Scott Reynolds, farmer, stock man and
legislator, has been a prominent figure in the
citizenship of Lincoln County for over twenty
years. He was born in Nebraska, and
represents one of the substantial pioneer
families of the state

He was born in Butler County in 1875. His parents, Foster M. and Charlotte E. (Reed) Reynolds, were natives of Pennsylvania. Foster Reynolds came to Nebraska in 1868, homesteaded in Butler County, went through the trying vicissitudes of the '70s, and enjoyed some of the prosperity of later years. He spent all his life on a farm. He was a Republican in politics, a Methodist and was affiliated with the Ancient Order of United Workmen.

Scott Reynolds has been familiar with the material conditions surrounding agricultural activities in Nebraska for over forty years. As a boy on the farm he attended public schools, and had the advantage of a college education acquired in the Nebraska Wesleyan University at Lincoln. He then returned to Butler County and was a farmer and stock man there until 1905, when he moved to Lincoln County, locating in section 23, range 13, township 30. He specializes in the raising and feeding of live stock for the market, his cattle being of the White Face strain and his hogs of the Duroc breed.

Known locally as a successful farmer and public spirited citizen, he was elected and sent to the Legislature, where he served in the sessions of 1915, 1917 and 1923. He is a Republican, and is affiliated with the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, Modern Woodmen of America and Brotherhood of American Yeomen.

Mr. Reynolds married, in 1898, Miss Margaret S. **Cameron**. She was born in Canada. They have a family of four children: Walter, who graduated with the A. B. degree from the University of Nebraska, is unmarried and is engaged in ranching on his father's place; Beed, also a graduate of the University of Nebraska is married, and is engaged in ranching in Lincoln County, Nebraska; Donald B., also married, since graduating from the University of Nebraska has been identified with the Conservative Mortgage Company of Lincoln; and for the past two years with the Federal Trust Company of Lincoln; and Zoe, a student in the University of Nebraska and a member of the Phi Mu sorority.

SPRINGVILLE, Dec. 2 1935--**Joseph Alonzo Reynolds**. business man and Church worker

died at the family residence, 132 south Second East, Springville, Sunday morning at 6 o'clock, following an illness of several months.

Mr. Reynolds was born Feb. 11, 1858 at Springville and was the oldest child of Joseph D. and Eliza Taylor Reynolds, early pioneers of Utah. his mother being a member of the earliest handcart company.

An outstanding Church worker. Mr. Reynolds served as first counselor to the late Bishop George R. Hill Sr., and also as clerk of the Third ward for twelve years under Bishop Hil. Mr. Reynolds was for a number of years city assessor. In the 80's he and his brother. Mr. Arthur Reynolds, engaged in the mercantile business. Later he was associated with his brother. the late Henry T. Reynolds and was a member of the board of directors of H. T. Reynolds Co.

On January 15 1880 he married Lorinda **Tew Reynolds** in the Salt Lake endowment house. From this marriage he is survived by the following children: Mrs. J. S. **Winfield** of South Gate Calif.; Joseph A. Reynolds of San Francisco; Reed Reynolds of Los Angeles; Jesse R. Reynolds of Tillinook, Oregon and Mrs. Elizabeth **Miner** of Springville

After the death of his first wife, he married Martha Whittaker **Manwaring** at the Manti temple in June 1892 from which marriage the following children survive him: Mrs. Martha **Brimhall**, Mrs. May **Martell** and Morris Reynolds all of Springville; Dr. Frank G. Reynolds and Mrs. Rachel **Gardner** of Provo. He is survived also by two stepsons: J. H. Manwaring of Los Angeles and Lorus Manwaring of Salt Lake.

In 1879 moved to Ashley Valley, at which place, during the winter the people nearly starved to death; he took stones and made burrs for the grinding of what grain they had; the horses and cattle nearly all died of starvation, and those that were living were so weak they could not work, so the men pulled the sweep that turned the burrs for the grinding of flour and thus prevented starvation. He was the pioneer miller at Vernal, which he conducted until 1911. He was one of the original locators of

the mineral veins at Park City, Utah. Black Hawk Indian war veteran.

REYNOLDS, Edwin, one of the ablest mechanical engineers in the United States, is second vice-president and superintendent of the Reliance works in Milwaukee, and has acquired a world-wide reputation for the originality of his many mechanical devices and for his skill in constructional work. Among the early settlers of Rhode Island was one William Reynolds, who came to America from Gloucestershire, England, and settled in Providence, Rhode Island, in 1637. Descended from this pioneer, in direct line, was one Christopher Reynolds, who was born in Frenchtown, Rhode Island, July 11th, 1790. In or about 1810 he removed to Mansfield, Connecticut, where he married Charissa **Huntington**, and where on the 23rd of March, 1831, Edwin Reynolds was born. Among his ancestors were those who became noted for their love of liberty and their independence in thought and action. One Theophilus Whaley was an officer in Cromwell's army, and was present at the exertion of King Charles I; another, Herodias Hicks, a Quakeress, was scourged by order of Governor Endicott of Massachusetts, because of the "heresy" of her religious opinions. With such an ancestry it is not surprising that Mr. Reynolds early showed a disposition to think and act for himself, in all matters pertaining to the activities of life, and to strike out on original lines in his calling, and not to take for granted as true theories which have been generally accepted, but which have not been put to actual comparative tests.

