**FROM GEN. AND BIOGRAPHICAL ANNALS OF
NORTHUMBERLAND CO, PENN, 1911 p 435:**

The name Reynolds has long been a respected one in the borough of Turbutville, well and favorably known in business and public circles, and two of its worthy representatives there at the present time are Henry Abram Reynolds, justice of the peace, and William N. Reynolds, merchant. They are descendants of John and Hester (Foster) Reynolds, who were married in October, 1797, at which time he was in his "twenty-first year of age" and she was in her "eighteenth year of age." Their children were born as follows: William, Jan. 20, 1799, at 10 a. m.; Grace, Dec. 30, 1801, at 5:30 a.m.; George June 12, 1803, at 10 p.m.; Philip, June 20, 1806, at 6 p.m.; Eliza, Dec. 27, 1808, at 7 p.m.; Henry, Dec. 16, 1810, at 11 a.m.; Hiram, Oct 3, 1812, at 4 p. m. Of this family, Grace died June 26, 1805. William Reynolds, son of John, born Jan. 20, 1799, in Montgomery county, Pa., lived for some time at Willow Grove, in that county, was at one time a resident of Schuylkill Haven, and later came to Turbutville, Northumberland county, where he was a pioneer innkeeper. In his earlier manhood he had followed farming and shoemaking. Some time before his death he moved to a farm in Anthony township, Montour county, where he passed the remainder of his days. He is buried at the Warrior Run church. He married Hester Barrel, and they had the following children: Ella married Dr. Cotner; Mary married Isaac Reader, (second) George Christman and (third) D. H. Dreisbach; John lived and died at Turbutville; Himan lived for the most part in Turbutville, where he kept a hotel, later lived on a farm in Delaware township, and then moved to the Sulphur Springs hotel, in Lycoming county, Pa., where he died; George is mentioned below; William was a hotel keeper in Pennsylvania, later moving out to Illinois, where he engaged in farming, and he died at Kingston, that state; Catharine married Jacob Smith and they lived and died at Schuyl, Pa.; Louise is the wife of D. P. Dreisbach and. they live at Turbutville; Eliza married James Leech, a farmer, and they moved from Montgomery county to Northumberland county. Henry Reynolds, son of

John and Hester (Foster) Reynolds, was born Dec. 16, 1810, in the neighborhood of Willow Grove, Montgomery Co., Pa. He was a shoemaker, his brothers George and Hiram also learning the trade. For some time he lived near Turbutville, in Lewis township, Northumberland county, later moving to Lycoming county, and thence to Montour county, where he continued to live until his death. He enlisted for service in the Civil war, but was accidentally killed March 15, 1863, at Turbutville, before entering the army. He and his wife, Kitty Ann (Barrel), who died March 28, 1880, aged sixty three years, nine months, eighteen days, are buried side by side in the old grave yard, at Turbutville. She was a sister of Hester Barrel, wife of his brother William. Eight children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Reynolds, namely: Theodore lives in Anthony township, Montour county;

**Thomas Osgood Reynolds, M.D.
Kingston, NH (11 N.H.V.)**

Reynolds, Thomas O., co. I; Chester; age 19; res. Candia; cred. Candia; enl. Aug. 2, '62 (1862), as Priv; wd. Dec 13, '62 Fredricksburg VA; disch. May 20, '65. P.O. ad., Kingston (Record, *Aylings' Register*, 1895, p.588.)

Dr. Reynolds was born in Chester NH, 24 Dec 1842, and was the son of Thomas Fernald and Mary (Currier) REYNOLDS; and a grandson of Owen Reynolds. He received his preliminary education in the common schools of Chester and at the Chester Academy, Hew Hampshire. He commenced the study of medicine in 1863 at Camp Nelson, Kentucky, under the direction of Dr. A.C. RANKIN, acting assistant surgeon, U.S. Army, continuing the same at Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn NY, at Albany (NY) Medical College and was graduated from the latter, December 24, 1866. He commenced the practice of medicine in Deerfield NH, April, 1869, where he remained for ten months then removed to Kingston NH, where he has practiced since February 1870, with the exception of one year which was spent in Haverhill MA.

