Thanks also to member Margie Reynolds of Etna, ME for the information she sent regarding my questions concerning Nathan Perry Reynolds' son James in the March – April issue: Margie writes: "...Nathan Perry Reynolds was a brother to my great-great grandfather, Elisha Tilton Reynolds. Nathan Perry was first married to Mary H Ellis on 8 Dec 1839. Nathan married [2] Flora Staples in August 1847. James Staples Reynolds was born 21 March 1851 Little Bear Mountain, Hartford, ME and died in Minneapolis, MN of heart trouble. He married Julia Marie Goddard 30 March 1872. Member John Reynolds of Bristol, VT sent me a fascinating copy of the Revolutionary War Pension Application of Jonathan Reynolds [Line 20]; I am including

it in this issue for the enjoyment of all members.

Revolutionary War Pension Application Submitted by John Reynolds, Bristol, VT

Pension Application
Revolutionary War

State of Vermont
Rutland County

7 July, 1832

In the spring of 1775, immediately after the battle of Lexington, I was appointed a Sargeant in a company of minute men in Spencertown in the state of New York, commanded by Captain Brown in Col. Van Ness's regiment and continued in said company as Sergeant and Lieutenant during the entire war.

We always stood as minute men and marched at a minutes warning, and we were some times called out six or seven times a year. I am so old (over 90) that my memory fails me, and I cannot distinctly recollect the times of entering and leaving on different tours of duty. I can however state that we marched soon after the battle of Lexington as far as Sheffield, MA. when we received orders to return and we marched back to Spencertown. In the winter following, our whole Regiment were ordered out and marched to Johnstown under the command of Col? and General Schuyler, this being about 7,000 men in the expedition as it was said. We took the place with Sir William Johnson and a considerable number of Tories who had assembled there. I was also in service in 1776 - 1777 and 1778 as sergeant, as part of this time Capt. Barrett had the command of this company and we performed duty scouting up the Mohawk river and elsewhere and sometimes stationed at Albany and Saratoga, sometimes two and sometimes three months at a time and although I cannot specify each period of service, I am confident I served at least twelve months as a sergeant in the whole. I was in service during the whole time that General Burgoyne was in the country, and was at the capture of him and his army at Saratoga. In March 1779, I was appointed by the Governor of New York a 2nd Lieutenant, in said Regiment, and

my commission accompanies this declaration, together with several orders that I received from time to time. From this time, to the end of the war, I was in service every year more or less as Lieutenant. I served at least three months at Fiskill under General Van (Rensolain?) and at Schoharie and Cherry Valley about two months each, but as I said before, my memory is so poor I cannot remember the respective years, the continental troops were at White plains when I was at Fishkill. Col. Schuyler commanded when I was at Cherryvalley, and Col. Vrooman at Schoharie. I always commanded the company I belonged to in service as the Capt. and 1stst Lieutenant were not present. I resided at Spencertown, County of Albany, State of New York, when I entered the service, and continued to live there during the war. I knew Gen. Gates, Gen. Schuyler, Gen. Arnold, Gen. Poor, Col. Jackson, Col. Ethan Allen, Col. (Miller?), Col. Van Schaick and many other continental officers, but my memory fails me so that I cannot distinguish regiments. I have no documentary evidence except my commission and accompanying orders - I know of no person whose testimony I can procure to testify to my service. I am confident I served in the whole twenty months namely eight months as Lieutenant and twelve months sergeant. I was born at Nine Partners, State of New York, Oct. 1, 1741 O.S. - there's a record of it in an old book of records and accounts which I have at home.

I came to Rutland in the winter of 1784 and have lived here ever since. I am known to Rev. Hadley Proctor and Robert Temple of Rutland and most of the inhabitants.

FORMER OSHKOSH MAN DEAD

**Jeremiah Reynolds Succumbs to Injuries
Sustained by Electric Shock**

Information has been received in this city of the tragic death of Jeremiah Reynolds, formerly of Oshkosh. The young man met death at some city in Montana through accident. He was employed as [an] electrician and had climbed a pole to reclaim a working tool and received a heavy charge of electricity. It became necessary to close off the power before the unconscious man could be lowered to the ground. He was severely burned on his back and one hand was so badly injured amputation was necessary. He lived only a few days. Mr. Reynolds was about 35 years of age and was a brother of Mrs. E G Nichols, and was employed in the candy store of Mr. Nichols for several years.

Genealogical sketches of Reynolds, Fewells, Walls and kindred families. John Fewell Reynolds, Winston-Salem, N.C.. Press of the Commercial Printers. 1923
[Part 1 of 2]

It has been the common understanding, that George Reynolds, the head of our line, was from Pennsylvania, or his father was. It is very probable that he and other members of the family came to Virginia and lingered awhile in Orange County, Va., about the year 1754, as there appears a record of a lease of land to Richard Reynolds from John Spottswood during the lives of Richard Spencer and George Reynolds from John Spottswood during the lives of Richard Spencer and George Reynolds. We have no verification of this George being our ancestor, but we find the names of Richard and Spencer in the Census 1782-85 of Pittsylvania county, Va., and our ancestor, George Reynolds, living and marrying in the same community in 1779. In 1809, or about that time, our ancestor moved to Williamson county, Tenn., and we find a Richard and a Spencer Reynolds also residents of the same county, indicating that the influence of relationship influenced them to make their homes in the same localities.