Having received the ordinary education of the common schools, Mr. Reynolds was apprenticed to trade of machinist in Mansfield, Connecticut, in which capacity he served for three years. With his trade fairly learned, he went to work as a machinist in shops in Connecticut, Massachusetts and Ohio; and, finally took up his residence in Aurora, Indiana, as superintendent of the shops of Steadman & Co., who were principally engaged in the building of engines, saw mills and drainage pumps for Mississippi plantations. The outbreak of the civil war seriously interrupted

this business, and Mr. Reynolds returned to Connecticut. Here and in Boston and New York he was engaged at his trade for the next six years, when he took the step which led to the establishing of his reputation as a machinist, and laid the foundation of his financial success. He removed to Providence, R. I., and entered the employ of the Corliss Steam Engine company. In 1871 he was made general superintendent of the works, in which position he remained until 1877, when he resigned and accepted the position of general superintendent of Edward P. Allis & Co.'s Reliance works, which position, with powers and responsibilities enlarged, he still holds. His reputation as a machinist had been constantly growing, and some of his work on exhibition at the Centennial exposition directed Mr. Allis' attention to him, and no doubt was the cause of his present position being offered to him. He speedily won the confidence of Allis not only in his mechanical skill and genius, but in his integrity and manhood, and this confidence was strengthened as time passed. Upon the death of Mr. Allis, Mr. Reynolds became, through the will, one of the trustees of the state; and, when, later, the business was reorganized and the Allis company formed, he was chosen one of its directors and second vice-president. Besides these positions, he is president of the Milwaukee Boiler company and the Daisy Roller Mill Co., and a director in the German-American bank.

Mr. Reynolds is a thorough student of mechanics; and, while he is in a measure conservative in regard to established rules and principles, he does not blindly adhere to them, but, in all his mechanical work, does not hesitate to question what is old or adopt what is new if his judgment approves, or his investigations warrant. The engines which he has constructed for waterworks are novel in design, beautiful in form and of great power. He devised an ore stamp in which was discarded what was supposed to be a well-established principle, and it has proved to be such a success in operation that it has revolutionized the construction of these mills. In short, he is an engineer both by nature and education, and was one of the three mechanics in the United States (not exhibitors) to whom special medals were awarded for the excellence of their designs of machinery exhibited by others.

The board of trustees of the University of Wisconsin thought so highly of Mr. Reynolds'

abilities that it conferred upon him, in 1895, the honorary degree of LL. D., and certain it is that he is indeed a doctor of the laws of construction and some at least of the laws of matter.

Henry Taylor Reynolds, of Springville, banker, merchant and legislator, is in various ways leaving the impress of his individuality and ability upon the history of his native city and state, for he was born at Springville, March 11, 1860. His parents were Joseph D. and Elizabeth (Taylor) Reynolds, both natives

of England, although they became acquainted and were married after establishing their home in Springville. The father came to Utah as a pioneer settler in 1855 and established his home at Springville. In the work of the church he was deeply and helpfully interested and was a high priest. He died at Springville in 1914, honored and respected by all who knew him and most of all by those who knew him best. The mother crossed the plains to Utah with a handcart company and was one of those forceful women of strong character in the early days who did much to further the upbuilding and development of the state. She had a family of eight children, seven of whom are now living, and her death occurred in 1877.

Henry T. Reynolds was educated in the public schools of Springville, and in the Brigham Young University at Provo, where he completed his schooling in 1880. He afterward engaged in farming for several years and then turned his attention to merchandising. He established and has since conducted the large general store carried on under the name of the H. T. Reynolds Mercantile Company, Inc. The business was founded in 1882 and Henry T. Reynolds became president and principal owner. They carry an extensive line of goods and in the conduct of the business Mr. Reynolds displays a most progressive spirit. This, however, is but one phase of his activities, for he is the president of the Springville Banking Company, of Springville, which was organized in 1880, he becoming one of the incorporators and the vice president at the time of the organization. He is also the president of the Utah Wholesale Grocery Company, of which he was the promoter. This corporation conducts a very extensive wholesale business, its trade extending throughout Utah and adjoining states. Mr. Reynolds is also the president of the Reynolds-Ely Construction Company, having large railroad grading contracts, and he is the vice president of the Springville-Mapleton Sugar Company, large and successful manufacturers of beet sugar, having extensive factories in Utah and other counties of the state. Of this company Jesse Knight is the president. Mr. Reynolds is likewise connected with other interests which have done much to enhance the prosperity of Utah and promote its industrial and commercial activity.

