SPRINGVILLE, Dec. 2 1935--Joseph Alonzo **Reynolds**. business man and Church worker died at the family residence, 132 south Second East, Springville, Sunday morning at 6 o'clock, following an illness of several months.

Mr. Reynolds was born Feb. 11, 1858 at Springville and was the oldest child of Joseph D. and Eliza **Taylor** Reynolds, early pioneers of Utah, his mother being a member of the earliest handcart company.

An outstanding Church worker. Mr. Reynolds served as first counselor to the late Bishop George R. Hill Sr., and also as clerk of the Third ward for twelve years under Bishop Hil.

Mr. Reynolds was for a number of years city assessor. In the 80's he and his brother. Mr. Arthur Reynolds, engaged in the mercantile business. Later he was associated with his brother. the late Henry T. Reynolds and was a member of the board of directors of H. T. Reynolds Co.

On January 15 1880 he married Lorinda **Tew** Reynolds in the Salt Lake endowment house. From this marriage he is survived by the following children: Mrs. J. S. **Winfield** of South Gate Calif.; Joseph A. Reynolds of San Francisco; Reed Reynolds of Los Angeles; Jesse R. Reynolds of Tillinook, Oregon and Mrs. Elizabeth **Miner** of Springville

After the death of his first wife, he married Martha **Whittaker Manwaring** at the Manti temple in June 1892 from which marriage the following children survive him: Mrs. Martha **Brimhall**, Mrs. May **Martell** and Morris Reynolds all of Springville: Dr. Frank G. Reynolds and Mrs. Rachel **Gardner** of Provo.

He is survived also by two stepsons: J. H. Manwaring of Los Angeles and Lorus Manwaring of Salt Lake.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday, Dec. 4, at two o'clock at the Third ward chapel.

Abner T. **Reynolds** became a citizen of this town in 1853. He is a son of Morris Reynolds, who was born in Rutland, Feb. 13, 1780, married Charlotte **Chatterton** in 1804, and settled in that town. Their children were Isaac, Morris, Bradley A., Abner T. and Charlotte P.

Morris Reynolds, the father, died July 9, 1848; Charlotte, the mother, died May 6, 1854.

Abner T. Reynolds was born March 20, 1817, and married, December 3, 1846, Fannie **Starks**, who was born in Lockport, N. Y., April 13, 1820. They resided in Rutland till the 24th of March, 1853, when Mr. Reynolds bought of Simeon **Gilbert** the Ladd farm in Pittsford, and

Another of the well-known veterans of the War of 1812 was Joseph C. **Reynolds**, who was born in North Carolina May 17, 1793, and who while still a boy came to Muhlenberg, where he died January 23, 1838. While visiting in Tennessee he enlisted in a company organized in that State. He showed great bravery at the battle of New Orleans, where he experienced a number of narrow escapes. Tradition has it that General Andrew Jackson complimented him on his courage in battle.

Joseph C. Reynolds was for fifty years one of the best-known men in the county. He was a successful farmer, and up to the time of the emancipation of the slaves was one of the largest slave-owners in Muhlenberg. He was a liberal man, and never hesitated to volunteer to help a neighbor or friend when he felt his help was needed. In January, 1820, he married Mary Fortney **Reynolds**, a daughter of pioneer Richard D. Reynolds, Sr., Revolutionary soldier. They were the parents of six children, all of whom were influential citizens. Mrs. Reynolds, like her husband,

always had the good of Muhlenberg at heart and did much toward the moral advancement of the county. She came to Muhlenberg in her youth, and died near Greenville August 31, 1868.

Lydia (Fuller) Reynolds died in Plymouth, August 29, 1828, and Benjamin **Reynolds** married (second) at Kingston, Ruey **Hoyt**, born in Danbury, Connecticut, February 14, 1786, daughter of Daniel and Ann (**Gunn**) Hoyt, formerly of Danbury, Connecticut, then of Kingston, Pennsylvania. She died without issue, August 26, 1835, and Benjamin Reynolds married (third) at Wilkes-Barre, February 16, 1837, Olivia M. (**Frost**) **Porter**, born in Litchfield, Connecticut, September 3, 1791, daughter of Samuel Frost, and widow of Major Orlando Porter, born in Waterbury, Connecticut, May 8, 1787, died at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, January 1, 1836, Burgess of Wilkes-Barre, 1833-1834. Benjamin Reynolds died in Plymouth, February 22, 1854. His widow Olivia died April 22, 1854. His children, all by his first wife, Lydia Fuller, were, William Champion, of whom presently; Chauncy Andrus Reynolds, (1803-1868); Hannah Champion, (1806-1845) married 1827, Dr. Andrew Bradford; Clara Champion, (1811-1876) unmarried; Elijah Wadhams Reynolds, (1813-1859); Joshua Fuller Reynolds, (1814-1874); George Reynolds, (1817-1835); Abraham H. Reynolds, (1819-1890); and Emily Elizabeth Reynolds, (1822-1896) who married in 1847, Dr. Robert Hamilton Tubbs.