In the ninth annual report of the Virginia State Library, we find the following record: "George Reynolds, 1st Lieutenant, commissioned August 1780, by court, under P. Hairston, from Henry VA., Caroline county." We feel justified in believing this is our ancestor, the Caroline county being the only confusing factor that raises any doubt. George Reynolds, of our line, was a resident of Henry county, VA, at the time, and P. Hairston was also living in Henry, or just across, the line in Pittsylvania county, and, so far as possible to ascertain, there is no Henry' in Caroline county, Va. The records at Bowling Green, the county seat of Caroline, were destroyed, making it impossible to verify the fact.

George Reynolds, the head of our line, married Susanna Lansford, daughter of Henry and Catherine Lansford, of Pittsylvania, June 12, 1779. Henry Lansford must have died in 1777, as his will was probated Jan. 22, 1778, and his widow, Catherine, signed the permit for her daughter, Susanna to marry our ancestor. About 1809, George Reynolds moved to Williamson county, Tenn. Two of his daughters, Elizabeth and Susanna, having married, the first to Richard

Hughes, Nov. 24, 1796, the second to James Hughes, Jan. 25, 1803, and I take it that these families and the Pryors, Stones, Perkins, and others, went at the same time. Our ancestor died in Williamson county, Tenn., about 1813.

Thomas Reynolds, son of George and Susanna Reynolds, was a soldier in the War of 1812, and served under General Jackson in the Creek Indian war, 1813-14; was severely wounded in Alabama in the latter war and was carried home by two of his brothers in a wagon, surviving a wound from a bullet that first passed through his watch, carrying the glass and works into his body, from where they were extracted by passing a silk handkerchief through the wound & the bullet going through the body, the glass and works of the watch would adhere to the handkerchief and were removed.

Pryor Reynolds, son of George and Susanna Reynolds, moved to Tennessee in 1809, living in Williamson county until 1819. He then moved to Lawrence county, Alabama, where he resided until 1827, when he moved to Rockingham county, North Carolina, in the neighborhood of where he was reared. Two children, Elizabeth and Martha, died in childhood. Pryor Reynolds passed the remainder of his days at his home.

[Chapter] XI, Old Liberty Church

This entire chapter is by Mr. Richard T. Martin.

It is a delightful mingling of history and personal reminiscences, by one who knows his subject well. The sketch was originally printed in the Greenville Record, April 25, 1912.

Liberty was called "the mother of preachers." Many of the young men of this and adjoining neighborhoods became ministers of the Gospel under the influence of the revivals that took place at Liberty. Among them were Thomas and Mark Bone, sons of John Bone, George and Thomas Reynolds, sons of Richard D. Reynolds, who was the grandfather of John T. Reynolds, sr., Charles and Kincheon Hay, sons of Kinnard Hay, a schoolteacher, and brothers of Wiley S.

Hay, who represented the county in the Legislature in 1845 and 1846, and who later became a State Senator; Henry and Felix Black, sons of Henry Black and brothers of Judge Nathan Black, who later became a noted lawyer in Western Kentucky; Duran Alcock, Stephen Goodnight, Charles Campbell, Adlai Boyd, and Samuel Wilkins, through the influence of Old Liberty, also became preachers. None of these men spent much time in Muhlenberg after they became preachers except Adlai Boyd and Samuel Wilkins.

A History of Texas and Texans.

Frank W Johnson, Chicago, American Historical Society, 1916; pp. 2004 - 2006

GEORGE T. REYNOLDS. One of the wealthiest and most enterprising men of Texas; the career of George T. Reynolds is typical of much that is best and most praiseworthy in the activities of Texas during the last generation. He is an old-time cattle man who has continued and developed his enterprise into the modern era of livestock industry, and among the stock men and business men of the present day has few peers. Mr. Reynolds is president of the Reynolds Cattle Company, with offices in the New Reynolds Building, at the corner of Ninth and Maine Streets in Fort Worth.

Born in Montgomery, Alabama, February 14, 1844, when he was sixteen years of age his parents moved to Texas. He had enjoyed the limited advantages of the public school up to that time, and had a little schooling in Shelby County, Texas, but he believed that he had neither the time nor the opportunity to get what would be regarded as a thorough education. Instead he entered into the practical affairs which have always given him a large field for his energies. He assisted his father on the ranch in Stephen County, and at the same time was looking out for the opportunity to make his

independent start in life. His first money he made in carrying the mail for the Government from Palo Pinto to Weatherford. In 1862 at the age of eighteen, he joined the Confederate forces in Company E of the Nineteenth Texas Cavalry, and in the spring of 1863 was wounded in one of the engagements of this regiment and received his discharge. When he returned home he possessed \$300 in Confederate money, worth 10 cents on the dollar, and this represented every cent of capital which he could call his own at the time.