In the year 1887 Mr. Reynolds was united in marriage to Miss Rebecca **Porter**, a daughter of James B. and Mary Porter, of

Springville, and to them have been born eight children, of whom four survive. Henry Taylor, Jr., now engaged in construction work in Idaho, was recently honorably discharged from the United States army after having been stationed for some time in Texas. He is interested in the railway grading contracts promoted by his father. The other members of the family are Helen, J. Ernest and Josephine.

Mr. Reynolds is a member of the high council of Utah stake of Zion of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. His political allegiance is given to the democratic party and he has been called upon to fill various positions of honor and trust. For two terms he was a member of the Utah state legislature, serving in the house and also for one term in the senate. He was very active in support of the prohibition bill in the senate and other important measures. For ten years he served as city commissioner of Springville and for four years as mayor of the city. He also took a most active part in Liberty loan drives and other branches of war work and in matters of citizenship his aid and influence can always be counted on in support of progress and improvement. What he has done for the material development and growth of the state can hardly be overestimated. In all business affairs he has utilized his opportunities and has looked beyond the exigencies of the moment to the possibilities of the future. His path has never been strewn with the wreck of other men's fortunes, for he has always followed constructive measures, benefiting the entire district in which he has operated.

Could not have been the son of William, and probably was not the person who sold land in Cape Porpoise 2 Jan. 1687-8? Compare with John, of Watertown, Mass. in 1635.

William Reynolds; Rennolls; Reignalls; Reynalls; Rennels: Plymouth,

one of the party with John Howland at Kennebeck in the Hocking affair in 1634. Received land on Duxbury side Feb. 6, 1637. Owned cattle in 1638; sold in 1640. He m. 30 Aug. 1638, Ales Kitson. Rem. to Cape Porpoise; took oath of allegiance to Mass. govt. 5 July, 1653. Was then allowed to keep a ferry at Kennybuncke, and to have 3 pence a passenger. With wife Alice made deed of gift 12 April, 1675, to son John, conditioned on life care of the parents. Ch.: John, Samuel, Job, William, Mary (m. James Langley), Jane (m. Thomas Wormwood).

M. T. Runnels, unknown, unknown.

Samuel Runels was b. as supposed, about the year 1674 in Port Royal, Nova Scotia and married Abigail Middleton about 1700-2.

The Church Records sat that "Samuel Runnels was admitted to full communion with the Congregational Church in B Radford, Nov 27, 1709 and baptized, and owned ye Covenant said day." His Will was dated "March 5, 1744-

5" and "Proved, at Ipswich, Nov 25, 1745." Abstract as follows:

"I, Samuel Runels, of Bradford, etc., yeoman, bequeath to Abigaill my dearly and well beloved wife one cow, four sheep and my mare for her own use, also household goods and wearing apparel, and the free use and improvement of the East end of my house during her natural life. I give to my sons, Stephen and Job all my land in Bradford [they paying the legacies here mentioned] also to Stephen the East end of my house to come in possession after the decease of my wife, and to Job the West end of my house which he now lives in. As to my lands tat may fall to me in the Eastern parts, by my Grandfather or Father Runels, I give them to my four sons, Stephen, Samuel, Job and Ebenezer to be equally divided between them quantity and quantity.

I give unto my beloved son Samuel Runels 25 shillings lawful money, and that to be his portion of my estate with what I have already given him.

I give and bequeath unto my son Ebenezer Runels the sum of 35 pounds lawful money [or other payable bills of credit equivalent thereto] or to his lawful heirs, when he comes to the age of 21 years, to be paid by my Executors in equal parts, and that to be his portion of my estate.

I give Sarah Lakeman, or her heirs, 10 pounds in six months after my decease; and to my grandson William Atwood, or his heirs, 5 pounds lawful money to be paid when he is 21 years of age.

I constitute my beloved sons, Stephen and Job, sole executors [to whom I give my live stock except what I have given to my wife by will], ordering them to pay my honest debts and funeral charges and legacies above mentioned and to give their mother, my now present wife, a decent burial at her decease."

14 Jun 1892. DIED: Mortimer Fabritus Reynolds died yesterday at Rochester, NY. He was born Dec 2, 1814 and was the first child of white parentage who birth occurred on "The Hundred Acre Tract", comprising the original site of Rochester, NY. He continued a permanent resident of the city from his birth to his death. Reynolds was never absent from Rochester with the exception of his school term for a longer period than seven weeks. He was quite wealthy. He gave the Reynolds Laboratory to the University of Rochester and has left property valued at \$500,000 for the purpose of building and maintaining the Reynolds Public Library.

10 Dec 1894. DIED: At Albany, NY, Dec 9 1894, William H T Reynolds, MD, son of the late John H and Margaret A Reynolds in the 49th year of his age.

22 July 1894: DIED: Suddenly, July 21, 1894 at her residence, Amenia, NY, Lydia A Reynolds, widow of De Sault Guernsey, MD.