He is an ex-member of the NH Medical Society, was a member of the Rockingham District Medical Society, a member of the Alumni Society of Albany Medical College. He belongs to various Masonic fraternities; General Patten Post, G.A.R.; the General Burnside Commander, U.V.U., of Haverhill MA, and the Congregational Society of Kingston NH; was meteorological reporter for Harvard observatory for several years; trustee of the Kingston Academy, town clerk, representative to the general court, coroner for Rockingham County, justice of the peace, etc.

Dr. Reynolds has reported cases to the *New York Medical Record* and to the *Cincinnati Medical Clinic*; one case, somewhat noteworthy, a puncture wound of the heart, in which the patient lived three days and an autopsy proved the correctness of the diagnosis.

He is now president of the local board of health of Kingston and for many years has been principal surgeon in that section of Rockingham Co. Dr. Reynolds takes great interest in microscopy, making his own slides, corresponds extensively with microscopists and has been a regular contributor to *Microscopic Polarizer Examination*.

Dr. Reynolds' military record began with an enlistment as private in Company I, 11th NH Regiment, 28 Aug 1862. He was wounded at Fredericksburg 13 Dec 1862, and again at Jackson MS in July 1863. In the meantime, he served as chief clerk and acting steward of Nelson Convalescent Hospital, Camp Nelson, KY, which at that time was the HQ of the Department of Ohio. From Oct. 1863, to muster out 10 May 1865, he was at Lexington KY, and soon after, 1 Jun 1865, was employed as acting assistant surgeon, U.S. Army, and had all the medical and surgical duties to perform of the Freedman's Hospital at Camp Nelson. This was a camp of 3,000 people, having a hospital with 100 beds. He remained in charge of the same until the camp was closed 1 Jan 1866.

Married 13 July 1870, Mary Fanny SMITH, daughter of William and Mary A. (HOLMAN) Smith.

Children, one: Mabel Reynolds.

HISTORICAL INFORMATION ABOUT RFA

Information in the *Reynolds Family Association Centennial Collection* came from the previous RFA Annuals, with some updates, and bits and pieces of information in the RFA files when Susan Clement became secretary in 1985.

In the early years when an annual was published the original workpapers were retained by the writer or destroyed. Also, when people sent info to RFA, documentation was not required and usually not sent. Letters/cards were sent "I descend from ____ Reynolds of ____," and the secretaries at the time entered their name and address on a 3x5 card, along with the name of the person in each generation, if given by the writer. Many of the cards contain nothing except name and address of writer, with statements such as "from Ireland/NY/MA," etc. Nothing was published until, after Mrs. Rippier's death, about 1982 when one annual was published by Marcie Smith.

The "newsletter," *Reynolds Recollections* began during Marcie's tenure. When Sue Clement became secretary, she went through all the papers that her predecessor had kept, and found virtually nothing to add to the 3x5 cards that had been kept. Mrs. Rippier and M.H. Reynolds collected most of their info from the actual township records of the N.E. states, rather than relying on someone's memory or family traditions. Because Mrs. Rippier and Mr. Marion H. Reynolds were such pure genealogists, their work was let stand, and to my knowledge, no one has yet found anything incorrect.

BRITISH CONNECTIONS PROJECT

To begin our second century, one project of the RFA, coordinated by this writer, is to search records and gather documentation of all Reynoldses (any spelling) in Great Britain, including England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The goal of the project is to identify connections between American branches of the family with the family in Britain, and hopefully

prove or disprove claims made by various Reynolds researchers over the years.

Many statements have been published setting forth the English ancestry of one branch or another of the Reynolds family. Most frequently cited is the genealogy proposed by Colonel Stephen F. Tillman in his Reynolds Family 1530-1959 published in 1959, in which most known colonial branches of Reynolds are traced to "Christopher Reynolds of Kent Co. Eng., born about 1530." William Glasgow Reynolds heartily disagreed with Col. Tillman's proposed ancestry and published his Reynolds Family History Annotated 1475-1978. Mr. Reynolds contended that Christopher Reynolds of VA in 1622 had a sister Cecily who had arrived in VA in 1610, and that they were the children of Thomas and Cecily (Phippen) Reynolds of Dorsetshire, Eng. Another source states that Thomas was the son of Joseph and Alice (Pierce) Reynolds.

