ALVA ARTHUR REYNOLDS,
Corporal, son of Mrs. Samuel Megenity, McCloud, Okla., was born in Missouri, Dec. 18, 1896; educated in the schools of McCloud. Entered the service July 5, 1917, and received his military training at Ft. Sill and Camp Bowie, Company C, 142nd Infantry, 36th Division. He embarked overseas in July, 1918, and landed in France. He fought at Champagne and Meuse - Argonne; promoted to Corporal. Received his discharge at Camp Bowie, June 16, 1919.

JOHN D. REYNOLDS,

Private, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Reynolds, Wann, Okla., was born in Missouri, Jan. 25, 1896, and educated in the schools of Kansas and Oklahoma. He entered the service July 25, 1918, and underwent an intensive military training at Camp Greenleaf; embarked overseas in October, 1918, landing in England and then to France, Convalescent Company No. 12; sick during most of his stay in France. Discharged at Camp Bowie, July 5, 1919.

LESLIE REYNOLDS,

Private, son of W. A. and Francis Reynolds, Wann, Okla., was born in Missouri, Jan. 17, 1891, and was educated in the Missouri public schools. Entered the service Sept. 19, 1917, and underwent a course of military training at Camp Travis, Texas; embarked overseas June 10, 1918, and landed in France, Company H, 358th Infantry, 90th Division; promoted to Sergeant; in action at St. Mihiel and was wounded in his left side by flying shrapnel which resulted in his death. He made the supreme sacrifice that humanity might live in freedom and Peace. His name will endure forever.

EVERETT REYNOLDS,

Private, son of W. A. and Francis Reynolds, Wann, Okla., was born in Missouri, March 19, 1889, and was educated in the public schools of Missouri. He entered the service Sept. 19, 1917, and received his military training at Camp Travis, Company H, 358th Infantry, 90th Division embarked overseas Feb. 27, 1918 and landed in France; transferred to Co. M, 314th Inf., 79th Div. Wounded at Verdun by shrapnel. Discharged October 3, 1919.

JAMES LEMMON REYNOLDS, M. D.

Among the eminent physicians and surgeons of Canyon county, the more prominent of whom find place in this work, none enjoys to a greater extent the confidence and esteem of the community at large than Dr. James Lemmon Reynolds, of Emmett. His success is all the more creditable in that he has worked his own way up the ladder of success in his profession, even

from the time he was attending school. Today, he is not only in the enjoyment of a large and representative practice, but is prominently identified with matters of a public and social nature, and his adopted county has no more representative citizen. Doctor Reynolds was born at Chatham, Pittsylvania county, Virginia, February 3, 1878, and is a son of John B. and Telitha (**Mahan**) Reynolds, also natives of the Old Dominion State. His father enlisted in the Confederate army during the Civil war, and served four years under General Wise, fighting bravely until the fall of Richmond, and then returning to his mercantile business in Chatham, where he still resides. His wife also survives, and they have been the parents of nine children, of whom Doctor Reynolds is the sixth in order of birth.

James Lemmon Reynolds received his early education in the public and high schools of Chatham, following which he went to work in the tobacco fields of his native vicinity, where he earned the money with which to pursue his studies. He subsequently entered the venerable College of William and Mary, at Williamsburg, next to Harvard the oldest college in America, in the meantime, having decided upon the noble profession of medicine as his life work, studying the science. His resources were about exhausted, however, and he was obliged to contract a loan from his father, and with this money entered Richmond College, at Richmond, there beginning the study of medicine and surgery. Doctor Reynolds was allowed to finish his course in that institution, as his health gave way under his close application to his tasks, and he was obliged to come West, his medical course being finished in the University of Denver, from which he was graduated with the class of 1904. He then spent one year as interne in St. Anthony's Hospital, Denver, following which he came to Albion, Idaho, and for 2 years was actively engaged in practice, his advent in Emmett occurring in 1907. He now ranks second to none in the county among the followers of Aesculapius and Galen, and his well-known professional zeal, as well as attentiveness to his patients, has established for him an enviable

reputation throughout Emmett and the surrounding territory. He is examiner for a number of old line insurance companies and a member of the Southern Idaho Medical Society, the Idaho State Medical Society & the American Medical Association, and since locating in Emmett has been deputy county physician in Canyon county and surgeon for the Idaho Northern Railway.

