YESTERDAY

Joseph Jones Reynolds
Major General, United States Army

Born Flemingsburg, Kentucky, January 4, 1822.
When he was fifteen his parents moved across the

Ohio River to Lafayette. Indiana. The next year entered Wabash College at Crawfordsville; a year later he was appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. He graduated in the class of 1843, which included U. S. Grant, with whom he remained on friendly terms.

After garrison duty and serving in the military occupation of Texas just prior to the war with Mexico, he was assigned as instructor at West Point, where he taught for 8 years. He then did frontier duty in the Indian Territory until he submitted his resignation as First Lieutenant, 3rd U.S. Artillery, in 1857.

In the next 4 years taught engineering at Washington University, St Louis, and engaged in the grocery business in Lafayette. On the outbreak of hostilities in 1861, he was appointed Colonel of the 10th Indiana Militia, then Brigadier General of Volunteers, and on June 14, 1861, to rank from May 17, Brigadier General, U. S. Volunteers. May 17, 1861 was earliest date of rank given any Brigadier General of US Volunteers; however, no less than 34 officers commissioned at various dates from May 17 to August 12, were accorded rank as of this date. He was 19th on list as finally arranged by War Department. Grant's name immediately preceded his. Curiously enough, with exception of William T. Sherman, who was ranked 7th, the others were either killed in action, cashiered (Fitz John Porter was 5th) or faded into obscurity).

He commanded at Cheat Mountain under William Starke Rosecrans in September, but resigned the following January because of death of his brother with whom he was in partnership. While out of the service he aided in organizing Indiana troops and again was appointed a Brigadier General, September 17, 1862, and Major General of Volunteers, November 29.

He commanded a Division of XIV Corps at Chickamauga, and on October 10, 1863, was made Chief of Staff of George H. Thomas' Army of the Cumberland, a position held until after battle of Chattanooga. In January 1864, he put in charge of the New Orleans defenses, and in July took command of XIX Corps and organized the campaign against Mobile. In November 1864 and until April 1866, commanded Department of Arkansas.

He became Colonel of the 26th U.S. Infantry upon reorganization of the army in July 1866, and was breveted Brigadier General and Major General,

United States Army, March 2, 1867. He was transferred to the 3rd U.S. Cavalry, 1870, and commanded the occupation forces in southwest, including the Department of Texas. until relieved of command in 1872 and ordered to rejoin his regiment. In 1871 he was elected to the U.S. Senate by the carpetbag legislature in Texas, but the seat was successfully contested by the brother of General A. J. Hamilton.

He next commanded at various points in Nebraska and Wyoming. He was commanding the advance of George Crook's expedition when it attacked and captured the Sioux village on the Powder River, March 17, 1876. He prematurely ordered a retreat, leaving his dead and a wounded Private in the hands of Indians who "promptly cut the Private limb from limb." Some time later his After his retirement he established a residence in Washington, D. C., where he died February. His wife, Mary E. Bainbridge Reynolds (1827-1913), is buried with him.

Captain Robert M. Reynolds, First Iowa Cavalry (August 22, 1826-June 7, 1885) is buried adjacent to him The Captain's wife, Orpha W. Richardson Reynolds (August 28, 1826-January 19, 1903) is buried with him as his son, Lieutenant Lovell K. Reynolds, United States Navy (January 31, 1857-February 18, 1893).

The General's son, Alfred Reynolds. Rear Admiral, United States Navy, and his family are buried in Section 4 of Arlington National Cemetery.

Chronology of The Reynolds Families of Virginia by Rod Stucker, Professional Genealogist 29 Aug 2001, Final Report Part 4