The Reynolds of East Berghold, Suffolk, England

Acceptance of Col. Tillman's ancestral outline has been widespread, despite an obvious lack of documentation. No records have been found to date to support or refute his information.

Some researches have gone one step further than Col. Tillman, however, and have identified the father of Christopher Reynolds of Kent Co. (1530) as Robert Reynolds of East Bergholt, Suffolk. Based on documents found by this writer as well as by RFA member Earle K. Smith of Horringer, Suffolk, Eng., this claim can be laid to rest. Much appreciation goes to Earle who has offered his research assistance to RFA and this project.

Robert Reignold of Estberhold, son of Robert Reignold, was assessed 5s. in the Subsidy Return of 1524. Robert, the elder, was also of Estberholt in 1524 and was assessed L15. Robert the father is almost certainly the Robert Reynolds who was buried in the chancel of Bergholt church in 1524, who, by his will, desired his son George, also assessed in the Subsidy, to glaze "all the wyndows in the nethir storye of the north side of the cherche at East Bergholt att my coste and charge."

Robert Reignold, the younger, purchased the manor of Illarius als. (alias). New Hall in East Bergholt in 1542. He also owned the manors of Stratford, Great Wenham, Capel, Butley, Holton and

Brantham. He died in 1548 when his will was proved: "Robert Reignolde, Esquier. Of East Bergholt." He directed that his wife Mary have the manor of Hyllaryes otherwise called New Hall. His son Robert was to have his manor of Spencers. The will was pronounced null and void in 1550, and another will was proved, perhaps because son Robert had died.

Robert married four times. His first wife was the daughter of Sir Thomas Brewse of Little Wenham, sister of Sir John Brewse. They had one son, George, who probably died young, since there is no further mention of him.

The second wife was the daughter of Edward Mackwilliam of Stambourn Hall, co. Essex. They had two sons, Robert and Edward. Robert probably married Joan, daughter of John Nun of Tostock. He died before 1558, perhaps before 1548, and his widow married second John Beriffe of Colchester, Essex. Edward, who was called sonne & heyre" in the Visitation of 1561, may have married Rose Rosse in 1573. His children were Henry, Robert, Christopher, Francis and Anne, and at least four daughters.

Robert married third --- Spilman, probably of Norborough, co. Norfolk. Their children were Henry of East Bergholt and Belstead, Philip and Katherine. Henry died in 1587 and his will (dated 9 Aug 1585, with a codicil dated 22 Sep 1587, proved 13 Oct 1587) names many of his family members. Henry married three times: first wife unknown; second in 1563 Anne (Rous) Goldingham, widow of Christopher Goldingham and daughter of Sir William Rous, who died 1573/4; third marriage to Elizabeth Withypoll, daughter of Edmund Withypoll of Ipswich, Suffolk. Henry had only one son by his third wife, Henry who was under age 21 when his father wrote his will in 1585. Philip was living in 1585 when his brother made his will. Katherine married first ---Warner of Dedham, co. Essex, and second Martin Browne. Katherine had died before her brother wrote his will in 1585.

Robert's fourth wife was Mary (Anne) Waller, daughter of William Waller of Ipswich and Ramsholt, Suffolk. Their children were William, Humphrey, John and Mary. William married Barbara Wentworth, daughter of Roger Wentworth. The lived in Shotley, Suffolk, and had one son, William. Mary married John Welman. John was probably living in Belstead in 1568, according to the Subsidy returns.