The Hon. William Champion Reynolds, eldest child of Benjamin and Lydia (Fuller) Reynolds, born

in what is now the borough of Plymouth, Luzerne county, Pennsylvania, December 9, 1801, was reared on his father's farm in Plymouth, and was educated in the primary school and later in the academy there under the principalship of Thomas Patterson. He prepared for college in the Wilkes-Barre Academy, under Joseph H. Jones, and entered the sophomore class at Princeton in 1821, but his health failing he abandoned a collegiate course, and engaged in outdoor employment until 1824, with the exception of one winter in which he taught school. His health recovered, William Champion Reynolds, entered into partnership, with his cousin, Henderson Gaylord, his father's business partner, and under the firm name of Gaylord & Reynolds, later Henderson Gaylord & Company, for ten years carried on an extensive mercantile business at the general stores at Plymouth and Kingston. The firm also engaged in mining, and in shipping farm products, coal, lumber, etc. Mr. Reynolds took charge of the branch store at Kingston in 1830, and looked after the interests of the firm there until 1835, when he sold out to his partner and engaged exclusively in mining and shipping interests. In October, 1836, William Champion Reynolds was elected a representative from Luzerne County to the state legislature, and during the one term which he served in the law making body of the state took an active part in the legislation in the interest of internal improvements then engrossing the attention of the people of Pennsylvania. His business experience had made him well acquainted with the need of better transportation facilities, and he advocated all measures relating to internal improvements. Among the important measures introduced by him was one granting a franchise to the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company to build a railroad to connect the head of navigation on the Lehigh river with the North Branch Canal at Wilkes-Barre. This railroad, begun in 1838, and completed five years later was one of the first railroads built in that part of the State, and it contributed greatly to the development and prosperity of the Wyoming Valley. Although the course of Mr. Reynolds in the House was favorably recognized by his constituents in a number of public meetings where resolutions were adopted expressing high regard for his services, he declined a re-election alleging that he could not spare the time from his active

business which a due regard for the duties of the office required. He was also urged to accept the office of prothonotary of Luzerne county, but declined. March 15, 1841, he was commissioned by Governor Andrew Porter one of the associate justices of the courts of his native county, and he served on the bench as lay judge with dignity and honor for five years. He was from 1840, for several years the state representative on the board of managers of the Wilkes-Barre Bridge Company. He was chosen one of the trustees of Wyoming Seminary, at Kingston in 1845, the second year after its establishment by the Wyoming Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and although a member of a different religious denomination, was continued in the board of management for thirteen years. In 1852, Judge Reynolds with his cousin and former business partner, Henderson **Gaylord**, the Honorable George W. **Woodward**, William **Swetland**, Samuel Hoyt and others organized the Lackawanna & Bloomsburg Railroad Company, and securing a charter, in 1854 commenced the building of the railroad, first from Scranton to Rupert, and then to Northumberland, now forming a part of the extensive and important Lackawanna system, and was president of the company until the completion of the road in 1860 after which he declined re-election, but continued a director of the company until 1865. He was also for many years and up to the time of his death a director of the Wyoming National Bank, of Wilkes-Barre. He was one of the original members of the Wyoming Historical and Geological Society and remained a member until his death.

"Judge Reynolds was a man of correct business habits, far seeing judgment, industry and economy. His taste for literature led him to devote much of the time that could be spared from vast business cares to the best literature of his day, and his cultured mind and kindly temperament, united with a fine conversational gift, made him a most agreeable companion, and he enjoyed a wide acquaintance and friendship with cultured and eminent men of his day". His personal friend, Colonel H. B. Wright, who had known him intimately during nearly his whole life, wrote of him in his Historical Sketches of Plymouth, "The success of Judge Reynolds is but an illustration of what can be accomplished by a life of industry and perseverance guided by a sound mind and discerning judgment. He was the architect of his own fortune. His foresight and high character of intellect led him to invest his spare funds in coal lands, and the increase of the value of those lands, (largely due, he might have added, to his efforts in

and success in securing better transportation facilities) was the foundation of a large estate."