The theory that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant, was born in 1611, is apparently based on the listing of Chris: Reinhold as having been age twenty four in 1635 as listed on the passenger list for the *Speedwell*. If Christopher Reynolds, Sr., was the same individual as the Chris. Reinhold, age 24, who

arrived aboard the *Speedwell* in 1635, he would have been only eleven years old when he arrived in Colonial Virginia aboard the *John & Francis* in 1622. Though this seems unlikely since Christopher Reynolds, Sr., is listed the following year in the 1623 census as one of the thirty-three original residents of Warrosquyoake County, notice that the 1623 census, which is listed above, lists children as well as adults. Though censuses usually refer to tithables, i.e. white persons above age twenty-one years of age; that was not the case in these colonial Isle of Wight census and muster rolls. Hence, it is possible that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., who arrived in Colonial Virginia in 1622 aboard the *John & Francis*, is the same person as "Chris: Reinhold, age 24," who arrived in America in 1635 aboard the *Speedwell* with the nine other persons. Notice that the time period in which "Chri: Reinhold" and his group of nine servants/persons arrived in Virginia in 1635 aboard the *Speedwell* corresponds with the 450 acre patent that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., received the following year in Warrosquyoake County "for transporting nine servants" as listed below.

In 1636, Christopher Reynolds obtained a 450-acre patent on the waters of Pagan Shore for transporting nine servants to the Virginia Colony:

15 Sep 1636, *Seventeenth Century Isle of Wight County, Virginia*, by John B. Boddie, p. 659; The Library of Virginia, Virginia Land Office Patents No. 1, 1623-1643, p.382; Christopher Reynolds obtained a 450 acre patent "bounded with a back creek running eastward behind Pagan Shore some three miles upward, the land lying on the south side of the creek in Warrasquinoke [Warrosquyoake] County for transporting 9 servants." (Doc.# 13lw, 13lay, 142h)

Warrasquinoke, also listed as Warrasquoyacke or Warrosquyoake, was a Colonial Virginia County, which was originally formed in 1634. In 1637, the name was changed to Isle of Wight County. The article entitled Christopher Reynolds of Isle of Wight Virginia, published by The Reynolds Family Association lists that Christopher Reynolds was born in 1611 at Gravesend, Kent County, England. The source of this birth year and place appears to have been the passenger list for the *Speedwell*, which arrived in 1635 as listed above. Though the article further lists that they settled in "Warwick County;

Virginia" (Doc.#144.e-h), the records listed above reveal that Christopher Reynolds, Sr. was among the thirty three original inhabitants listed in a census for Warrascoyack [Warrosquyoake County], Virginia on 16 Feb 1623 (Doc.#13lv). Christopher Reynolds, Sr.'s first purchase of land there occurred almost nine years later for 100 acres in Warrisquick [Warrosquyoake] Bay in 1634 in the newly formed Warrosquyoake County. On 15 Sep 1636, Christopher Reynolds, Sr. obtained a 450-acre patent on the waters of Pagan Shore or Pagan Creek in Warrosquyoake County which subsequently became Isle of Wight County in 1637. This information confirms that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., originally settled in Mr. Edward Bennet's Warrosquyoake Bay settlement in Warrosquyoake County, not in Warrick [River] County.

The fact that Christopher Reynolds, Sr., was responsible for transporting nine servants to Virginia indicates that he was a successful tobacco planter of Colonial Virginia. As were most individuals who resided in Colonial Virginia, Christopher Reynolds, Sr.'s will and the deeds listed below confirm that he was a prosperous tobacco planter. As was the custom in Colonial Virginia, Christopher Reynolds, Sr., received the above patent for 450 acres as compensation for bringing nine servants to the rapidly growing tobacco economy in the Colony of Virginia.

23 Dec 1636, Virginia Land Office, Patent Bk. 1, 1623-1643, p. 408; Nicholas Reynolds obtained a patent for 1000 acres lying at Lawnes Creek S.S. Et. Up Lawnes Creeke (Doc.#156)

As revealed below, this Nicholas Reynolds inhabited James City County, which in Colonial time periods bounded the northern border of Isle of Wight County. James City County was an original shire/county of Virginia, which was formed in 1634. In 1652, James City County changed it's name to Surry County. According to several genealogical databases (including the Ancestral File) and Reynolds family histories, there was a Richard Reynolds and his wife, Mary Anderson, who resided in Surry County during the colonial time period. However, no sources of information are listed for these databases regarding the Richard Reynolds and Mary Anderson of Surry County. There are however, references to the will and