The will of Henry Reignoldes of Little Belsteade, Suffolk, Esq. names his wife Elizabeth; his late wife Ann and her former husband Christopher Goldingham; his father Robert buried in the church of East Bergholt; his first wife buried in the church of Much Ocle (Oakley); son Henry (under 21); cousin Francis in Norfolk; Francis's son Thomas; William Goldingham; Henry, son of his brother Edward; and Robert, Christopher and Francis his brothers; Henry Goldingham; Jonas Goldingham; niece Anne Reignoldes and her brothers and sisters of the whole blood; Children of his late sister Browne dcd.; Niece Anne Reignoldes as one of the daughters of brother Edward; Rose and Mary Browne, and William Warner their brother, and Thomas Warner their brother, and Francis Browne; his cousin Sherman of Colchester; brother Philip; brothers William, Henry and Jonas Goldingham and their sister Hansarde Aldeham; children of cousin Francis Reignolde; cousin Richard Kempe; brother Edward Withipoll, Peter Withipoll and Benjamin Withipoll; brother Wolverstone; nephew Veasie of Burstall; sister Frances Withipoll; John Warner of Ipswich; William Goldingham to be Executor. Codicil bequest to niece Rose Browne and her sister Mary the wife of Heriche of Chelmsford.

The above documents clearly show that Robert Reignold of East Bergholt did not have any son named Christopher, and the Christopher born 1530 could also not have been his brother as the father, Robert, was buried in 1524. The only Christopher in this family is Robert's grandson, son of his son Edward, who was born no earlier than 1561, and after 1573 if this was his parents true marriage date, though was born by 1585 when his uncle Henry wrote his will. These dates make him too old to be the Christopher in VA in 1622. Neither of the Christophers proposed by Col. Tillman can be considered of this family.

Obviously the given names in this family are similar to many of those of the American colonist families. This coincidence bears further checking, particularly as Boxford, Suffolk is one of the proposed birthplaces of Robert Reynolds who was in Boston about 1632. There have also been numerous statements of the near kinship of the Reynoldses with the Sherman family of Dedham, Essex. Henry's will seems to indicate some familial relationship with the Shermans, but no further information has been found to date.

Nomination of William Bradford Reynolds To Be an Assistant Attorney General

The President today announced his intention to nominate William Bradford Reynolds to be an Assistant Attorney General (Civil Rights Division), Department of Justice.

Mr. Reynolds has been a litigation partner with the law firm of Shaw, Pittman, Potts & Trowbridge, Washington, D.C., since 1973. From 1970 to 1973, he was Assistant to the Solicitor General of the United States, Erwin Griswold. In 1967 - 70 he was an associate with the law firm of Sullivan & Cromwell, New York, NY. In 1966 he was assistant to the U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Tennessee, Nashville, Tenn.

Mr. Reynolds received his B.A. degree from Yale University in 1964 and his law degree from Vanderbilt University School of Law in 1967.

Mr. Reynolds is married, with four children, and resides in Potomac, Md. He was born June 21, 1942, in Bridgeport, Conn.

**WILLIAM REYNOLDS OF DUXBURY, MA
AND CAPE PORPOISE, ME (PISCATAQUA)**

From a series of articles, c. 1990, about RFA efforts to locate source materials for the information provided by Col. Stephen Tillman in his two books on the Reynolds families. T1 = Tillman's 1948 book; T2 = Tillman's 1959 book

T2-4443 WILLIAM REYNOLDS, son of William (4162) and Esther (Ruth or Roth) Reynolds, m. 30 August 1638 Alice Kitson, and settled Kennebunk, Me. This line is described fully in Meserve's History of Durham, New Hampshire, and in the book "RUNNELS AND REYNOLDS FAMILIES," by the Rev. M.T. Runnels. Issue: John b. 1641, Job, Alice who m. John Buss, Jr.; Mary who m. James Langley; Sarah who m. 1st - Head, and 2d 3 September 1718 Richard Blanchard; Hopestill who m 1st 23 October 1664 Thomas Sanders and 2d Eli Demeritt; Martha

Jane who m. William Wormwood: and Samuel, b. 1674. These are not necessarily listed in order of birth.

T2-4444 JOHN REYNOLDS, of William (4443) and Alice (Kitson) Reynolds, b. 1631, m. 1669 (Mrs.) Sarah Wiley Crawford, and settled Portsmouth, Nova Scotia. Issue: Job, John, Jacob, b. 25 January 1692, and others.

