobacco plantation at Warrosquyoake were indentured to him for a period of about four years in order to pay for their passage to Virginia and provide employment once they arrived. No doubt Christopher Reynolds was also an indentured servant. According to the 1625 muster listed above which lists: "Peter Collins in the *Addam* 1621," Peter Collins immigrated to Virginia as an indentured servant of Edward Bennett in 1621. Hence, Peter Collins would have fulfilled his indenture agreement in 1625, the same year that Christopher Reynolds provided his deposition. This indicates that Christopher Reynolds's deposition was in favor of Peter Collins who appears to have recently completed his indentured service to Mr. Edward Bennett. Though some Reynolds family genealogists have interpreted the fact that Christopher Reynolds "...did see and read Peter Collins indentures..." to indicate that he was the secretary to Mr. Bennett, Christopher Reynolds merely provided his testimony in this deposition. As indicated above, this testimony appears to have been against Mr. Edward Bennett and in favor of Peter Collins who appears to have recently completed his indentured service to Mr. Edward Bennett. There is no reference to Christopher as having been the secretary to Mr. Bennett. There is also no reference to Christopher Reynolds traveling to England with Mr. Bennett as his secretary to secure a monopoly in the tobacco trade as suggested by some Reynolds family genealogists. However, it is interesting to note that according to this deposition, Christopher Reynolds appears to have been able to read. This indicates that he received some education. If this was the same Christopher Reynolds who was born in 1611, i.e. age twenty four when he transported nine servants to Virginia aboard the *Speedwell* in 1635, then he would have been age fourteen or fifteen when he provided this deposition. Provided that Christopher Reynolds was also bound to Edward Bennett for four years of indentured service, from the date of his original arrival in Virginia aboard the *John & Francis* in 1622, Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant would have fulfilled his indentured service sometime in 1626/7. However, it is possible that he was obligated for a period longer than four years. 16 Mar 1634/5, *Virginia Magazine of History & Biography*, Vol. XVIII, Virginia Gleanings in England, p. 308; Christopher Reynolds, son of George Reynolds deceased and brother of Anne Reynolds listed

as kinsmen in will of Henry **Hobson** of City of Bristol, Inn Holder (Doc.#173a-c) According to the notes accompanying the publication of this will, Henry Hobson was a Mayor of Bristol, England. His grandson, Miles **Cary**, was the emigrant to Virginia. Though there is no direct connection to Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant of Isle of Wight Co., listed in this will, the name pattern of a Christopher Reynolds listed as the son of George Reynolds is intriguing when compared with the information on the Reynolds families of Gravesend in County Kent and London.

Hence, additional research could be conducted in the records of Bristol in order to ascertain if there is a connection between Christopher Reynolds, Sr., of Isle of Wight and the Reynolds families of Bristol. 21 Dec 1634, *Seventeenth Century Isle of Wight County, Virginia*, by John B. BODDIE, p. 531, Isle of Wight County Deeds, Bk. A, p.103; Christopher Reynolds of Warwickqueak [Warrosquyoake County] obtained 100 acre patent from Robert Sabine of Warrisquick [Warrosquyoake County] Bay, Witnesses: Robert CRAMPORNE and Thomas COARKMAN (as shown in the deed of Wassell WEBLING and George FAWDON from Justinian Cooper and wife) (Doc.#131ac, 135b) This is the first record of Christopher Reynolds, Sr., obtaining land in Virginia. From the year of Christopher Reynolds, Sr.'s arrival in Virginia in 1622, it was twelve years later in 1634 before he purchased land. This information and the information above appears to confirm that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant, was an indentured servant of Mr. Edward Bennett. This also appears to support the theory that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., originally immigrated to Colonial Virginia as an eleven year old child, who was possibly an orphan, in 1622.

As listed below, Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant appears to have sold this land five years later: 1 May 1639, Isle of Wight County Deeds, Bk. A, p.103; Christopher Reynolds sold 100 acre patent in Warrisquack [Warwicke Squeake or Warrosquyoake] Bay to Peter HULL [HILL], Witnesses: John SPACKMAN and John OLIVER (Doc.#131ac, 135b): In a patent issued to John MUNGIE (Virginia Land Office Patents, Bk. 7, p. 417), dated 21 Oct 1684 which is listed below, it lists that this 100 hundred acres which Robert SABINE originally sold to Christopher Reynolds on 21 Dec 1634, was located on the south side of Hutchinson's Creek: 21 Oct

1684, Virginia Land Office Patents, Bk. 4, p. 417; Christopher Reynolds of Isle of Wight Co., Virginia listed as having bought land from Robert Sabine on 21 Dec 1634, 100 acres located on the south side of HUTCHISON'S Creek, which Christopher Reynolds then sold to Peter Hill/Hull on 1 May 1639.