William Champion Reynolds was married, at Plymouth, Luzerne county, Pennsylvania, June 19, 1832, by the Reverend Nicholas Murray, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Wilkes-Barre, to Jane Holberton **Smith**, born at Plymouth, April 3, 1812, third child of John and Frances (**Holberton**) Smith, of Plymouth, granddaughter of Lieutenant Abraham and Sarah (**French**) Smith, of Derby, New Haven county, Connecticut; great-granddaughter of Robert and Judith Smith, and great-granddaughter of Ebenezer Smith of Jamaica, Long Island, who died there, October, 1717, and his wife Clemont **Denton**, daughter of Samuel and Mary Denton and great-granddaughter of the Rev. Richard Denton, who graduated from the University of Cambridge in 1623, and emigrated to Wethersfield, Connecticut, prior to 1640, and settled at Hempstead, Long Island, in 1646.

GEORGE RUNELS. Warner Lower Village has given birth to many prominent men and women, and among the number is the subject of this sketch. His ancestor who was of Scotch origin, came from Halifax to Bradford, Mass., in 1674. His grandfather (who was

a blacksmith) was born at Haverhill, Mass., in 1726. His father (Major Daniel Runels) was born at Haverhill, in 1775. Major Runels learned his trade, and, on becoming of age, went to Corinth, Vt., and there worked at blacksmithing a short time. In 1797 he came to Warner, and in 1799 married Chloe, a daughter of John **George**. Their children were Daniel G., Hannah, Sally, Charles, and George, all of whom are dead except the last named.

George Runels was born February 3, 1823. His mother died in 1829, and he remained with his father till he died, in 1837. He then worked with his brother (Daniel G.) one year at blacksmithing and farming; then for six months he worked half the time for Levi **Bartlett**, and the other half for Noyes **Rand**.

He was next with his guardian and uncle (Maj. Daniel George) a short time. He received his schooling at the brick house by the river, and at New London academy, where he was a student one quarter. He went to Lowell in the spring of 1840, and learned the trade of a stone-cutter. In the fall of that year he travelled with Henry **Carter**, visited all the New Hampshire musters, engaged in selling books and other notions. In November of the same year he went on board of a barque, and sailed to the Pacific on a whaling expedition. In about twenty months after sailing the barque was wrecked on the Fejee [sic: Fiji] Islands. The crew were picked up (after being in boats three days) by a ship, which left them in New Zealand. Mr. Runels worked there three months, pitsawing in the woods and building a wharf—the first wharf on that island. He sailed from there to New Holland, and back, in a Scotch brig. He then went on board a vessel from Salem, Mass., which was trading with the natives of the Fejee Islands: he remained with this vessel about one year, and left her at Manila, on one of the Philippine Islands. From there he went in an English ship to Canton, Singapoore [sic: Singapore], and Calcutta, leaving her at the latter place.

He was sick with Asiatic cholera six weeks in Calcutta. Having recovered his health, he shipped on board of a Boston vessel, and came home around the Cape of Good Hope. He went again to Lowell, and started the business of stone-cutting there in 1845, in which pursuit he remained till 1849. In the fall of that year he went to California, and returned in 1850.

He then went to farming in Waterbury, Vt., where he remained till 1854. Since that time he has been extensively engaged in business at Lowell till within about one year, when, having acquired a competence, he retired from active work. For the past twelve months he has travelled in Florida, Colorado, California, and the West generally.

Mr. Runels married, in 1845, Miss Mary A. **Morrill**, of Springfield, N. H. Three children have been born to this couple, viz., Emma, who died in 1871, aged 23, and Charles and Henry, who are engaged in the stone business at Lowell.

Chapter I. The First Known Generation

Family tradition has always said that our first ancestor to live in North America was Anthony **James Reynolds** who was born in County Antrim, Ireland and came to this continent before the Revolutionary War. It is positive that he was here before that time as his first child was born in Frederick County, Virginia November 16, 1772, and he was still in Frederick County in 1789 as he is listed as "Head of Family" In the Virginia Census of 1782 and in the first census of the United States in 1789.

His wife was Mary **Fleming** and on page 470 In Confession of Faith "Agreed upon by the Assembly of Divines at Westminster, with the assistance of Commissioners from the Church of Scotland Printed in the Year MDCCLXVIII" are written the names and birthdates of the following children:

James Reynolds was born November ye 16th, 1772

Susana Reynolds was born September ye 7th, 1774
Margaret Reynolds was born January ye 19, 1777
Mary Reynolds was born November ye 29, 1779
Hannah Reynolds was born April ye 16th, 1783
Joseph Fleming Reynolds was born October ye 5th 1785

There were at least three other children whose names do not appear: George, Samuel and John.