T2-4445 JACOB REYNOLDS, of John (4444), b. 25 January 1692, and d. 31 January 1755, m. - and settled New Bedford, Mass. Issue: Jacob, b. 8 May 1731, and others.

There appears to be significant discrepancies in Tillman's account above of the family of William Reynolds when compared with other accounts of this family. This is not surprising based on the complexity of the extant documents which give various information about William and his children and grandchildren. The following information on William's family is excerpted from *Genealogical Dictionary of Maine and New Hampshire*, by Sybil Noyes, Charles Thornton Libby, and Walter Goodwin Davis, 1939; and *The Pioneers of Maine and New Hampshire 1623 to 1660* by Charles Henry Pope, 1908. The marriage of William and Alice is recorded in *Plymouth Colony Vital Records* by George Ernest Bowman.

William first appeared at Kennebec [ME] with John Howland in 1634. He was granted land in Duxbury, Plymouth Colony in 1637. He married in Plymouth 30 Aug 1638 Alice Kitson. In Cape Porpus he had a 200 acre grant from George Cleeve in 1654, bought Peter Turbat's house and 200 acres on the East side of the Kennebunk river in 1657 and kept the ferry there, being licensed as late as 1673. He took the oath of allegiance in 1653.

In 1675 William settled his whole property on his son John in return for life support for his aged parents, John giving money to his brothers William and Job before signing the deed. John was aged about 30 in 1681. He sold his father's original 100 acre plantation to Peter Randall in 1684. He was appointed ferryman in 1687.

John died without issue, probably unmarried, and intestate. By law his heirs were his nephews and nieces, and a series of deeds beginning in 1718 name

eight of them, although it is impossible to determine from these deeds the actual number of William Reynolds' grandchildren and the parentage of some of them.

Job Reynolds Jr. and his sister Mary Langley quitclaim their right in 1718. John Reynolds quitclaim in 1720, as did Samuel Reynolds in a separate deed. This Samuel became administrator of his grandfather's and uncle's estates in 1721. A number of legal arguments arose as a result of these claims, and in 1722 arbitrators became involved to determine lawful ownership. At this same time, Alice Buss and Sarah Blanchard appear, declaring themselves to be nieces of John Reynolds. Then in 1725 Hope Demeritt and William Wormwood, niece and nephew, quitclaim their right.

Samuel Reynolds (son of 2 William) and Job and John Reynolds (sons of 3 Job) are clearly the three men whose descendants were so painstakingly followed in the genealogy by Rev. M.T. Runnels, *Runnels and Reynolds Families in America*, 1873. Rev. Runnels discusses a family tradition that these

men originated in Nova Scotia, but declines to propose a parentage for any of them. He does postulate, however, that they were related, and that Samuel was also a brother of the brothers John and Job.

The Jacob Reynolds named by Tillman as the son of John Reynolds and Sarah (Wiley) Crawford, has been proven, by the diligent work of our members Millicent Reynolds, Linda Stangel and T.C. Reynolds, to be of another family altogether, i.e. of Election Reynolds of Salem and Middleboro MA. This family will be discussed in depth at a later date. Clearly, copies of the original documents mentioned above are needed for the RFA to undertake further study of this family. There may be additional documents as well that could provide help in solving some of the confusion and mystery.

Mary **Reynolds**, dau. of Joseph Reynolds, of Ridgefield, CT; moved from Milford to Ridgefield, CT, and from there about 1730 to Cortland Manor, Westchester Co., NY.

William Sanders was born in Strafford, and reared upon a farm. He learned the shoemaker's trade, and afterward worked at it, and also conducted a good farm in Pittsfield. In politics he was a Democrat. He married for his first wife Abigail Sanders, widow of William Sanders, of Strafford; and by that union there were five children, of whom the only survivor is Betsey. His second marriage was contracted with Adeline, daughter of John **Reynolds**, of Strafford; and she became the mother of five children, four of whom are living--Alvin W., Martin, Clara, and George. Martin wedded Eva Noyes, of Barnet, Vt.; and Clara is the wife of Benjamin Rollins, of Concord, N.H., and has two children--Florence and Bertha. Mrs. William Sanders, who is seventy-two years old, is residing at the homestead in this town.