According to John Camden HOTTEN's list of immigrants aboard the *Speedwell*, which arrived in 1635, there is a listing for "Chris. Reinhold, 24," which could have been the same individual as Christopher Reynolds, Sr., who arrived in 1622 aboard the *John & Francis* as listed above. Richard Reynolds, a Reynolds family genealogist, has proposed that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., returned to England and then brought nine servants back to Virginia. The following is a transcription of the original ship manifest and passenger ship list for the *Speedwell*: 28 May 1635 The is under-written names are to be transported to Virginia imbarqued in the *Speedwell* of London JO: CHAPPEL Mr: being examined by the Minister of Gravesend of their conformitie to the orders & discipline of the Church of England & have taken the oath of Allegiance.[Chri: Reinolds group] Kathryn Richard's...19Marie Sedgwick...20Elizabeth Biggs...10Dorothie Wyncott...40Ann Wyncott...16Phillipp Biggs...6 mo.Elizabeth Pew...20Francis Langworth...25Chri: Reinholds...24Abram Poore...20Elizabeth Tuttell. 25(Doc.#161a). It is interesting to note that the majority of these passengers were woman, most of them in their early twenties. The only two males are listed as Christopher Reinholds/Reynolds and a six month old child named Phillipp BIGGS. Phillip may have been the younger brother of Elizabeth Biggs, age ten, both of whom appear to have been orphans. As indicated throughout this report, the Biggs families resided in the same area as the Reynolds families in Isle of Wight County. The majority of these passengers aboard the *Speedwell* appear to have been brought to Virginia in order to provide wives to the men of the Warrosquyoake settlement. Notice that three of these females were named Elizabeth, i.e. the same given name listed as the wife of Christopher Reynolds, Sr., in his will dated 1654 which is listed below. Hence, Christopher Reynolds, Sr., may have married one of these female passengers named Elizabeth. In contrast to the information from the *Rennolds-Reynolds Family Roster* by Col. Steve F. TILLMAN and others, who have calculated that

Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant, as having been born in 1611 in Graves-end, County Kent, England, Sybil "Lee" Taylor lists the following: "Col. Tillman stated that Christopher was born in 1611, but this does not seem probable since he appeared as a witness in court in 1625, when he would have been only 14 years of age. Before the General Court held at Jamestown 13 Mar 1625, "Christopher Reighnalls, sworne and examined sayeth that he did see and read Peter Collins indenture and that he was bound to serve Mr. Bennett four years." It is shown in Edward Bennett's muster of 1625 that Peter Collins came over on the *Adams* in 1621."

History of Ulster Co., NY

Town of Woodstock, pg. 325: A Biographical Sketch: **Herman Reynolds**. His father, Jeremiah Reynolds, was a native of RI, married Miss Margaret Bentley removed to Dutchess Co., thence to Ulster Co. & settled in the town of Woodstock about 1790. Herman Reynolds was fifth son, born in Woodstock, Nov. 29, 1799. Received limited opportunities for an education in early life. His early manhood was spent in farming, & his business life has been spent in

agricultural pursuits & lumbering. He married, Dec. 29, 1820, Sarah, daughter of Daniel and Phebe (**Griffin**) **Hasbrouck**, who was born in Woodstock, Oct. 26, 1800. They had a family of eleven children, all of whom lived to become men & women. The first death in the family occurred in 1878, the oldest then being fifty-nine & the youngest thirty-three. Their children were Phebe J., wife of Peter A. Du Bois; Margaret, wife of Hiram Shultis; William H.; Lucinda (deceased); Eliza A., wife of John H. Du Bois; Champion P.; Catherine O., wife of Peter A. Wolven; Alfred; Sarah L., wife of Adelbert Hooper; & Lauretta, wife of David H. Short. This couple has 10 children, 41 grandchildren, and 8 great grandchildren living. In politics he was originally an Old-Line Whig, & became a Republican upon the organization of that party. He has been honored with every office of account in his town. He was supervisor in 1846, & has served four terms since overseer of the county poor, & justice of the peace for fifteen years.