In politics a staunch Democrat, he has taken in active interest in the success of his party's candidates and principles, and supports men and measures that he believes will best benefit his adopted city. He is a member of the Emmett Commercial Club, and his fraternal connections are with the Masons, the Odd Fellows and the Woodmen of the World. With Mrs. Reynolds, he attends the Baptist Church of Emmett.

Doctor Reynolds was married in Albion, Idaho, June 6, 1907, to Miss Gladys **Kossman**, who was born in Cassia county, Idaho, daughter of Fred Kossman, an early settler of that county. They have one child, a girl, Lois, born on September 26, 1922. Doctor Reynolds has had no reason to regret his choice of location, and feels that the state of Idaho has a great future before it. This faith he has shown in various ways, and has invested in a sixty-acre fruit ranch, in the cultivation of which he is meeting with a large measure of success.

SAMUEL M. C. REYNOLDS. The career of Hon. Samuel M. C. Reynolds; postmaster of Meridian, soldier, physician, journalist and legislator has been one of large and varied usefulness, as the above would plainly indicate, and Ada county claims no more highly esteemed citizen. In all of his undertakings Mr. Reynolds has proven successful, and no failure marks his long and honorable career.

Samuel M. C. Reynolds was born in Missouri, on December 15, 1847, and is a son of William and Didame (**McClure**) Reynolds, natives of Pennsylvania. The parents were married in Ohio, and subsequently removed to Missouri, where the father, a mechanic, died in 1886, at the age of seventy-five years, while the mother survived until 1894, and was seventy-

four years old at the time of her death. During his boyhood Samuel Reynolds secured a somewhat limited education the common schools of Missouri, but at the age of eleven years started to make his own way in the world, and his first position netted him a salary of five dollars a month. Early in the War of the Rebellion he enlisted for service, despite his youth, and he was with Sanborn's Brigade at Scofield. Subsequently he became a member of the Sixth Missouri Cavalry and fought throughout the war, meeting with none but the ordinary hardships of war; and suffering only a slight wound that at no time incapacitated him from duty. With the close of the war he returned home and soon after became connected with journalistic work and was later the editor and proprietor of a newspaper in Linn county, which he conducted for some little time. It was while thus engaged that he manifested his first interest in the medical profession, and later selling his paper he entered the Missouri Medical College from which he was duly graduated and soon after began the practice of his new profession in Missouri. In 1881 he withdrew from his native state, coming direct to Boise, then a small, though a promising town. After a brief medical experience here he again entered newspaper work, his connection with the *Statesman* covering a year, when he again resumed medical practice, locating in the town of Weiser, Idaho, and remaining there for five years.

He then removed to Salubria, Idaho, where for ten years he continued in practice, or until his appointment as adjutant of the soldiers' home, where he continued in that office until the administration of Governor Steunenberg. In 1896 he came to Meridian, here taking up the practice of medicine again, but in the following year came his appointment to the office of postmaster in this city, which position he has continued to hold until the present time, receiving successive appointments from Presidents Roosevelt and Taft. Always a staunch Republican, he was chosen to represent his district in the fifth Ohio legislature, and in that office gave genuine service to his constituents. Mr. Reynolds is now president of the Meridian

Telephone Company, with which concern he has been officially connected for some years. He is a comrade of the local post of the Grand Army of the Republic, and his fraternal relations are confined to membership in the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

In 1875 Mr. Reynolds was married to Miss Ella V. **Lyon**, and to them was born one daughter, Lula, who was twice married, and who is now deceased. She first married a Mr. **Persfield**, and to them were born five children, as follows: Ella Willis, a graduate of the Boise high school; Gladys; and Floyd and Harry, who are attending school in Meridian. Her second husband was a Mr. **Sims**, and she died in 1906, at the early age of twenty-nine years.