children of Robert Reynolds whose will was proved 2 Mar 1702 as listed below. James Reynolds's will lists that he had a son named Robert and a grandson named Nicholas. Hence, name and residence patterns indicate that James Reynolds was the son of Nicholas Reynolds who first settled in James City County. Though the county location for the 1636 patent for Nicholas Reynolds was not provided in the original description of the patent, the description does list Lawnes Creek which corresponds with the northern boundary for the Upper Parish in Isle of Wight County as follows: "In March, 1643, by an Act of the General Assembly, Isle of Wight County was divided into two parishes: "The upper parish to extend from Lawnes Creek to the eastern side of the Bay, the creeke deviding the plantation of Sam. Davis and Joseph Cobbs to be the extant and division of the said upper parish: The lower parish to extend from the Pagan-Poynt upon the river side to the plantation of Rich. Hayes, from the PaganPoynt upon the bay including all the southerly side to the plantation of the said Cobbs, and that all the inhabitants already residing or that hereafter shall reside on that side to belong to the said lower parish." (Doc.#154c-d) As indicated above, this parish history confirms that Nicholas Reynolds settled in the same general area as Christopher Reynolds, Sr., who resided in the adjoining Lower Parish. However, these were large parishes during this time period, nearly sixty miles in length. Aside from this patent, Nicholas Reynolds also obtained two other patents in the years 1637 and 1638 as listed below. According to *Early Virginia immigrants* by George Cabell Greer, there was also a Nicholas Reynolds who was transported to Virginia in 1642 by Hugh Gwyn, Gentleman (Doc.#21a). Though no county is listed in connection with this latter record for Nicholas Reynolds, he immigrated five years after the Nicholas Reynolds of James City County first obtained land there.

1637, *Early Virginia Immigrants* by George Cabell Greer, p. 276; Richard Reynolds was transported to New Norfolk County by James Knott (Doc.#21a)

According to the publication entitled *Early Virginia Immigrants* by George Cabell Greer, who was clerk of the Virginia State Land Office, there were several individuals named Reynolds/Reynolds who were transported to Colonial Virginia as servants in the mid 1600's. The author of this publication appears to

have extracted the names of these indentured servants from the land patents and transportation records which were used to issue the original land patents and headrights to the individuals who were responsible for transporting these servants to Virginia. This publication lists these immigrants and indentured servants with the individual who was responsible for their transportation as well as the county to where they were transported. Several were transported to Charles River and Charles City Counties. There were also three Richard Reynolds who were transported to: New Norfolk County in 1637 as listed above; to Charles City County in 1638; and to Virginia, no county listed, in 1652. William Reynolds was the only immigrant/indentured servant listed who was transported to Isle of Wight County. He was transported in 1648 by John Seward (Doc.#21a). Interestingly, Christopher Reynolds, Sr., the immigrant is not listed among them and only William Reynolds was transported to Isle of Wight County.

WHEN WAS THIS PICTURE TAKEN?

By determining the type of photographic technique used to make your old family photos, it is possible to date with reasonable accuracy when the originals were created. Different types of photographs:

Daguerreotype (1839-1870 approx.) They are usually placed in a double wood frame case. The image is on a silver clad copper sheet, which is attached to a sheet of glass by a foil-like brass decorative frame padded with velvet or silk. Over years the silver in the image tarnishes.

Ambrotype (1854-1865). A thin glass negative image placed on glass with a black varnish background to make it positive. The ambrotype is similar to the daguerreotype in the assembly. The black varnish is usually printed on paper, cloth or metal and is wrapped tightly around with thin brass to hold it together. It was very common for these photos to be tinted with color. Rouged cheeks or lips suggested a person of substance.

Tintype (1856-1930). The tintype was first introduced in 1856. The earliest were on heavy metal,

these are usually found in gilt frames or in leather cases. This thickness was only used in 1856-1860.

The tintype was first introduced in 1856. The earliest were on heavy metal, these are usually found in gilt frames or in leather cases. This thickness was only used in 1856-60.

During the Civil War, the tin became much thinner and are often datable by the Photographer's Patent paper holders, adorned with stars and stripes. After 1863 the paper holders became embossed rather than printed.