Alvin W. Sanders, one of the leading merchants of Pittsfield, was born in this town, October 5, 1850, son of William and Adeline (**Reynolds**) Sanders. His grandfather, Samuel Sanders, who was a resident of Strafford, N.H., followed shoemaking and farming throughout the active period of his life, and died at the age of seventy years. Samuel's wife, whose maiden name was Betsey **Cater**, lived to be eighty years old. She was the mother of nine children, all now deceased, of whom William was the youngest.

John Shackford **Kimball** was an enterprising lawyer of Boston and a business man of Burlington, Ia. A son of David and Abigail (**Perkins**) Kimball, Pembroke, N.H., April 28, 1812. His descent from Michael Kimball, who married Bettie **Runnells**, came through David Kimball of the second generation and David Kimball of the third, who married Abigail Perkins. The fifth generation is now represented by John Stevens Kimball. Mr. Kimball's parents died at Pembroke when he was thirteen years old, leaving nine children--Betsey, Asa, Perkins, John Shackford, Abigail, Sarah Towle (widow of Timothy Colby, of Concord), Joseph, Mary Lewis (widow of Samuel B. Wright, of Burlington, Ia.), and Harriet. Of these Sarah and Mary are living. Mary, who was about five years old at the death of her parents, subsequently lived in the family made famous at that time by the noted Prescott murder.

Perkins, after spending some time in the printing business, was later employed in the Boston custom-house, and then kept a store in partnership with J. Frank Hoyt in Concord. On retiring from business, he returned to Hopkinton, and died there December 15, 1876. He first married Lydia Reed Wilde, of Boston, a sister of Joseph Wilde, of the well-known firm of Lawrence, Wilde & Co., furniture dealers, Cornhill, Boston. His second marriage was made with Savalla Mason, of Grafton, N.H., who survived him with one daughter, Sarah Underwood Kimball. Mother and daughter are now residents of Hopkinton, the latter being the present librarian of the Hopkinton Free Library.

Montgomery A. Reynolds Merchant and Miller, of Stanton, Montcalm County, was born in Woodstock, Ulster County, New York, October 29, 1850; and is the son of William H. and Harriet (Sagendorph) Reynolds. Mr. Reynolds is one of a family of ten children, of whom four only survive. Both of his paternal grand-parents are living; they married in 1821. His father is one among four sons and seven daughters; and the family circle never has been broken by death. His mother is of German parentage, and his father is of New England descent, tracing his ancestry from Connecticut; but the family had settled in New York at an early day. Mr. Reynolds received no education other than that afforded by the common schools, which he attended until he was ten years of age. From that time until he reached fifteen, he went to school only in winter, assisting his father on the farm in summer. At fifteen, he left school, and had to bend all his energies towards assisting in the support of the family, by tilling the soil of the farm. Farm labor was always distasteful to him, and he early found an opportunity to yield it. He apprenticed himself at the age of seventeen, to a stone-cutter, and worked at that trade for two years, until the fall of 1869. He then started for the West, and settled in Stanton, Michigan, where a sister of his mother resided. He worked for four days in a mill, and then obtained a position as clerk in the general mercantile store of H. H. Hinds. He remained in this

employment four years, receiving an increased salary each year. At the end of that time he invested his savings in the drug and grocery business; and was, for two years, one of the firm of Reynolds & Hawley in that trade. He then sold out his interest, and, in connection with Turner Brothers, in August, 1876, built the first grist-mill in Stanton. He has lately bought out Mr. Turner's interest in the business. Mr. Reynolds has held the office of Township Treasurer, and has been village Treasurer for two terms. He is a member of the association of Knights of Honor, and has been Assistant Dictator in that body. He has always voted with the Republican party. He married, October 5, 1875, Emma S. Turner, daughter of Nelson M. Turner, deceased. They have one child,--a daughter. The fortune of fifteen dollars which Mr. Reynolds brought to Stanton, has, by his hard work, energy, and perseverance, been made the foundation of a handsome fortune.