ORANGE S. RUNNELS, M D. Among the representative physicians and surgeons of the capital city of Indiana to whom it has been given to gain especial distinction in their profession is Dr. Orange Scott Runnels, who is one of the leading exponents of the beneficent system of Homeopathy in Indiana and who has held many important preferments in the line of his profession and in civic positions of trust. He owns and conducts a finely equipped and

appointed private surgical hospital at No. 522 North Illinois street and the same receives a large and representative support. A man of distinctive academic and professional attainments Dr. Runnels well merits consideration in this work, which gives special recognition to those who mark leadership in the various fields of human endeavor in the designated province of the publication. Dr. Orange Scott Runnels was born in Fredonia, McKean Township, Licking County, Ohio, on the 11th of June, 1847, and is a son of Edwin and Lydia (**Eaton**) Runnels, the former of whom was born in Vermont and the latter in the State of New York.

The Runnels family is of stanch Scotch and English descent and has been established in America since the colonial epoch of our national history. The name has been spelled both Runnels and Reynolds, according to the Scotch or Irish lineage of the branches, but the original Scotch orthography is that which is retained by him whose name initiates this article. The original representatives of the family in America came from Scotland and first settled in Nova Scotia, whence migration was later made to the State of Vermont, many years prior to the War of the Revolution. Stephen Runnels, great-grandfather of the doctor, was a gallant soldier in the Continental line and took part in the battle of Bunker Hill, in which he lost the gun which he had used with decisive effect. According to the New Hampshire provincial records he gained the office of corporal. Colonel Daniel Runnels (or Reynolds), great-great-uncle of the subject of this review, was captain of Company I in Colonel Nichols' regiment, which accompanied General Stark to Bennington, Vermont, in 1776, and later he became in turn major and colonel of that regiment, attaining high distinction as one of the able and gallant officers in the great struggle through which oppression was hurled back and the boon of liberty achieved. Revolutionary records also bear evidence of the valiant service of another representative of the Runnels family, and concerning him the following has been written: "Enos Runnels also was in the battle of Bunker Hill, in Captain

Moore's company, Colonel Stark's regiment. They started from Medford early in the morning and reached Bunker Hill 'along in the forenoon'. They marched to the redoubt, which was then full. Orders were given to the regiment to take the post on the left when the rail fence was commenced, and he helped to make it. He afterward enlisted for three years, and served in the Northern army, under General Schuyler; he was taken prisoner by the Indians and delivered to the British. He escaped imprisonment at Ticonderoga, rejoined the army under General Gates, and was present at the surrender of Burgoyne, at Saratoga. At the time of Arnold's treachery he was stationed at West Point, and he performed guard duty in the same room with Major Andre on the last night of the latter's life."

Dr. Runnels is a grandson of Stephen Runnels, who was born at Topsham, Vermont, where his father followed the vocation of farming, and he himself was reared in the sturdy discipline of the old New England farm, continuing to be identified with the great basic industry of agriculture in Vermont until 1819, when he severed the home ties and with his family set forth for the wilds of Ohio. He secured a tract of wild land in Licking County and there instituted the reclamation of a farm, continuing to reside on this homestead until his death, at which time he was fifty years of age. At Cambridge, Vermont, on the 26th of January, 1806, he was united in marriage to Miss Jane **Brown** who survived him by a number of years. Of their children six sons and three daughters attained to years of maturity.

Edwin Runnels, father of the doctor, gained his rudimentary education in the common schools of the old Green Mountain state and was a lad of twelve years at the time of the family removal to Ohio, where he was reared to manhood under the scenes and influences of the pioneer era. He lived up to the full tension of arduous toil, but his alert mind and distinctive ambition enabled him to effectively supplement his early educational training, and he became a man of mature judgment and broad information. He reclaimed a farm in Licking County, being

one of the honored and influential citizens of his community, and there continued to reside until he was well advanced in years, when he removed to Red Oak, Iowa, where he died in 1879, at the age of seventy-two years. His cherished and devoted wife preceded him to the life eternal by three years, and was sixty-seven years of age at the time of her death. In religious faith they were originally Baptists, but they later identified themselves with the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Edwin Runnels was a forceful public speaker and took active part in political affairs. In the climacteric period leading up to and culminating in the Civil War he was an uncompromising abolitionist, and he was an efficient conductor on the historic "underground railway", through the agency of which many a poor slave was assisted to freedom. Of his eleven children, seven sons and four daughters, six are now living (1909): Celestia is the wife of Rev. George H. Hicks, of Sidney, Iowa; Ormond is a resident of Red Oak, Iowa; Annie P. is the wife of Charles McFarland, of Nipomo, California; Dr. Orange S. is the immediate subject of this sketch; Dr. Moses T. is a leading physician and surgeon of Kansas City, Missouri; and Sherwin T. is a resident of Nipomo, California. Mrs. Lydia (Eaton) Runnels, mother of these children, was a daughter of Sidney Eaton, who was a native of Connecticut, of English lineage, and who removed from that state to Rome, New York, from which place he came to Tucking County, Ohio, in an early day, there developing a farm and passing the residue of his life, which was prolonged to an advanced age.