From 1870-1885 some photographers began to print with a brown chocolate-tinted surface. This became the rage. It was also during this time "rustic" photography also became popular with its fake painted backgrounds brown or rustic look is found before 1870.

From 1875-1930, photographers usually set up the studio in covered wagons and tents at public gatherings such as court-days, carnivals or fairs. The came equipped with painted backdrops of Niagara Falls, and beaches or other novelty props.

Carte de Visite- The Cabinet Card (1866-1906) pictures became larger than any other before. Due to the size, flaws became very obvious so, the new skill of retouching photos became popular. They were mounted on cardboard like post cards with borders and some with the name of the photographer or studio printed on it. These pictures can be dated by the recommended chart below:

1866-1880 White card stock of a light weight.

1880-1890 Different colors for the face and back of mounts.

1882-1888 Face painted buff, matted finished, with high glossy back of creamy yellow.

Borders:

1866-1880 Red or gold borders with single or double lines.

1884-1885 Wide gold bars.

1885-1892 Gold Beveled edges.

1889-1896 Rounded corner rule of single lines.

1890-1892 Metallic green or gold impressed border.

1896-1906 Impressed outer border, without color.

Corners and Mount

1880-1899 Square, lightweight mount.

1880-1890 Square, heavy board with scalloped sides.

The Wet-Plate Print 1853-1902. To identify the wet plate negative look for an uneven coating were

[sic] the syrupy base of the glass plate did not flow to the edges. These were the first of very large pictures up to 11x14. They were more convenient and for the first time photographers were able to photograph towns, homes, the great outdoors such as those of the West.

The Dry Plate 1880-1920. Despite the overall popularity and the extensive use of the collodion wet plate photographers never ceased complaining about the inconvenience of the messy process. To identify a photograph lie it flat in a certain angle against the light. The shadows of the image should appear shinier than the highlights and should appear to lie on the surface of the paper, not in it. Blacks are usually cold black and grays might appear silvery. Some browns were made. The surface of the paper has a matted finish. The print is usually the size of the negative, 4x5" or larger.

These are just a few tips I used to date old photos. However, other things do play a part in the process, such as costume, hair styles, and landscapes. (Permission to reprint granted by author.)

Hiram Ronalds, Enlisted as a Private on 14 March 1862. Enlisted in Co., I, 5th Infantry Regiment Florida on 14 March 1862. Furloughed on 23 October 1862 (*Never returned*).

H R Reynolds, Described as having a dark complexion, hazel eyes with black hair. He was 5 feet 5 inches tall. Farmer. Enlisted as a Private on 4 March 1862. Enlisted in Co., I, 5th Infantry Regiment Florida on 4 March 1862. Received a disability discharge Co., I, 5th Infantry Regiment Florida on 20 December 1862 in Tallahassee, FL.

Mathew J Reynolds, Cumberland Co., NC; Enlisted as a Private on 4 September 1861 at the age of 35. Enlisted in Company G, 33rd Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 04 September 1861. Died of

disease Company G, 33rd Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 31 August 1862 in Livingston, VA

Pryor Reynolds, Residence: Rockingham Co., NC Enlisted as a Private on 28 February 1863 at the age of 39. Commission in Co. S, 45th Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 28 February 1863. Promoted to Full Captain on 30 April 1863 (*Capt & Asst QM*). Promoted to Full Assistant Quartermaster on 15 September 1864. Discharged for promotion Co. S, 45th Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 15 September 1864

William Reynolds, He was 6 feet tall. Miller. Enlisted as a Private on 19 March 1862 at the age of 30. Enlisted in Co., D, 27th Infantry Regiment Virginia on 19 March 1862. POW on 3 June 1862 at Woodstock, VA. Exchanged on 5 August 1862. Confined on 05 June 1863 at Fort Delaware, DE. Absent, sick on 1 October 1863; on 14 October 1863 (*Clarksburg, VA*). Oath Allegiance on 15 October 1863 (*Sent north*).

Hugh Ronalds, Residence: Warren Co., NC. Salesman. Enlisted as a Private on 18 April 1861 at the age of 27. Enlisted in Co. F, 12th Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 18 April 1861. Discharged Co. F, 12th Infantry Regiment North Carolina on 1 January 1862.