George was the father of Mrs. Aizina **Treat**, buried in the Buchanan, Michigan cemetery.

Samuel was the father of Virgil Reynolds and Elizabeth Reynolds **Shank**,

John was born August 19, 1792, probably in Kentucky and on October 15, 1806 his father Anthony Reynolds apprenticed him to Samuel **Turner** to learn to be a gunsmith. He was to serve until he was twenty years old, when he was to "Receive 12 lbs • In the coin of the realm, a suit of clothes and a good vise fit for the use of a gunsmith. The apprenticeship papers are recorded at the Bourbon County Courthouse, Paris, Kentucky.

There is no record of the exact time the Reynolds family left Virginia for Kentucky. In my early research of the family history, Mrs. Alzina Treat, a grand daughter of Anthony, wrote me that he received a land grant during the administration of John **Adams**, for his services in the Revolution, and among the pre-emption titles in Paris, Bourbon County, Kentucky, Anthony's name appears on various papers.

For instance one reads as follows:- Anthony Reynolds bought from Aquilla **Samson** on February 12, 1806 in consideration of \$450, a tract of 60 acres in Bourbon County on Strodes Creek being a part of a survey and pre-emption for Moses Thomas- Recorded Feb. 12, 1806; and on October 16, 1806 Anthony Reynolds sold to French **Talbot** in consideration of \$500 a tract of 60 acres on Strodes Creek.

Samuel Reynolds was also born in Virginia and eventually reached Greene County, Illinois where he lived near his sister Polly **Clendenen**. He was married twice, one of his wives being Mary **Tice** • They were married in Macoupin County, Illinois. He was a

soldier in the War of 1812. He left Illinois and came to Saint Joseph County, Indiana where he died in 1854. and is buried in the Hamilton Cemetery. Samuel had three known children - Virgil, Elizabeth Shank and (?) Sarah Arnold.

George Reynolds, son of Anthony, lived in South Bend at one time. He was the father of Aizina Treat (before mentioned), Harriet, William and Anthony.

Nothing is known of Margaret and Hannah, daughters of Anthony, though they are probably buried in the Clendenen burial lot in Greene County, Illinois.

In the cemetery at Rolling Prairie, Indiana on the Reynolds lot are two graves - one marked Jane Reynolds died April 14, 1849, age about 76 yr. The other is Julia Reynolds died April 16, 1848 age 47 yrs. These must be the graves of Jane Clendennin who married James Reynolds, and a daughter.

THEODORE REYNOLDS, retired farmer has lived at his present home in Anthony township, Montour county, for fifty years, and he cultivated that place until 1907. He is one of the oldest living settlers in his district. Mr. Reynolds was born Oct. 30, 1837, in Montgomery county, Pa., in which county his father, Henry Reynolds, was born in 1812.

Moving his family to Montour county, Henry Reynolds settled in Anthony township. He followed shoemaking, and died in 1864. His wife, Kitty Ann (Barrel), died about 1876, at the age of sixty-four years. She was a native of Willow Grove, Montgomery county, and her mother, Mrs. John Barrel, lived to be ninety-nine years old. Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds had a family of seven children, of whom four survive: Theodore; William, who lives in Illinois; Harry A., of Turbotville, Pa.; and Smith, a resident of Illinois.

Theodore Reynolds was given comparatively few educational advantages as viewed from the modern standpoint. He worked out at farming until his

marriage, after which he settled down to the same business for himself, for two years living in Lycoming county. Then, he moved to Turbotville, and in 1864 he settled on the property in Anthony township where he has ever since resided. It contains twenty acres. He was successfully engaged in cultivating this land until 1907, when he gave up work, now enjoying a period of leisure to which his years of industry entitle him. Mr. Reynolds has never held any public offices, but he has always been a good Democrat and interested in seeing his party in the lead, and he has taken an active part in the conduct of local elections, having served two terms as election inspector and two terms as judge.

Mr. Reynolds married Jan. 5, 1860, Mary Magdalena **Cumfer**, who was born Oct. 18, 1837, in Moreland township, Lycoming county, daughter of Peter and Catherine Cumfer, the latter a native of Pottsville, Pa. Mrs. Reynolds died March 12, 1898. She was the mother of seven children: Hyman, now in Illinois, who is married and has one child, a daughter: McClellan, deceased; Mary, deceased; Harry, deceased; Sadie C., wife of Ira C. **Shade**, of Anthony township; John T., who lives at the paternal home in Anthony township, married to Anna **Heddens**; and Harry, of Milton, Pa, who married Laura **Harmon** and has six children. Mr. Reynolds was reared in the tenets of the Episcopal Church, and is a member of St. James' Church of Exchange.