Orange Scott Runnels was reared on the old homestead farm in Licking County, Ohio, and as a boy and youth was not denied the privilege of contributing his quota to the various departments of farm work, the while he attended the district schools during the winter terms. Later he was at intervals a student in Oberlin College, at Oberlin, Ohio, but impaired health prevented him from completing the course upon which he had entered with all of zeal and ambition. During his years of study in this institution he

taught in the district schools each winter and by this means defrayed his college expenses. He began the study of medicine under the effective preceptorship of Dr. John B. Hunt, of Columbus, Ohio, and after due preliminary reading he was matriculated in the Cleveland University of Medicine, in the City of Cleveland, in which he was graduated in February, 1871, and from which he received his well earned degree of Doctor of Medicine. In the following April, he took up his residence in Indianapolis, where he has been engaged in the successful work of his profession during the long intervening period of nearly forty years, marked by earnest, devotion to his exacting vocation and by that broad human sympathy which transcends mere sentiment to become an actuating motive in the relief of distress and suffering. Since 1885 he has devoted himself exclusively to the surgical branch of his profession, and in the same his reputation is far from being one of local order'. He has taken effective post-graduate courses in leading medical schools in Chicago and New York and attended important clinics of the most renowned surgeons in Europe. In 1890 he established the Runnels Surgical Hospital, and the same is now one of the best equipped and most ably managed private institutions of its kind in the Union in fact its facilities are on a parity with those of many of the leading public or semi-public hospitals. The doctor has been an extensive and valued contributor to the standard and periodical literature of his profession and has been called upon to present papers before the various professional organizations with which he is identified. In 1894 he received from Oberlin College the honorary degree of Master of Arts, a fitting recognition of his ability and his generous services to humanity. Dr. Runnels was incumbent of the office of surgeon general of the Indiana National Guard during the administration of Governor Mount. 1897-1901, and established and had supervision of Camp Mount military hospital, In Indianapolis, after the return of the Indiana troops from the Spanish-American war. The doctor is identified with the American Institute of Homeopathy, the

Indiana Institute of Homeopathy and the Marion Count Homeopathic Medical Society. In 1886 he was president of the National Surgical and Gynecological Society, was president of the American Institute of Homeopathy in 1886, and president of the Indiana Institute of Homeopathy in 1884. He is also an honorary member of the Massachusetts Surgical & Gynecological Society, the New York State Homeopathic Medical Society, the Missouri Institute of Homeopathy, the Kentucky Homeopathic Society, and the Southern Homeopathic Association. He is also identified with the American Association of Orificial Surgeons, of which he was president in 1894. The doctor was chairman of the delegates from the American Institute of Homeopathy to the World's Homeopathic Congress held in Basle, Switzerland, in 1886, and was made vice-president of that notable body.

In politics Dr. Runnels is aligned as a staunch supporter of the principles and policies for which the Republican party stands sponsor, and while the exactings of his profession and his devotion to the same have precluded his entering the domain of practical politics, he is essentially public-spirited and progressive as a citizen and lends his cooperation in the promotion of enterprises and measures tending to advance the general welfare. He is a member of the Indianapolis Board of Trade, is a director and vice-president of the Inter-State Life Assurance Society of Indianapolis, and is examiner for the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company, Newark, New Jersey, and of the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company of Boston, Massachusetts. He enjoys marked popular esteem in his home city and is connected with representative social organizations of local order, including the Commercial Club, the University Club, and the Indianapolis Literary Club. He and his wife hold membership in the First Congregational Church.