Samuel Runnels, Described as having a fair complexion, blue eyes with light hair. He was 5 feet 10 inches tall. Blacksmith. Enlisted as a Private on 1 August 1861 at the age of 39. Enlisted in Co. K, 57th Infantry Regiment Virginia on 1 August 1861. Discharged Co. K, 57th Infantry Regiment Virginia on 1 November 1861.

Union

Lewis Reinolds, Enlisted as a Private on 11 August 1862 at the age of 22. Enlisted in Co., A, 125th Infantry Regiment New York on 27 August 1862. POW on 15 September 1862 at Harper's Ferry, VA (*Paroled*) Paroled on 16 September 1862 at Harper's Ferry, VA. Deserted Co., A, 125th Infantry Regiment New York on 3 October 1862 in Chicago, IL.

Ole Renelson, Residence: Jordan, WI. Enlisted as a Private on 11 August 1862. Enlisted in Co. G, 22nd Infantry Regiment Wisconsin on 11 August 1862.

Mustered out Co. G, 22nd Infantry Regiment Wisconsin on 12 June 1865 in Washington, DC.

Chester C Reynolds, Residence: Milton, VT; Wounded on 5 May 1864 at Craig's Meeting House, VA. Enlisted as a Private on 16 September 1864. Enlisted in Co., B, 1st Cavalry Regiment Vermont on 16 September 1864. Mustered out Co., B, 1st Cavalry Regiment Vermont on 18 November 1864.

George Reynolds, Residence: Corning, NY. Teamster. Enlisted as a Private on 4 April 1863 at the age of 20. Enlisted in Co., G, 54th Infantry Regiment Massachusetts on 23 April 1863. Wounded on 30 November 1864 at Honey Hill, SC. Discharged because of wounds Co., G, 54th Infantry Regiment Massachusetts on 3 June 1865 in Saint Andrew's Parish, SC.

Jackson Reynolds, Residence: Kalama, MI. Promoted to Full Corporal. Enlisted as a Private on 27 October 1862 at the age of 27. Enlisted in Co., D, 7th Cavalry Regiment Michigan on 13 November 1862. Admitted on 14 October 1864 at Harper Hospital, Detroit, MI. Discharged Co., D, 7th Cavalry Regiment Michigan on 15 May 1865 in Detroit, MI.

Elwood Renowles, Enlisted as a Sergeant on 27 September 1861 at the age of 32. Enlisted in Company H, 4th Infantry Regiment Minnesota on 27 September 1861. Transferred Company H, 4th Infantry Regiment Minnesota on 15 September 1863. Transferred in on 15 September 1863.

Town of Woodstock, pg. 325: A Biographical Sketch: **Herman Reynolds**. His father, **Jeremiah Reynolds**, was a native of RI, married Miss Margaret **Bentley** removed to Dutchess Co., thence to Ulster Co. & settled in the town of Woodstock about 1790. Herman Reynolds was fifth son, born in Woodstock, Nov. 29, 1799. Received limited opportunities for an education in early life. His early manhood was spent in farming, & his business life has been spent in agricultural pursuits & lumbering. He married, Dec. 29, 1820, Sarah, daughter of Daniel and Phebe (**Griffin**) **Hasbrouck**, who was born in Woodstock, Oct. 26, 1800. They had a family of eleven children, all of whom lived to become men & women. The first death in the family occurred in 1878, the oldest then being fifty-nine & the youngest thirty-three. Their children were Phebe J., wife of Peter A. Du Bois; Margaret, wife of Hiram Shultis; William H.; Lucinda (deceased); Eliza A., wife of John H. Du Bois; Champion P.; Catherine O., wife of Peter A. Wolven; Alfred; Sarah L., wife of Adelbert Hooper; & Lauretta, wife of David H. Short. This couple has 10 children, 41 grandchildren, and 8 greatgrandchildren living. In politics he was originally an Old-Line Whig, & became a Republican upon the organization of that party. He has been honored with every office of account in his town. He was supervisor in 1846, & has served four terms since overseer of the county poor, & justice of the peace for fifteen years.