American Biographical History of Eminent & Self-Made Men with Portrait Illustrations on Steel, Volumes I-II

Montgomery A. Reynolds Merchant & Miller, of Stanton, Montcalm Co., was born in Woodstock, Ulster Co., NY, 29 Oct 1850; & is the son of William H. and Harriet (**Sagendorph**) Reynolds. Mr. Reynolds is one of a family of 10 children, of whom 4 only survive. Both of his paternal grandparents are living; they married in 1821. His father is one among 4 sons & 7 daughters; & the family circle never has been broken by death. His mother is of German parentage, & his father is of New England descent, tracing his ancestry from CT; but the family had settled in NY at an early day. Mr. Reynolds received no education other than that afforded by the common schools, which he attended until he was ten years of age. From that time until he reached fifteen, he went to school only in winter, assisting his father on the farm in summer. At fifteen, he left school, & had to bend all his energies towards assisting in the support of the family, by tilling the soil of the farm. Farm labor was always distasteful to him, & he early found an opportunity to yield it. He apprenticed himself at the age of 17, to a stone-cutter, & worked at that

trade for two years, until the fall of 1869. He then started for the West, & settled in Stanton, MI, where a sister of his mother resided. He worked for 4 days in a mill, & then obtained a position as clerk in the general mercantile store of H. H. Hinds. He remained in this employment 4 years, receiving an increased salary each year. At the end of that time he invested his savings in the drug & grocery business; & was, for 2 years, one of the firm of Reynolds & Hawley in that trade. He then sold out his interest, & in connection with Turner Brothers, in August 1876, built the first grist-mill in Stanton. He has lately bought out Mr. Turner's interest in the business. Mr. Reynolds held the office of Township Treasurer, & had been village Treasurer for 2 terms. He was a member of the association of Knights of Honor, & has been Assistant Dictator in that body. He had always voted with the Republican party. He married, 5 October 1875, Emma S. **Turner**, daughter of Nelson M. Turner, deceased. They had one child, a daughter.

S. M. Reynolds, one of the prominent farmers and stock growers of Marion Township, is the sixth of a family of eight children born to the union of Thomas and Elizabeth (**Winters**) Reynolds, natives of TN.

Thomas Reynolds was a farmer by occupation and continued this pursuit in his native State until about 1848, when he moved to Franklin Co., AK. He purchased land near Ozark, AK, continued his former pursuit, and was among the first to settle in that county. He died in 1854 and the mother the year previous. Of their eight children, four are now living: Christopher Columbus (resides in KS), S.M., Zach (resides in MO) and Robert C. (who resides at Plano, TX). W. D. (deceased) was in the war with Mexico, and was in the battles of Buena Vista, Marengo and at the City of Mexico at the surrender.

S. M. Reynolds was born in Greene County, TN, in 1846, and was reared by his brother W. D., and received his education in the common schools of Phillips and Lee Counties, AK, as his brother moved to this State in 1859. The latter entered land and S. M. worked on the same until twenty-two years of age. In 1868 he married Miss Mary J. McGrew, of Phillips Co., and the daughter of William and Sallie (Clabough) McGrew, natives of TN and NC, respectively. Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds are the parents of eight children: W. T., Henry L., James P., Marion F., Mary E. (deceased), Carrie A., Minnie G. and Octavus (deceased). After his marriage S. M. Reynolds moved to Sharp County, AK, where he followed the trade of blacksmithing for about one year and then returned to Phillips Co. He settled on his present property, which was owned by his wife and which consisted of 120 acres with fifty acres under cultivation. In 1802, Mr. Reynolds joined the boys in gray, Anderson's Co., , commanded by Dobbins, and was in the battle of Helena, 4 July 1863. He was at the surrender of Little Bock, and was also in a number of skirmishes, etc. He was captured in Phillips Co., was sent to Helena and there remained for two weeks when he was paroled. This was the latter part of 1864. Mr. Reynolds is a member of the County Wheel and Farmers' Alliance, and is Vice-President of the Subordinate Wheel. He is a member of the K. of H., Spring Creek Lodge No. 2643, and is also Vice-President of this. He and Mrs. Reynolds and three of the children are members of the Christian Church. William Reynolds, the paternal grandfather of our subject, was in the War of 1812, and the maternal grandfather, Christopher Winters, was a German, from PA, and last resided at Charleston, TN.