On the 20th of June, 1872, was solemnized the marriage of Dr. Runnels to Miss Dora **Clark**, of Columbus, Ohio. She was born and reared in that state and was a daughter of the late Sumner Clark, a representative citizen of

Columbus. Of the four children of this union the first born, Edwin C., died at the age of five years; Walter died at the age of eight months; Scott C. is now engaged in the practice of medicine and surgery in Indianapolis; and Clark was nine years of age at the time of his death. Mrs. Runnels was summoned to the life eternal on March 24, 1891, at the age of forty-five years, having been a devout member of the Congregational Church.

On June 28, 1893, Dr. Runnels was united in marriage to Mrs. Alice (**Barteau**) **McCulloch**, widow of Rev. Oscar C. McCulloch, who was minister of the Plymouth Congregational Church of Indianapolis and a resident of Indianapolis at the time of his death. Mrs. Runnels was born at Ellington, Connecticut, November 15, 1854, and is a daughter of Morris R. Barteau, an influential citizen of Appleton, Wisconsin. No children have been born of the second marriage.

History of Colorado.

Denver: Linderman Co., 1927.

ALBERT E. REYNOLDS

For nearly two score years, Albert E. Reynolds was the most prominent mining operator in southwest Colorado. His father¹ was a leading farmer and merchant of Niagara county, New York, where Albert was born, February 13, 1840. After acquiring a common school education he attended Madison University for a year but with a natural inclination toward business, entered his father's store. In 1867 he located at Fort Lyon, Colorado, where he opened a general store. This was the beginning of a chain of trading establishments which brought Mr. Reynolds into close business dealings with the Cheyenne and Arapahoe Indians. From the start he earned their confidence by his unfailing method of keeping his word, and though at times he was alone in their camps, remote from the forts, he never felt unsafe. Indeed, he was one of a very few white men they ever asked to join them in councils and he frequently acted as mediator between them and government representatives.

In 1881, attracted by the reports of silver

discoveries in the San Juan, he sold his commercial holdings on the plains, located at Lake City, and at once began active mining. Organization of corporations for purely stock selling purposes never occupied a moment of his time, yet nothing appealed to him stronger than a mineralized territory that promised returns from development. He rapidly acquired immense holdings in Hinsdale, Ouray, Gunnison, Mineral, Rio Grande and La Plata counties, and wealth pouring from one mine was largely used in the development of others. His greatest success was with the Virginus group between Ouray and Telluride, where he ran the first long mining tunnel in Colorado, extending a mile and a half into the mountain. This, with the mill at the portal, was operated by electricity, the first of such installation in Colorado. In his later years Mr. Reynolds spent a portion of his time on his ranch in the Arkansas valley, which included the site of old Fort Bent.

He was married to Miss Dora **Earll** of Wisconsin in 1883, and to them was born a daughter, Anna E., who became the wife of B. P. **Morse** of Denver.

His millions in gold and silver went almost entirely into channels of trade through many hundreds of employees. At the time of his death, March 21, 1921, he was the largest individual owner of mining property in the state. In quiet, though very material ways, he did much for the social, educational, moral and political progress of Colorado.

ADRIAN REYNOLDS, JR.

Adrian Reynolds, Jr., publisher and editor of the Eagle of Eagle, Colorado, was born at Elk Falls, Kansas, September 1, 1875, and is a son of Adrian and Martha Cinderella (**Blackford**) Reynolds, the former a native of Guilford county, North Carolina, and the latter of New York. Having attended the public schools and graduated from the high school at Sedan, Kansas, Adrian Reynolds, Jr., entered the Kansas State University, from which he was graduated in 1896, with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Of his career, Mr. Reynolds said, "Actually born in a country newspaper office, I

have not been away from the smell of a newspaper office since birth, over fifty years ago." He early learned the printing trade and has been a newspaper publisher since about the time he attained his majority. Mr. Reynolds is a member of Aspen Lodge, No. 224, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, and his religious faith is that of the Presbyterian church, in which he holds a membership. On October 12, 1898, at Arkansas City, Kansas, Mr. Reynolds was united in marriage to Miss Rhoda May **Wall**, and they are the parents of five children, namely: Adrian W., who is married and is engaged in the newspaper business at Rock Springs, Wyoming; Winona, who is the wife of C. E. **Peterson**; Pauline, Manila and Rhoda May.