R. M. and THEODORE REYNOLDS, of Monson, Mass., manufacturers of fine fabric dress goods, were born in this town, the former on the 18th of Dec-ember, 1838, and Theodore in 1843.

These gentlemen are descendants of William Reynolds, who in 1637 settled on the Providence Plantations, R. I., where on July 27, 1640, he and thirty-eight others signed an agreement for a form of government. William's son James was the father of Joseph Reynolds, who was born in Rhode Island in 1652, and was the father of John, the latter being the father of John, Jr., the great-grandfather of the Reynolds brothers of this sketch. The next in line was Eldridge Reynolds, son of John, Jr., and father of Joseph L. Reynolds. The farm in the village of Wickford, R.I., that was owned and occupied by John Reynolds, Jr., has been held in the family two hundred years.

Joseph L. Reynolds, the father of R. M. and Theodore, was born in the village of Wickford, a part of North Kingston, RI, December 31, 1796; and his wife, their mother, was Oral, daughter of Rice and Lavinia (**Shaw**) **Munn** and a native of Monson. They were married on March 7, 1837, by the Rev. Dr. Ely, and enjoyed almost fifty years of married life. They had three children, two of whom are now living. Mr. Reynolds established the manufacture of cotton goods soon after coming to Monson. He attended strictly to his business, and never sought public office, but was chosen by his townsmen to fill various important positions, being Selectman for a long term and occupying a seat in the Massachusetts Senate in 1854. He was a prominent member of the Congregational church, and died July 9, 1885, being exactly eighty-eight and one half years old. Mrs. Reynolds was possessed of womanly and motherly graces to a remarkable degree, being gentle and modest in disposition, warm-hearted and sympathetic in nature, and a devout Christian, a member of the Congregational church for over sixty years. But few persons have both the desire and the means to fill their lives full of generous and worthy deeds as she did, so simply and naturally, shedding sunshine all about her. She died in Monson July 15, 1891. Her grandfather was Reuben Munn; and her ancestors were among the very first settlers in this part of Massachusetts, the town record showing that on July 19, 1757, a daughter, Lois, was born to Nathaniel Munn, Jr.

Rice M. and Theodore Reynolds received a good common-school education, which was supplemented

by a course at the Monson Academy. The business to which they succeeded at their father's death has increased under their management, and has aided materially in the prosperity of this town. Their large establishment is run on a liberal scale, employing from one hundred and forty to two hundred hands, and makes use of steam and of water power supplied by a branch of the Chicopee Brook. Mr. R. M. Reynolds has recently buried his third wife. He has borne his share of public office in his native town, and served twice in the legislature. The members of this family have been successively Whig and Republican from the beginning of these parties, and both Theodore and R. M. Reynolds are prominent Chapter Masons.

The home of Mr. Theodore Reynolds is a fine old-fashioned country seat in the south part of Monson, on an eminence overlooking the factories of the firm. It is a most attractive and quiet retreat, set back from the din and dust of the busy thoroughfare, with ample grounds shaded by a rich variety of ornamental trees, the hills beyond being covered by a thrifty forest of native wood. The roomy and elegant residence was erected by his father about fifty years ago, and both his parents died there. Mr. Reynolds is a gentleman of domestic habits, though never married. The interior of his house shows him to be of refined taste. Many choice engravings and paintings adorn the walls, among them the portraits of his honored father and cherished mother, executed with such skill as to be startlingly life-like.

The house, though richly, furnished, is more remarkable for an air of home comfort than for grandeur, its most striking feature being the extensive and valuable library, which shows its owner to be a true bibliophile and a successful collector. Among its treasures may be named a priceless copy of the Baskerville Bible of 1763, a Matthew Bible of 1549, Raynolds & Hill, London, publishers — these containing the prologue of William Tyn-

dale, and distinguished by the rare initial letter T — a "Breeches" Bible of 1607, the Nuremberg 'chronicle of 1493, a small New Testament of

the Genevan translation, a Breviarum Romanum of the twelfth century, printed 'by hand on vellum, every letter and page perfect, embellished with colors and gold, Fox's "Book of Martyrs," three folio volumes, black letter, dated 1641, Latimer's Sermons, a choice copy of 1571, and a small copy in black letter of 1549. On these shelves are also many other rare and costly works of art and literature, including standard encyclopedias and the Century Dictionary in full Russia, the collection of Mr. Reynolds being unsurpassed by that of any other private individual in Massachusetts.