In the following January he went out to West Texas seeking land where he would be free from Indian raids, with the purpose of raising cattle. He followed the Concho River along its course to Kickapoo Creek, his intention being to locate a ranch near Kickapoo Springs. In 1865 he made his first business venture in cattle speculation, purchasing 100 head of steers and in 1866 he rented the old Stone Ranch, situated in Throckmorton County. During June of the same year the Indians drove away all of his cattle and horses, and left him practically as at the beginning. Mr. Reynolds is one of the old Texans who has had their full share of frontier service, battling with the Indians, and with outlaws, enduring all the vicissitudes of the old range life and still carrying the scars of that period which has long since completely passed from the experience of Texas and Texans. In 1867 Mr. Reynolds and his brother Will D. had a sharp fight with the Indians, in which George was severely wounded. It will not decrease the interest of this brief sketch to introduce a copy of a doctor's certificate, signed by W. M. Lewis, M. D. and dated at Kansas City, Missouri, August 1, 1882, the certificate reading as follows: "This is to certify that on Tuesday, July 17, 1882, at the St. James Hotel, Kansas City, Missouri, with the assistance of Dr. Griffith of Kansas City, and Dr. Powell of New York City, I successfully removed a steel or iron arrow head from the back of G. T. Reynolds of Fort Griffin, Texas, and that the said arrow head entered his body in front and passed directly through his abdominal cavity and lodged in the muscles of his back, on the third of April, 1867."

After his recovery from this wound, although the arrow was still in his body, as the above certificate indicates, in July, 1868, Mr. Reynolds started to Mexico with a herd of cattle and on the way was again attacked by the Indians. His horse and cattle were 'stolen, but he finally managed to recover them after a long pursuit and continued on to his destination, which he reached in safety. He disposed of his cattle at a good price and with the proceeds started out for Colorado, locating in Bent County, where he started a ranch. His brother Will bought some cattle in Texas and drove them up to his ranch, and both brothers then continued with the drove to Salt Lake City as the market. The buyers in that city were somewhat skeptical, believing that the Reynolds boys, being so young, might have stolen the cattle rather than have acquired them by legitimate enterprise. However, they succeeded in allaying the suspicions and sold the cattle at this place for \$25 a head for each of the 900 in the herd. From Salt Lake City the Reynolds boys went on to California, and bought a lot of horses which they brought back to Colorado, and disposed of at good profit.

After an absence in Colorado of four years, George T. Reynolds returned to Texas and bought a large bunch of cattle at Weatherford, this bunch being driven into Utah and Nevada, where they were sold and in return they brought back a large bunch of horses into Colorado. This was the last drive in which the Reynolds personally participated, but by no means ended their extensive activities as cattlemen. Mr. George Reynolds is now sixty-nine years of age, and still retains his taste for adventure and the stirring life in which he was for so many years one of the keenest participants.

Mr. Reynolds has been an extensive traveler, and knows not only the life of the West, but is a well informed observer of national affairs. He is the owner of several large stock ranches in Throckmorton and Shackelford counties, also a large ranch in North Dakota. For a number of years he has been interested in the cotton seed oil mill through the state and Mexico. He was the organizer of the First National Bank of

Albany, Texas, being its president, and is also president of the First National Bank of Oklahoma City. In building his fortunes he has at the same time built a reputation for legitimate enterprise for integrity in all his relations and for a remarkable ability of which he may well be proud. Along with the power to construct large business concerns he possesses the faculty of making strong and true friendships and enjoys the friendship and respect of business men and citizens all over the Southwest.

Mr. Reynolds married Miss E. L. Mathews, a daughter of J. B. Mathews.

DEAN FULLER REYNOLDS, born February 6, 1816, died Albany, N. Y., June 20, 1891; married Hannah **Freese**; married 2nd Augusta **Freese**, and had four children, all of whom died unmarried. See *Hughs' American Ancestry*, Vol. 1, page 66.

GEORGE W. REYNOLDS, born January 31, 1818, died Franklin, N. Y., October 23, 1895; married Miriam A. **Hotchkiss**, born August 12, 1818, died May 3, 1871; married 2nd Mary **Wheat**; no children. He was a newspaper proprietor and journalist and an influential citizen. Was, Captain in the Union Army in the Civil War. The children of George W. and Miriam A. (Hotchkiss) Reynolds were:

The history of Kings county would be incomplete and unsatisfactory without personal mention of those whose activities have been closely interwoven with the growth and prosperity of this locality. Among this representative class of citizens stands Arthur W. Reynolds, who for twenty-two years has been identified with the Hanford Gas Company, and who is a native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, born on the 24th day of May, 1862.
